At lunch time, the freshman had to have whipped cream fights and pie fights. Next, they had to look for a jelly bean in a dish of whipped cream — using only their faces!

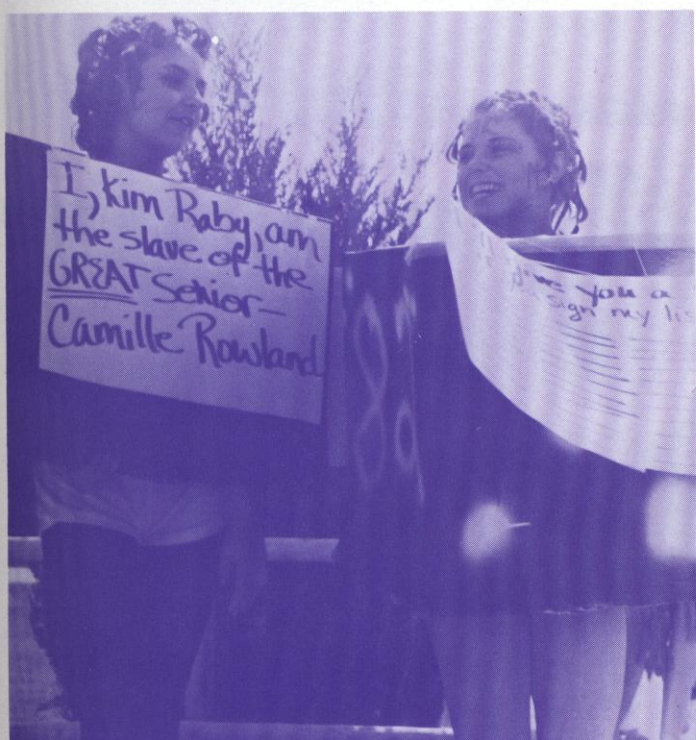

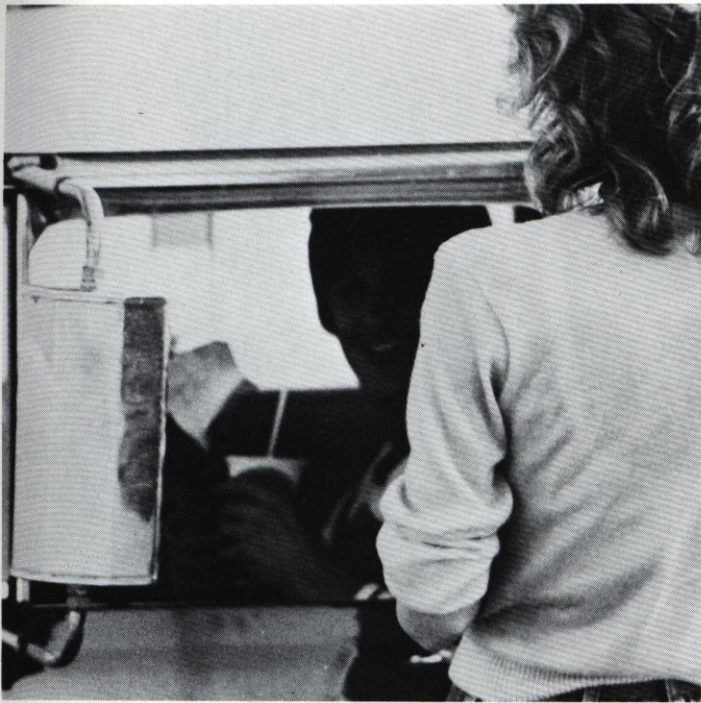

Construction started November 20, 1981, on a new \$159,400 administration office and storage building at 10th and D where the old Spartan Inn once stood.

William Webb, administrative assistant, said the school board had wanted to purchase the property for about ten years. He explained, "There were ten companies that bid to do the construction and Butala Construction Co. of Salida was the lowest bidder. They therefore received the job."

"Working with Butala," Webb said, "were several subcontractors." The list included Argys Plumbing and Heating which had the plumbing contract, Acme Electric did the electrical work, Bosh Sheet Metal and Roofing did the sheet metal work, and Joe Speeze did the brick work.

Webb said the list of rooms for the new building includes a board meeting room for conferences of any kind, a reception and waiting room, a secretarial area, a machine room for copy and ditto work, a fireproof vault room to hold records, a storage room to hold records, a storage room for small school supplies, and offices for superintendent and assistant superintendent

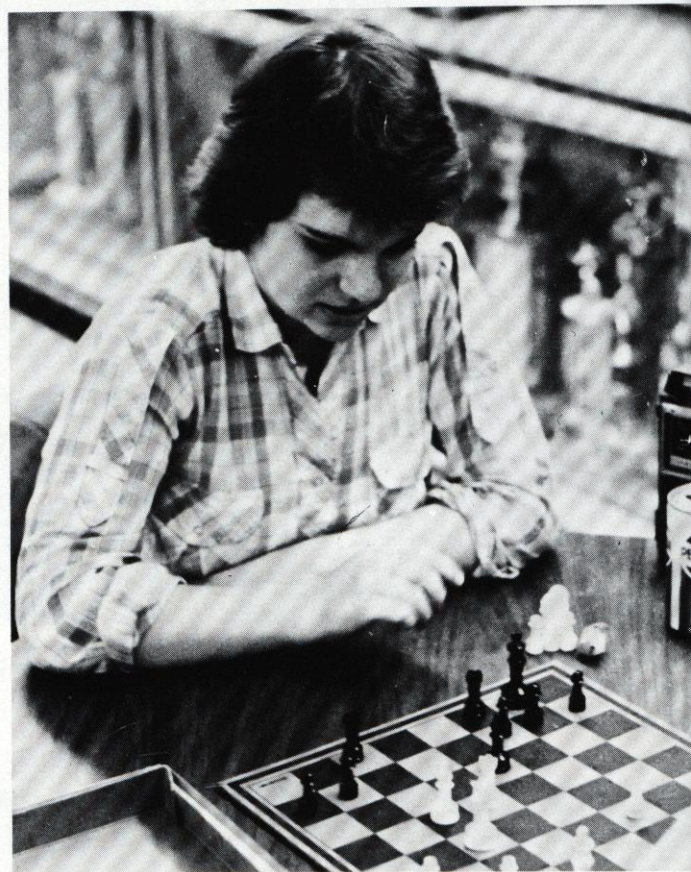

Chess Club Spurs Challenge

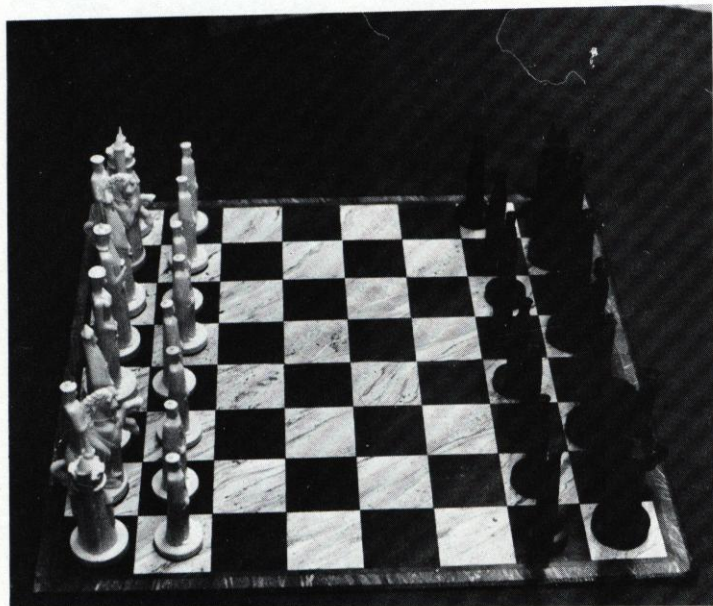
Chess Club members once again checkmate, castle and capture their way to learning how to concentrate on outwitting their opponent.

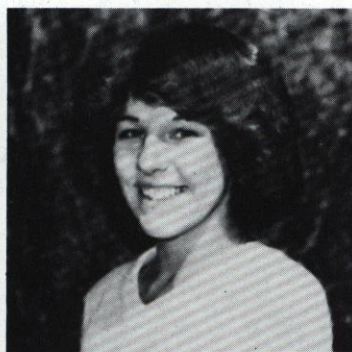
Seniors Prove Talented

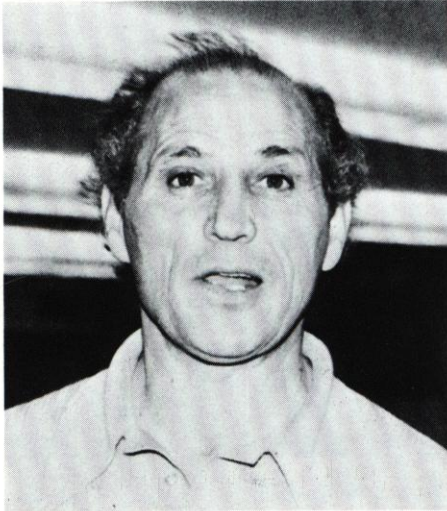

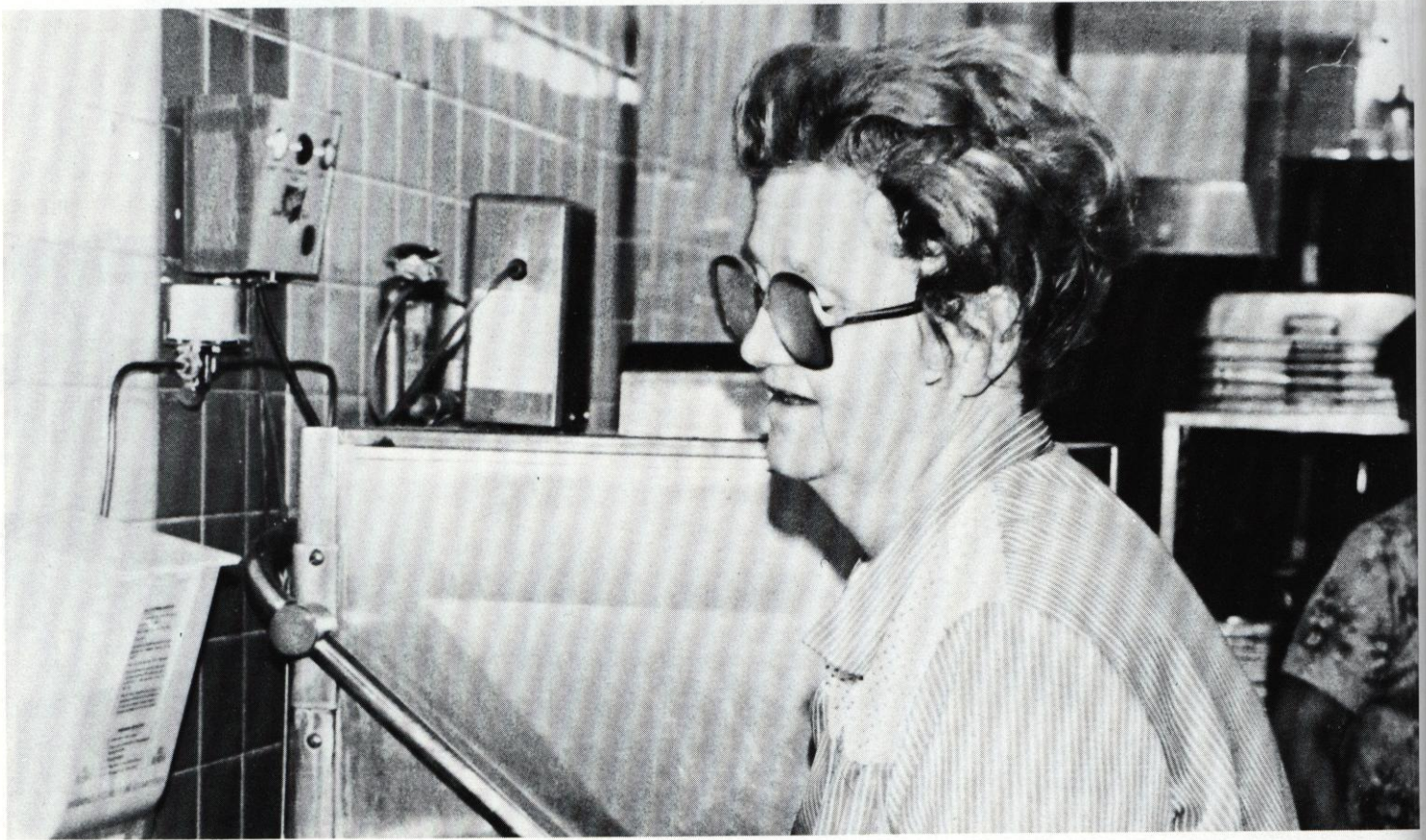

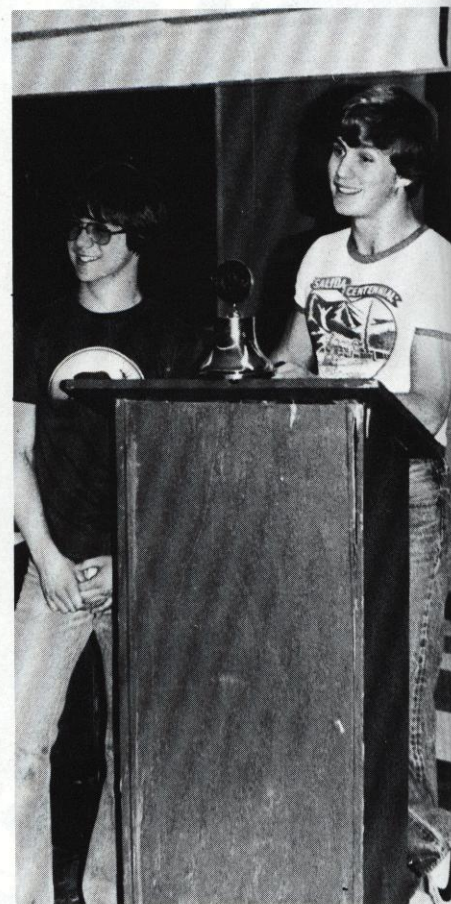
During the year, the club sponsors a couple of fund-raising projects to pay for its several community projects. Last year's were honey bear sales and scratch pad sales.

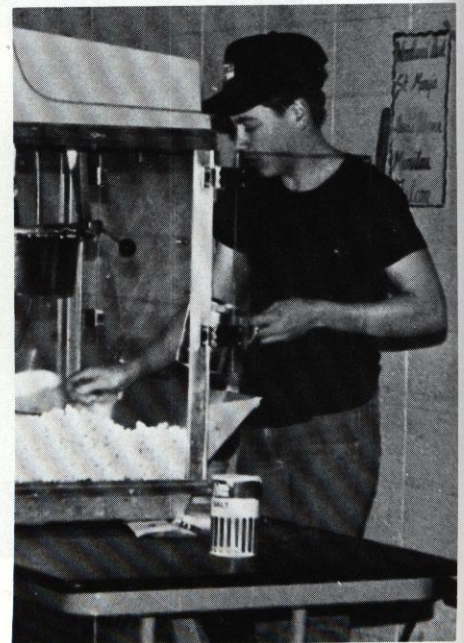

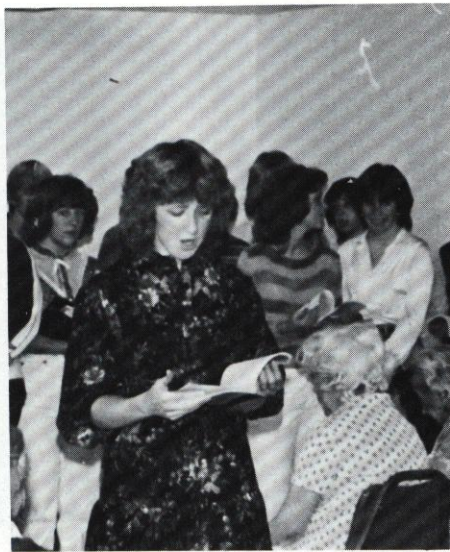

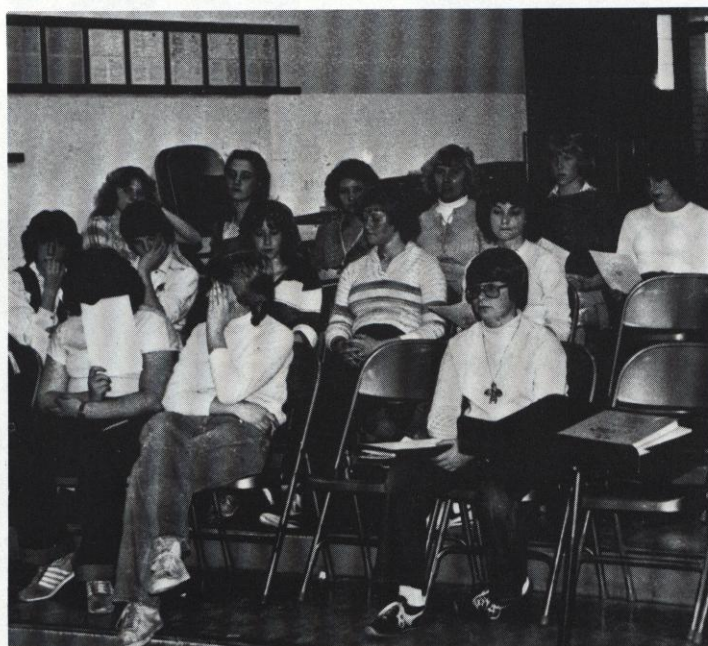
Glee Club consisted of 53 members, all of which were girls. The girls met every day.

There are some benefits beyond high school from this organization. There is always the possibility of needing language skills in the business world. The club helps to perfect your skills you might later on in life.



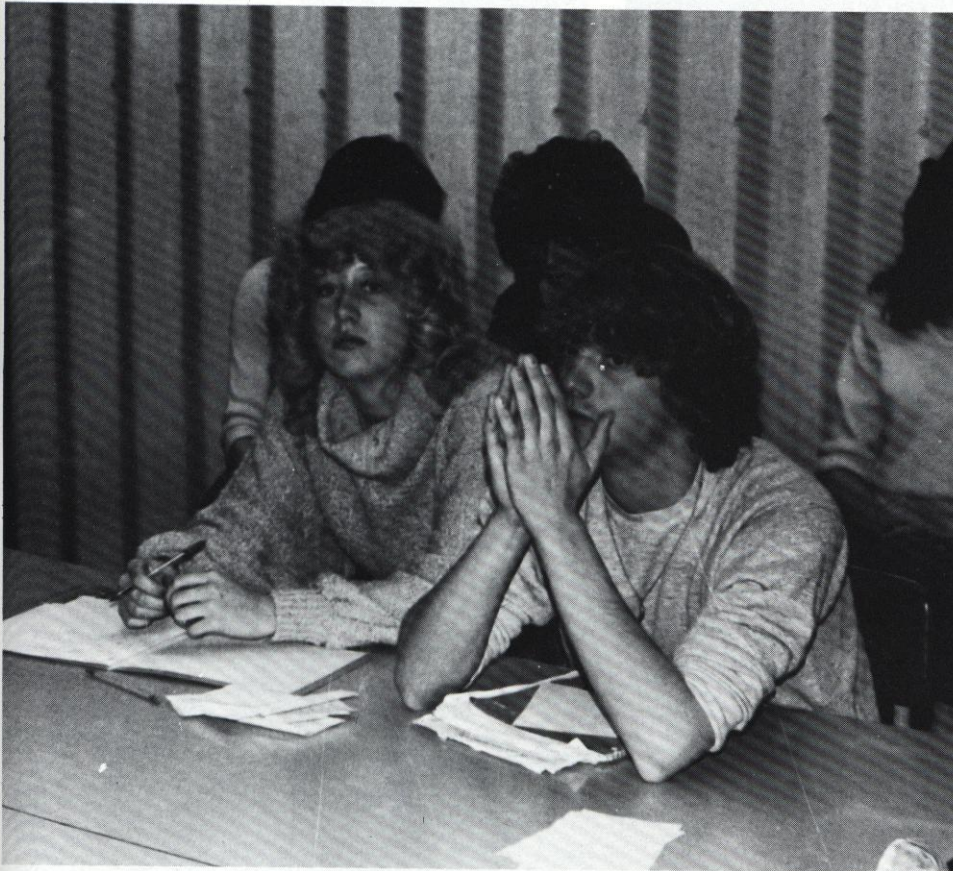

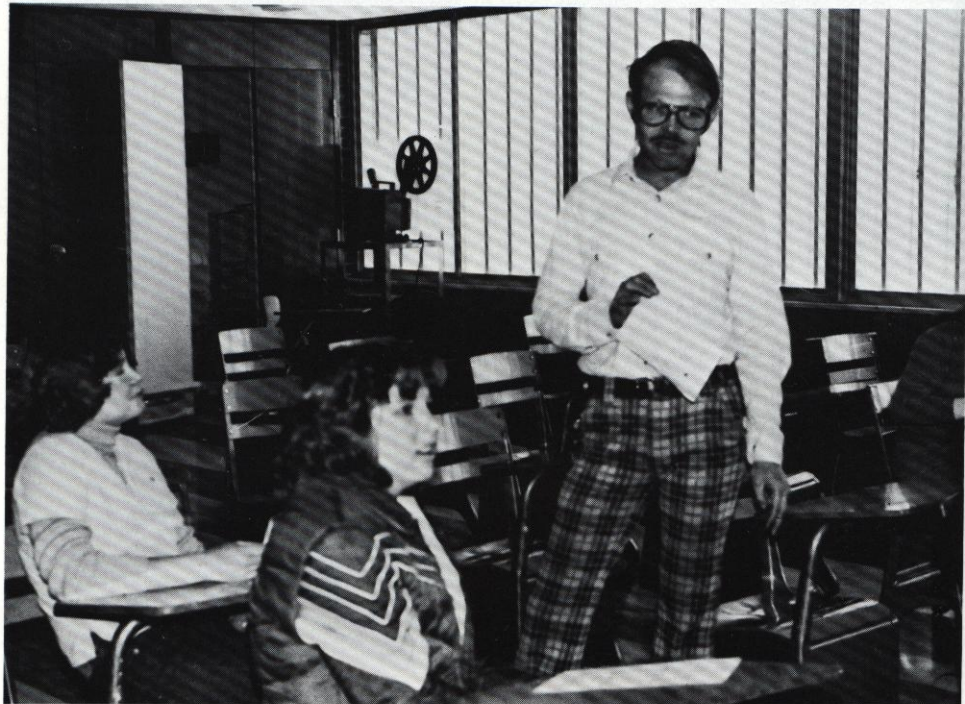
The International Relations Club or IRC is a club that helps the members with world and government affairs. They meet twice a month on Thursday evenings.

Tenderfoot Times entered the computer age in February with a Compugraphic Mini Disk Terminal 350 which was pressed into service immediately.

Publications adviser Dick Dixon said the terminal will be used next year to set not only newspaper type, but also copy for La Resume.

The terminal cost \$4,243 and tentative plans call for a typesetting class next year. By mid-March this year, two staff members were using the terminal to set copy.

The Times won the Colorado High School Press Assoc. Sweepstakes award for the fifth consecutive time this year. Staff members earned eight gold

medals and four silver medals in individual story or photo competition.

Two National Scholastic Press Assoc. All American awards brought the Times record to 17 straight, and one more award was still unannounced at press time. One of the two All Americans this year was a "Five Star" honor, which staff members have earned five ties in 8½ years of NSPA evaluations.

For the eighth consecutive year, the Times earned a Medalist rating from Columbia Scholastic Press Assoc. The award carried special All Columbian designation in all three judging areas including content and coverage, writing and editing, and design and display.

Co-editors Sandy Kaess and Tracy Harmon, along with Dixon, were guests of the Colorado Press Assoc. at the Brown Palace Hotel in Denver in February. Tenderfoot Times won first place in General Excellence. It was the seventh time for the award in nine years of competition and the paper was second place the other two years.

First year photographer Arnie McCoy earned a third place in Colorado Press Women's competition results announced in March. Our staff members planned to enter a number of categories in other individual competitions which were to be judged during the summer.

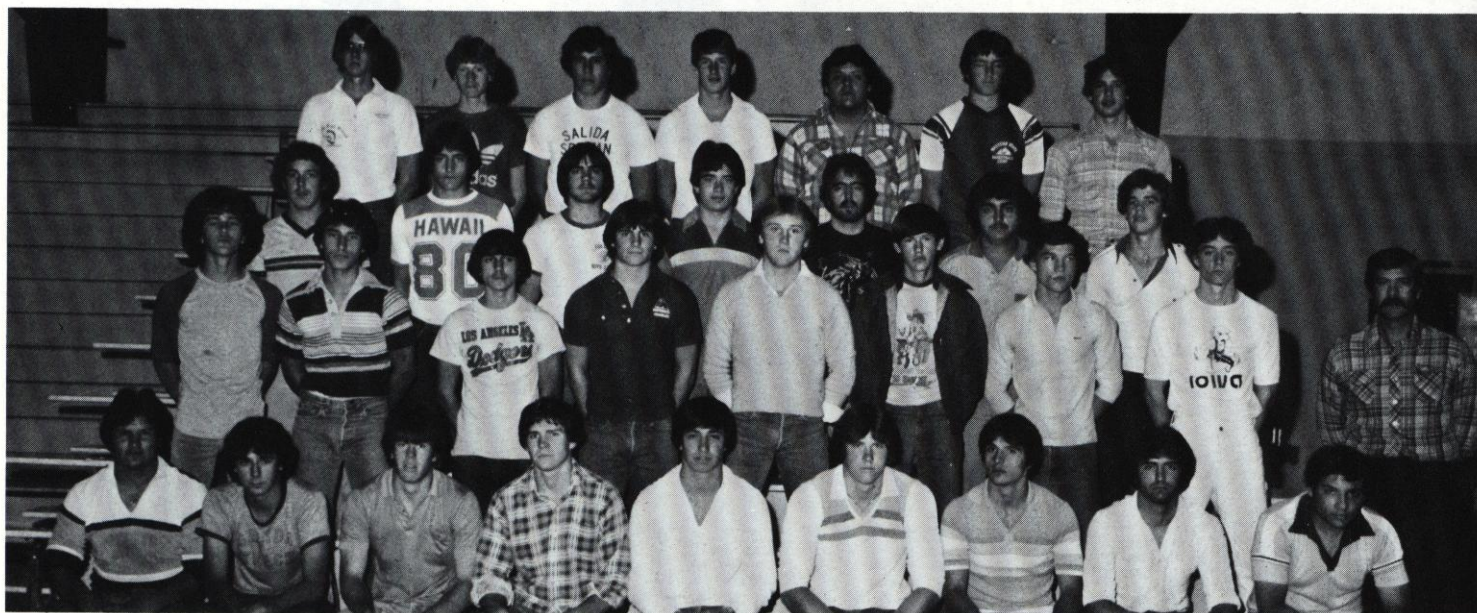

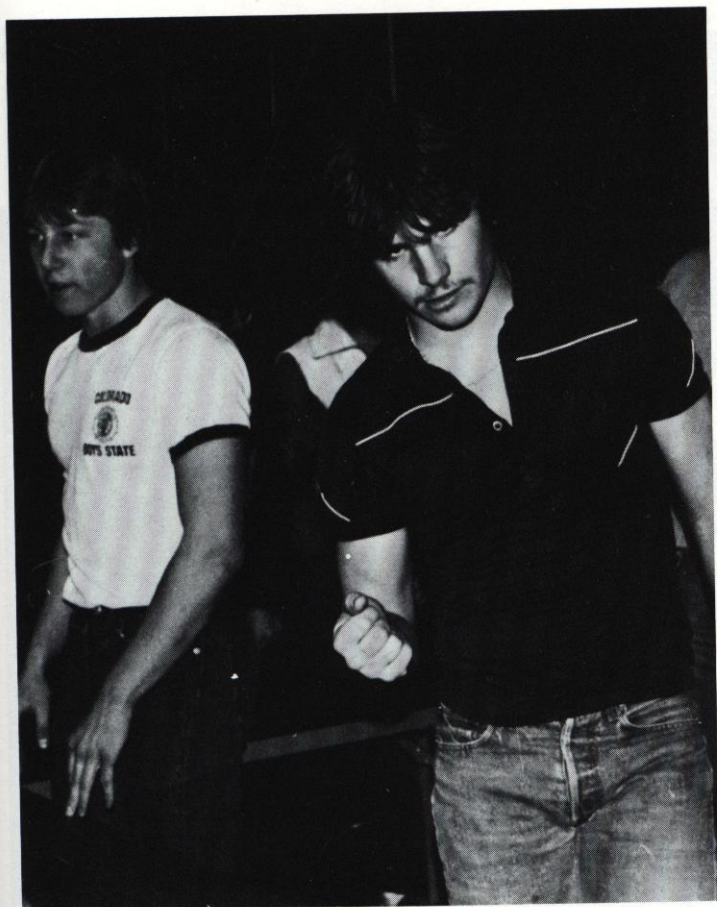

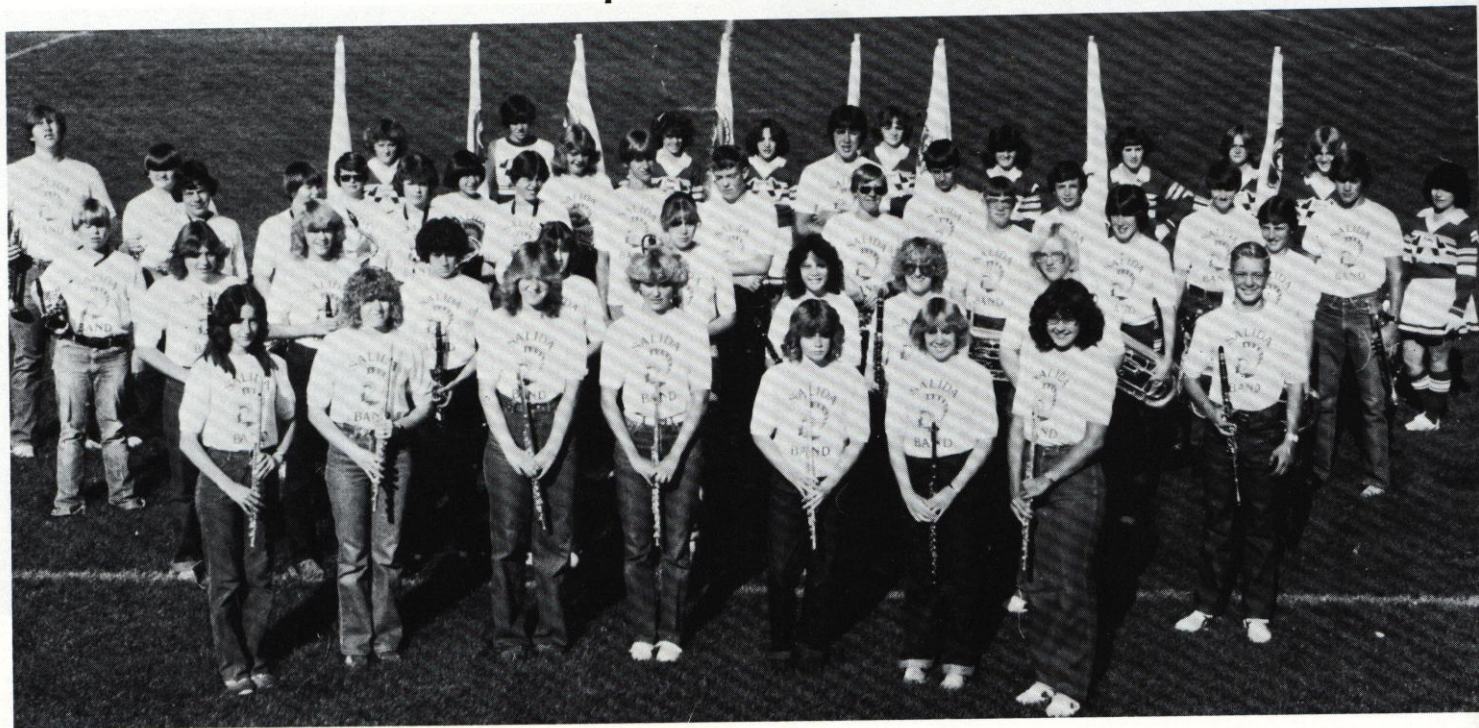

The headline says it all. Jazz Band played an important part during the 81-82 school year.

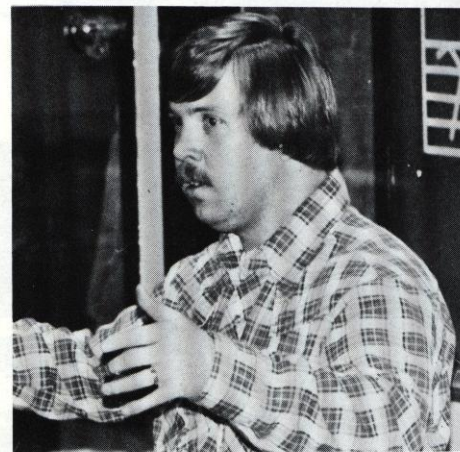

Obviously, the Spartans started out on the right foot, and to prove it wasn't a fluke, they went on to beat Monte Vista, 35-10.

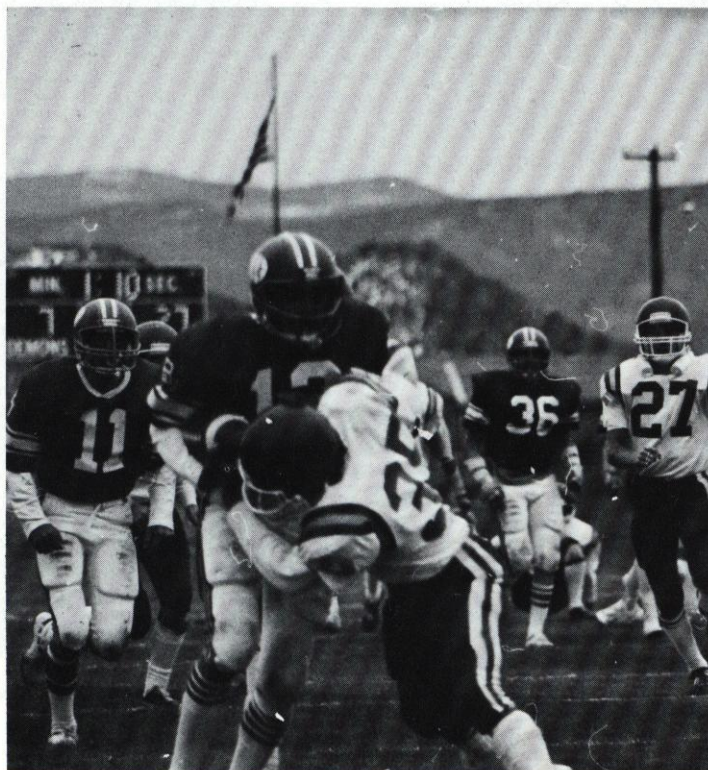
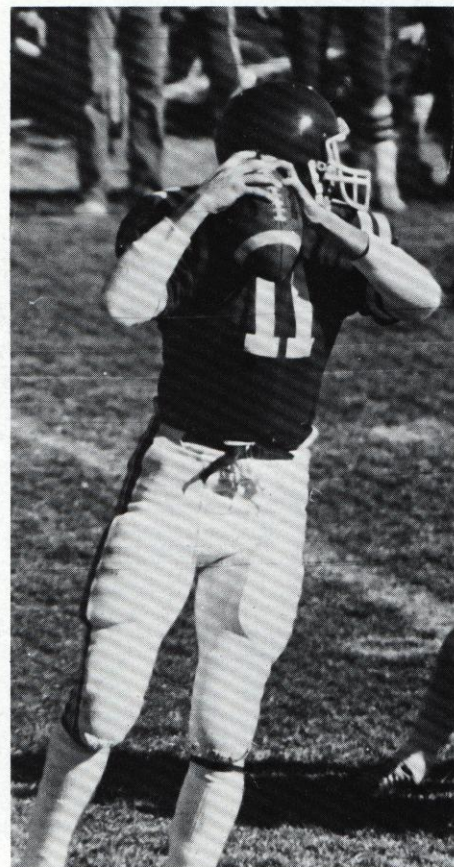
The next game wasn't so lucky. The Spartans lost to Lake County, 12-14.

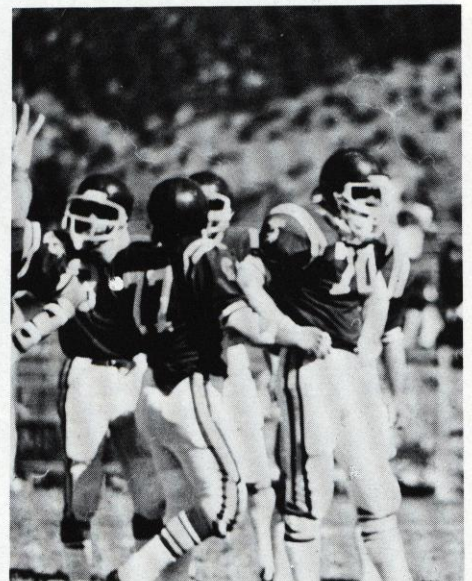
Still, the next week, which was the last game of the season, was a must-win situation for the Spartans. The Spartans apparently never got started, and lost to Woodland Park, 6-7.

Oh well, we'll show 'em next year guys!!

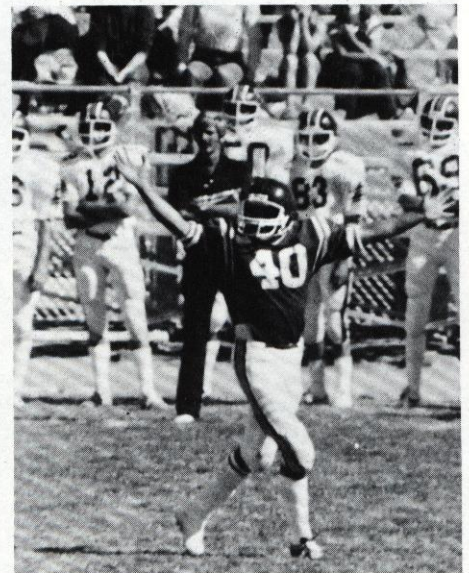

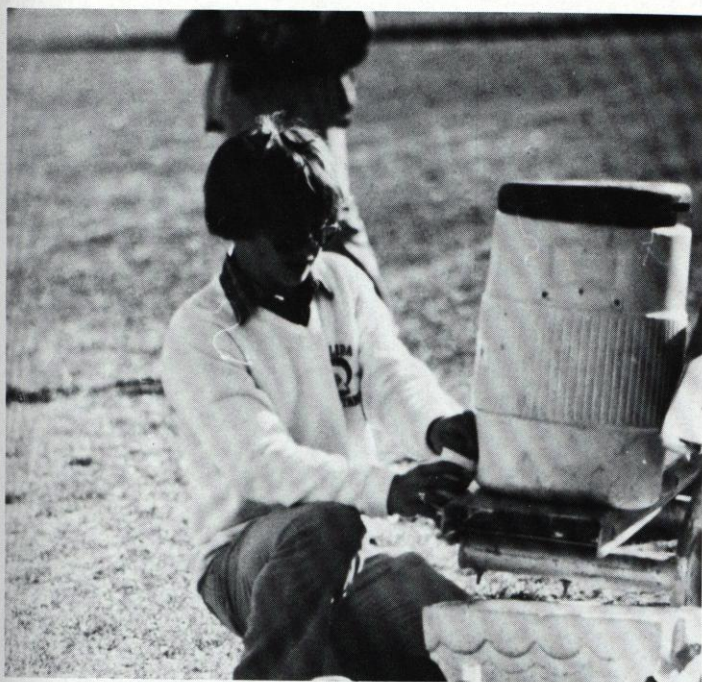

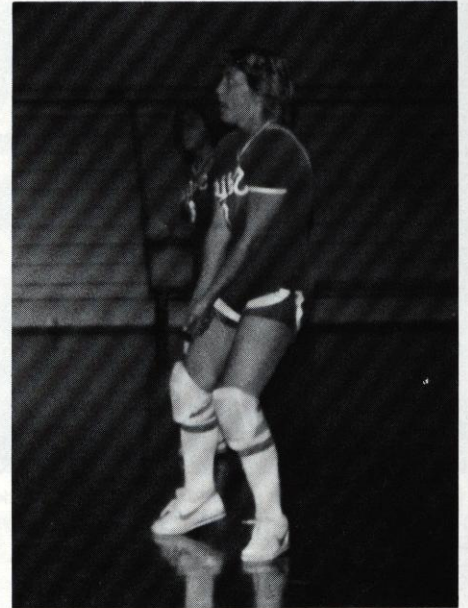

The Seniors say that they wish all of the coming years the best of good luck; and they're behind you all the way.



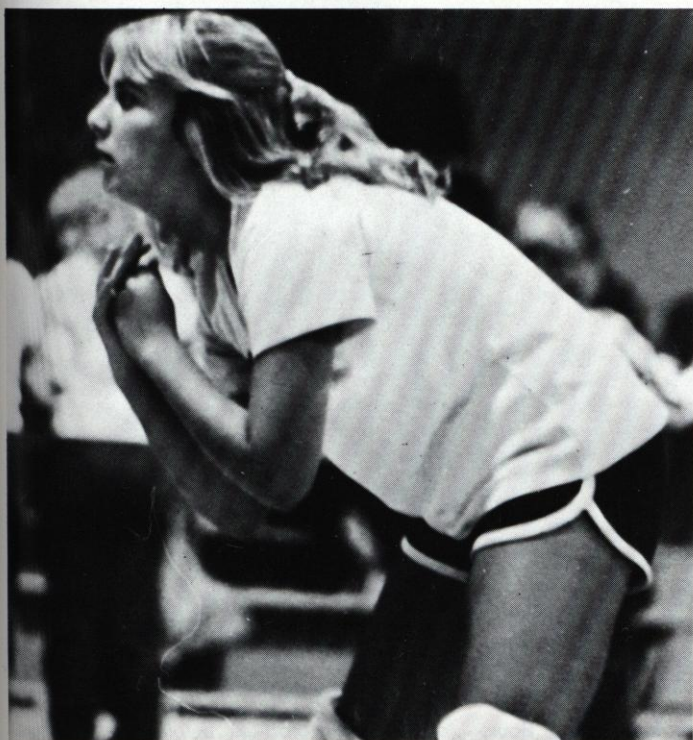

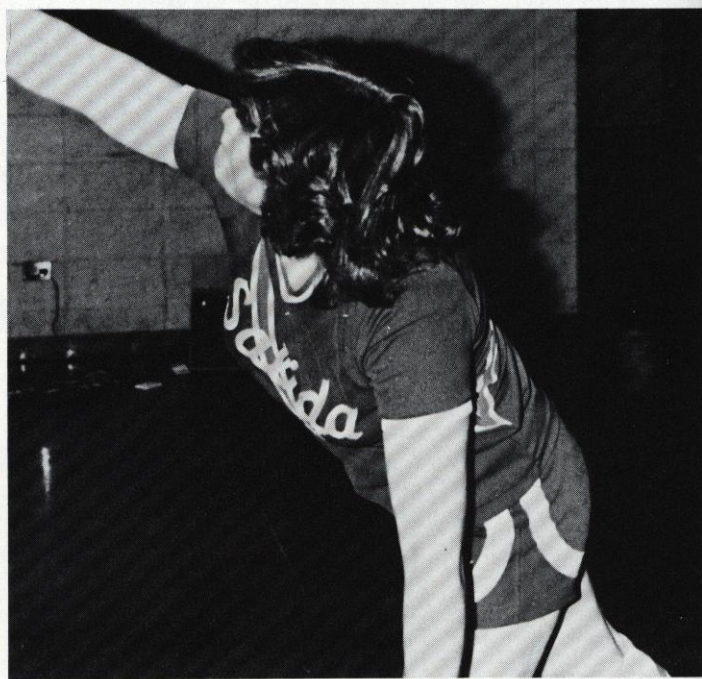

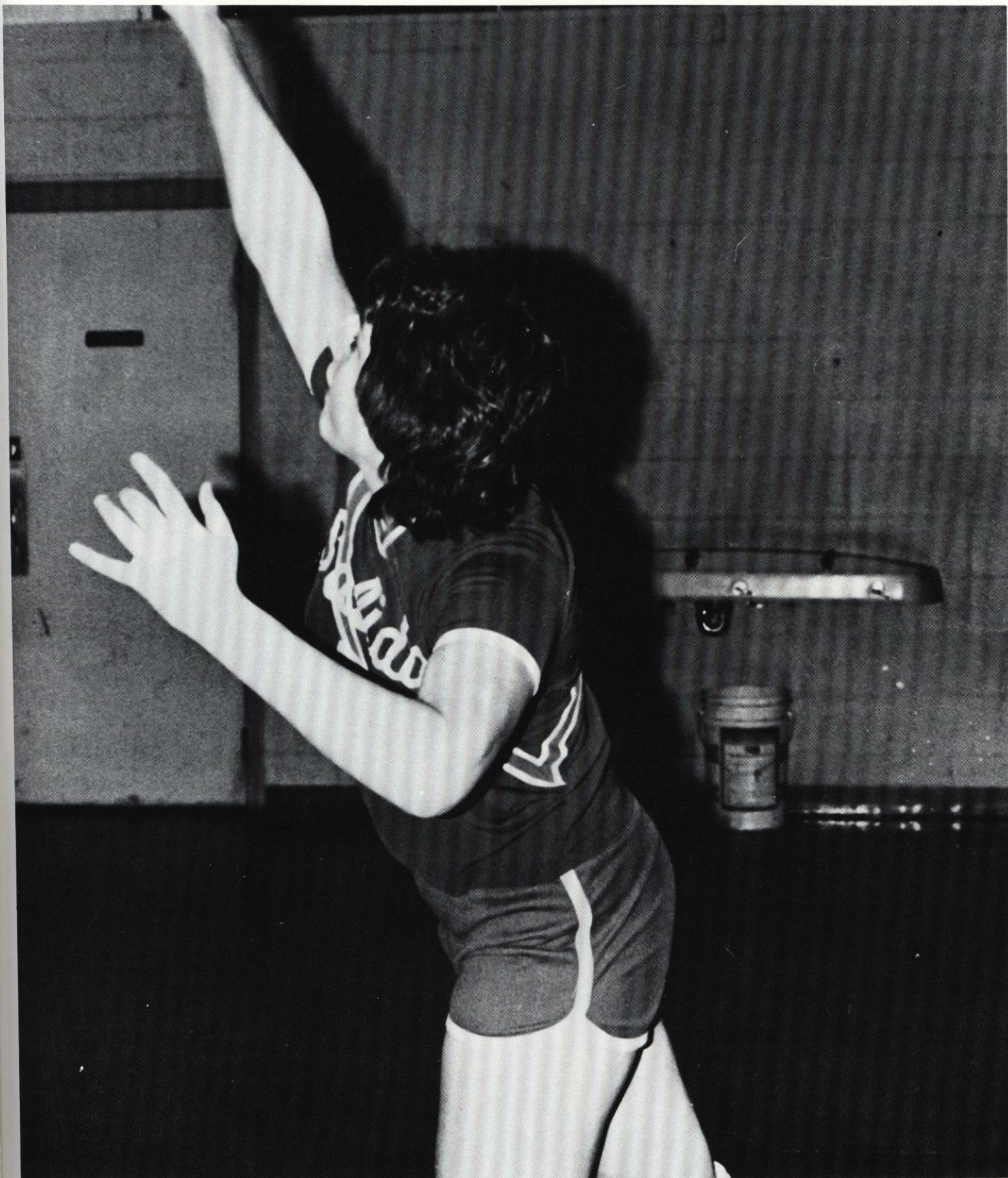

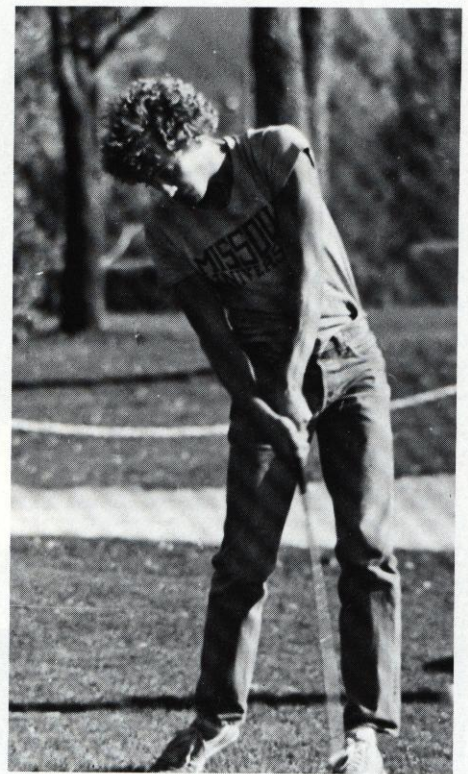
McQueen shot an 85 on the first day and improved by three shots the second day. He said he didn't know just where he placed in the final standings.

"I really like the kids," was Tom Breunich's answer when asked why he chose to teach physical education for a career.

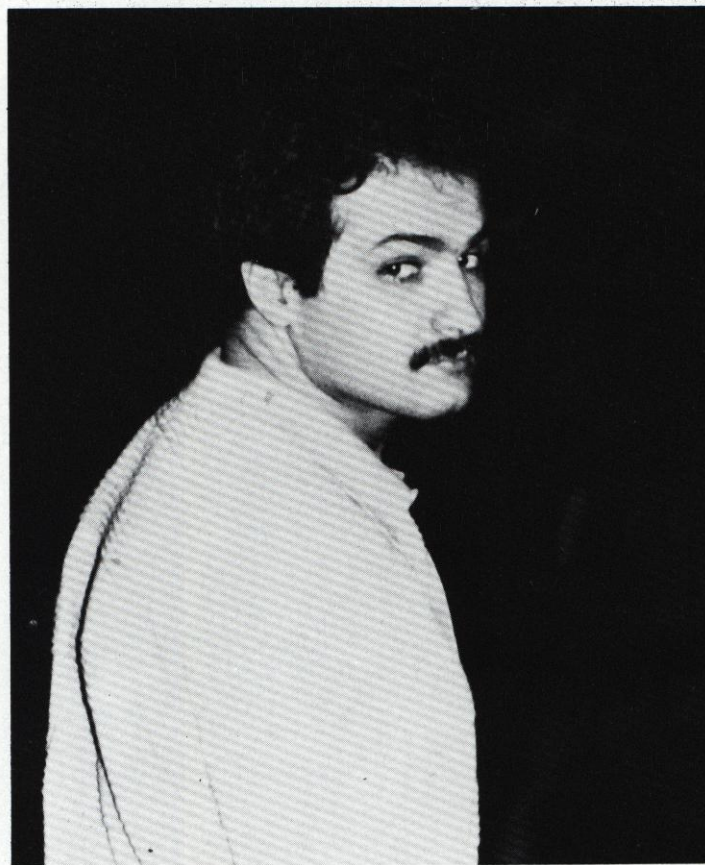

P.E. 2 was an advanced physical ed. class. Students participated in individual sports including golf, tennis, bowling and such.

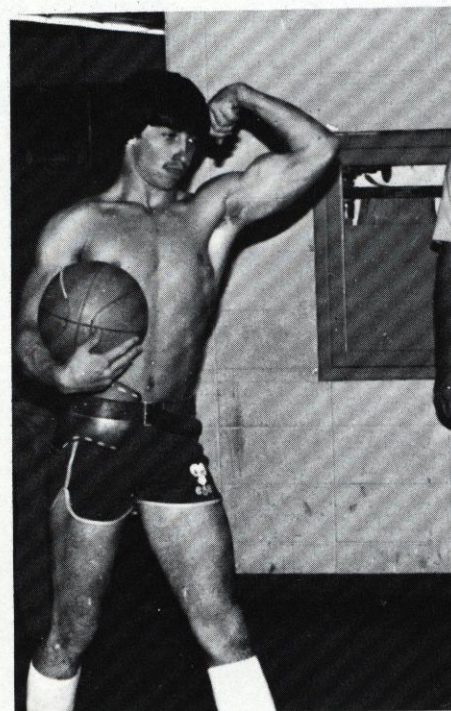
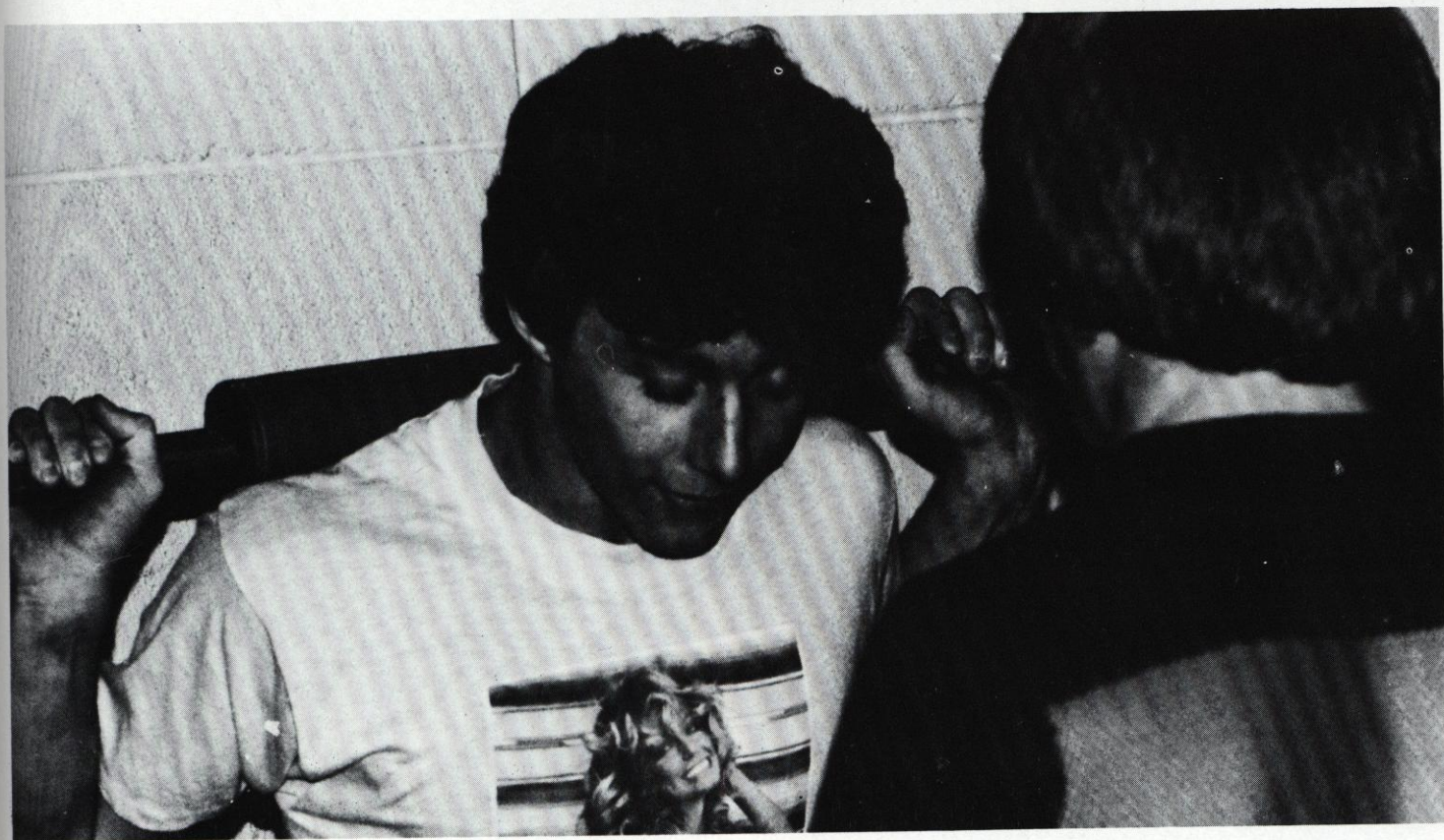
P.E. III, concentrated on weightlifting, and conditioning muscles. The students worked out four days a week with one free day.

Some students are natural born showoffs, but as Dave Padoven demonstrates, it's even better when there's something to show.



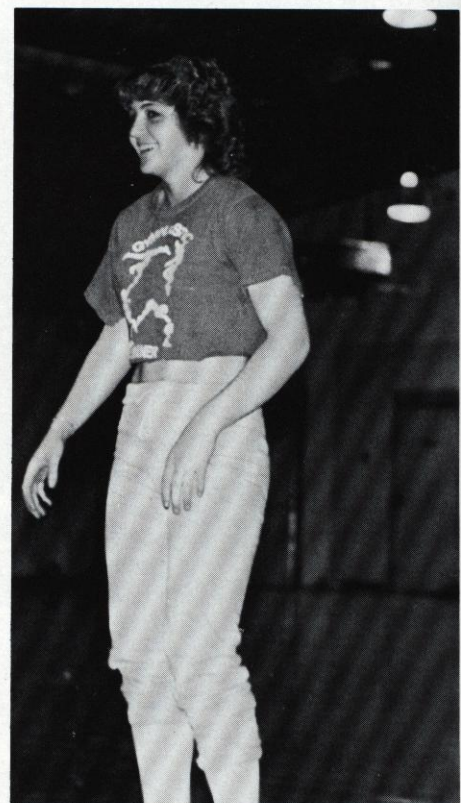

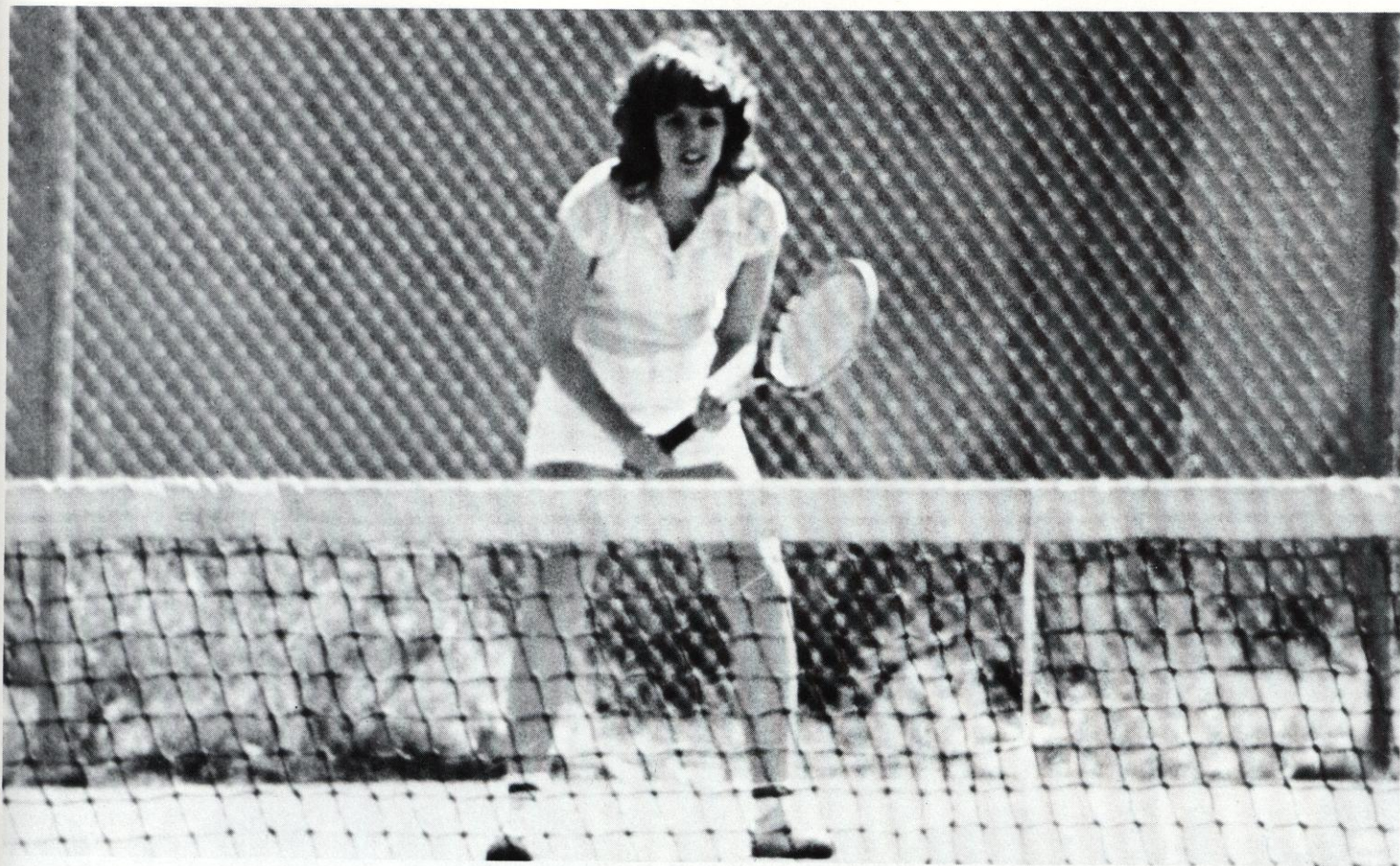
past meets." Kropp also said that he felt the younger girls had improved and that even though the season was cut short, it has turned out to be a good one.

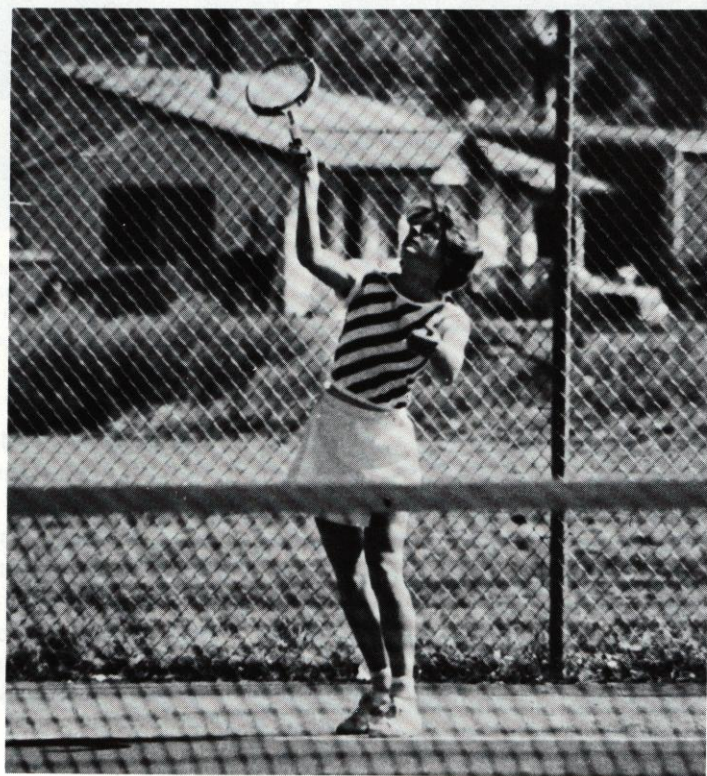

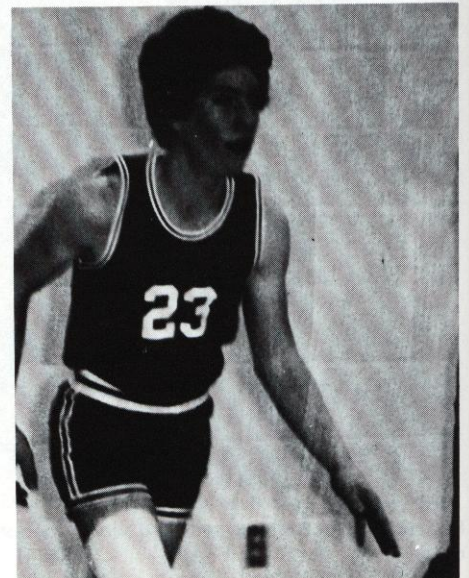
The Varsity teams first win of the season was a score of 60-58. Their final record was 10-9.

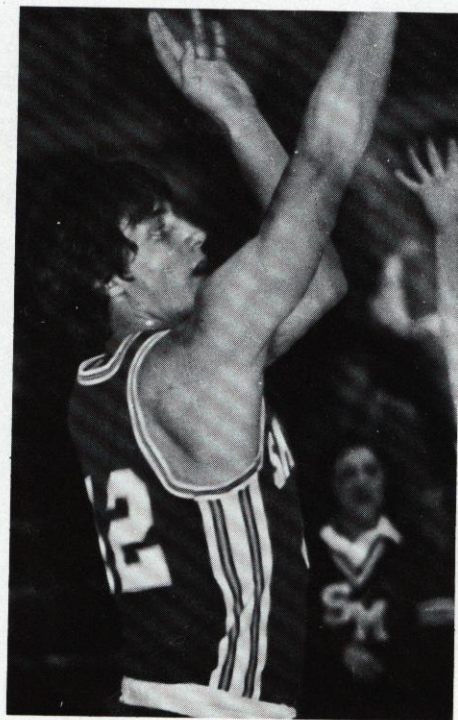

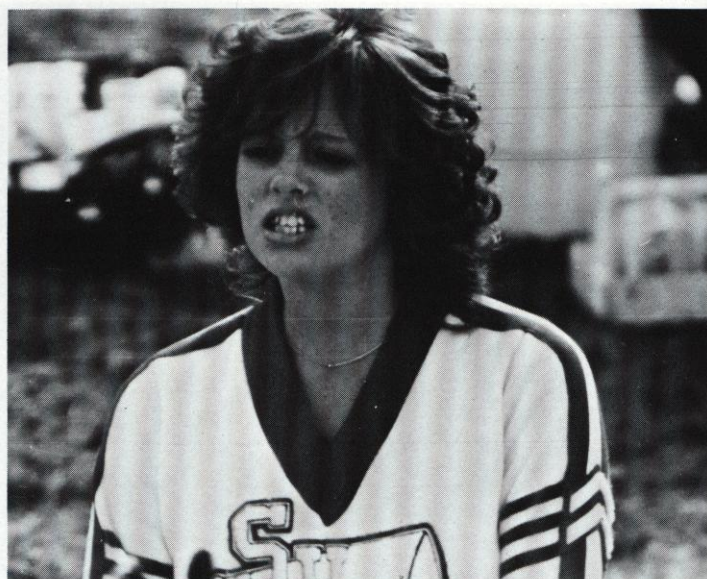
The cheerleading squad for Winter Sports was co-sponsored by Theresa Cortese and Marsha Gray, with Lori Janezich serving as head cheerleader.

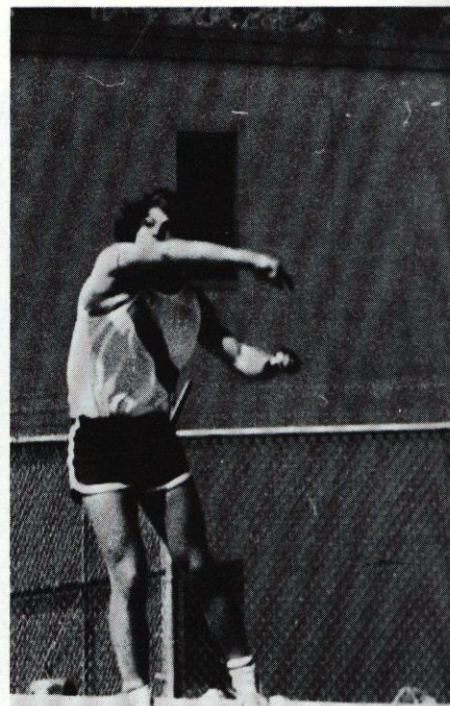

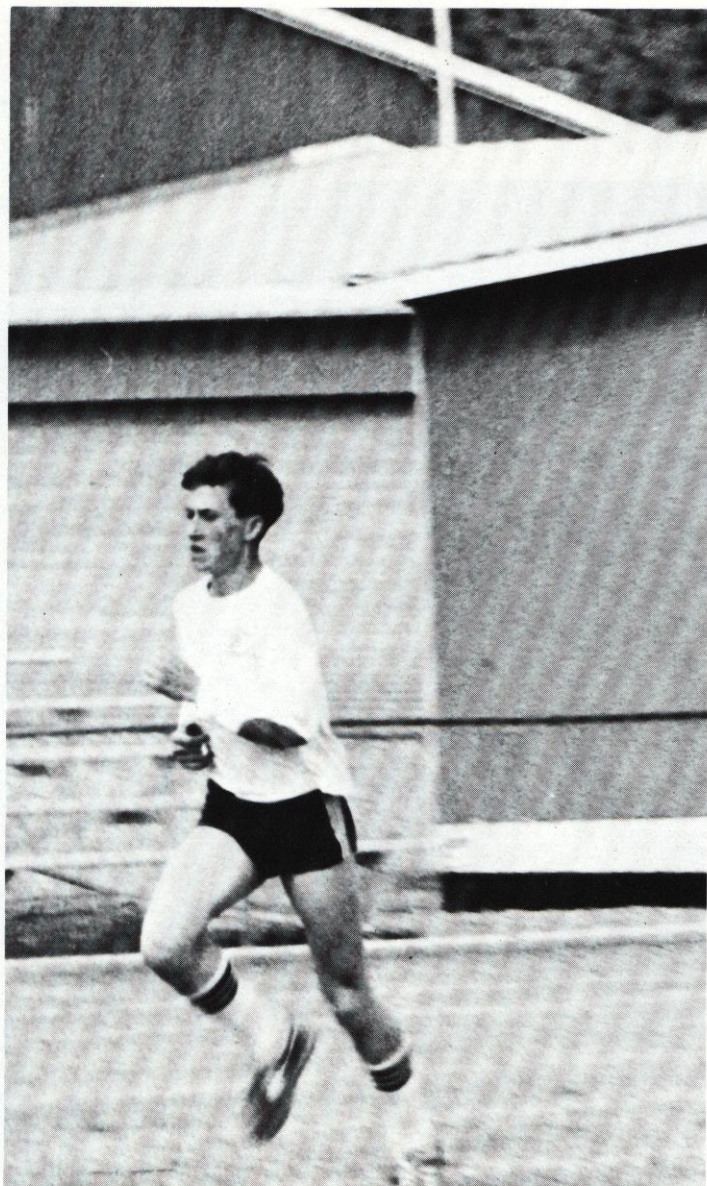

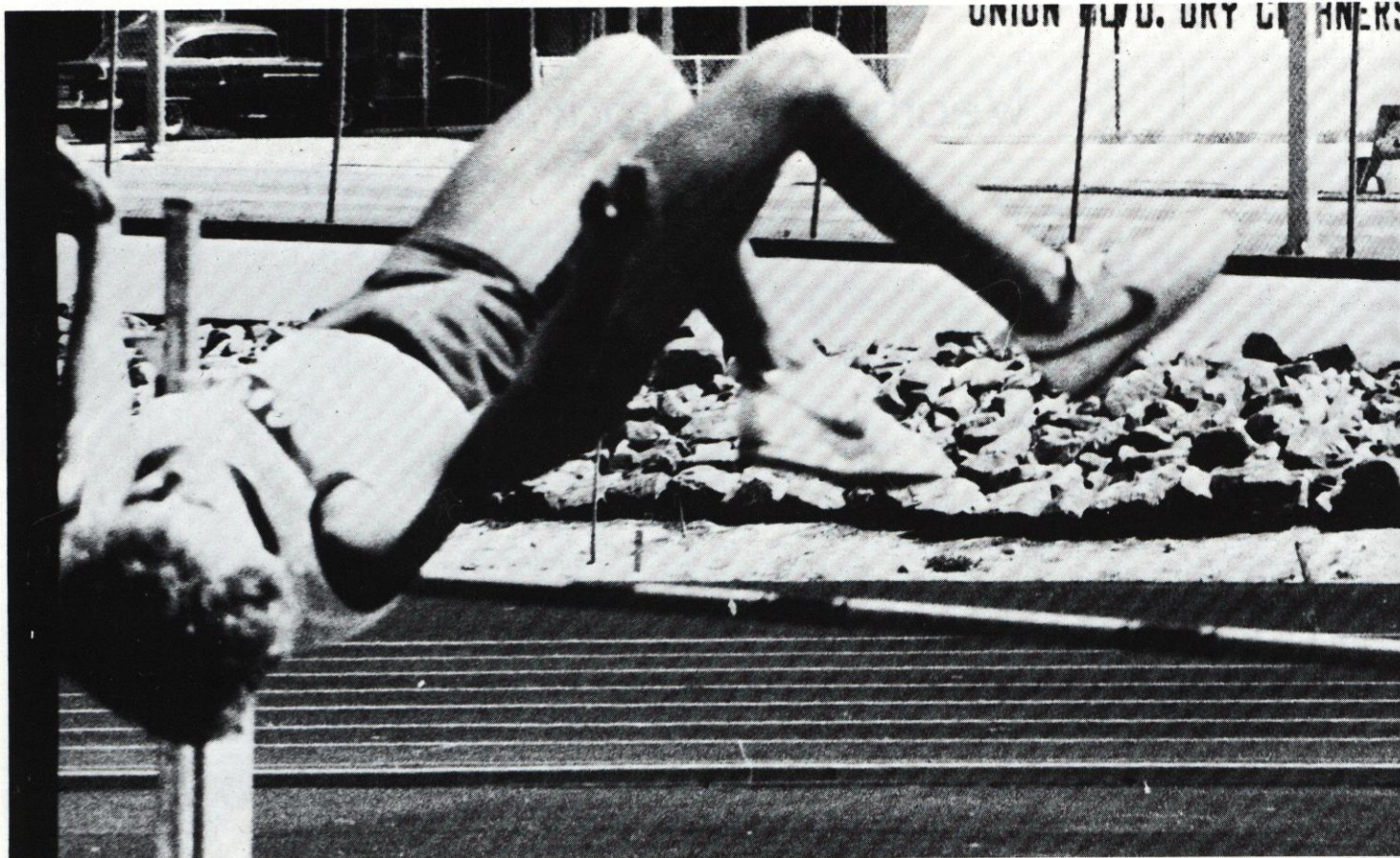

Two Chaffee County wrestlers were in the finals, Mark Rundle, who took on John Laird of Buena Vista. Rundle won a 7-5 decision.

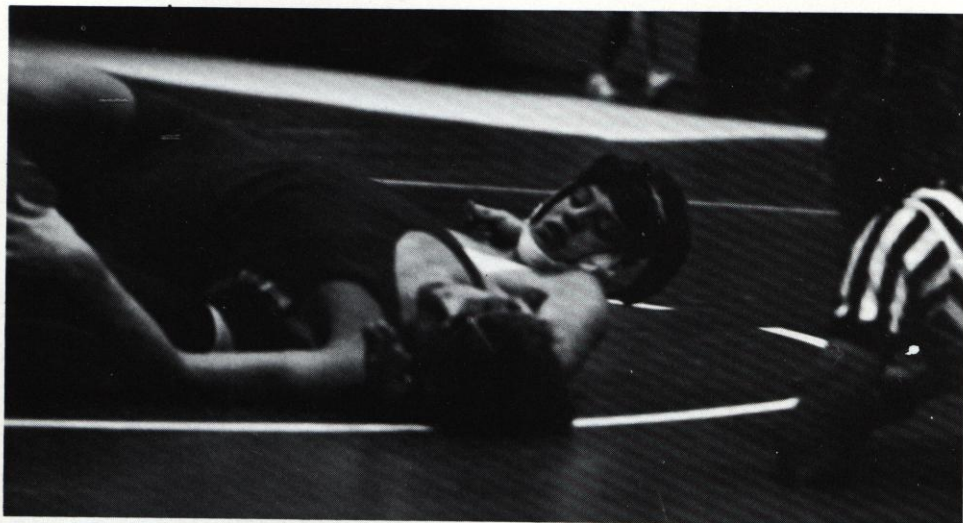

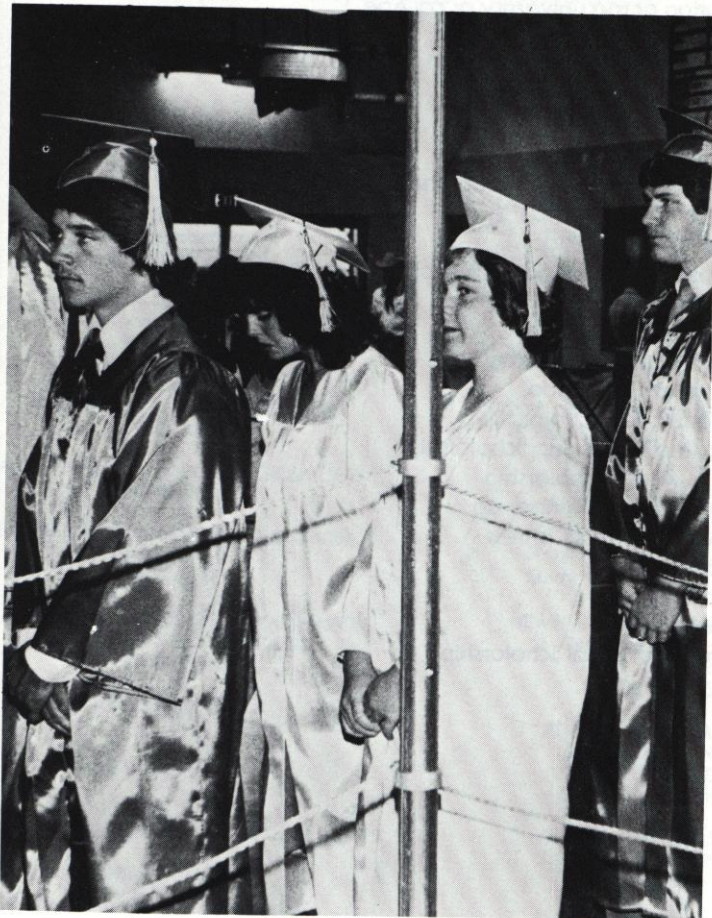
