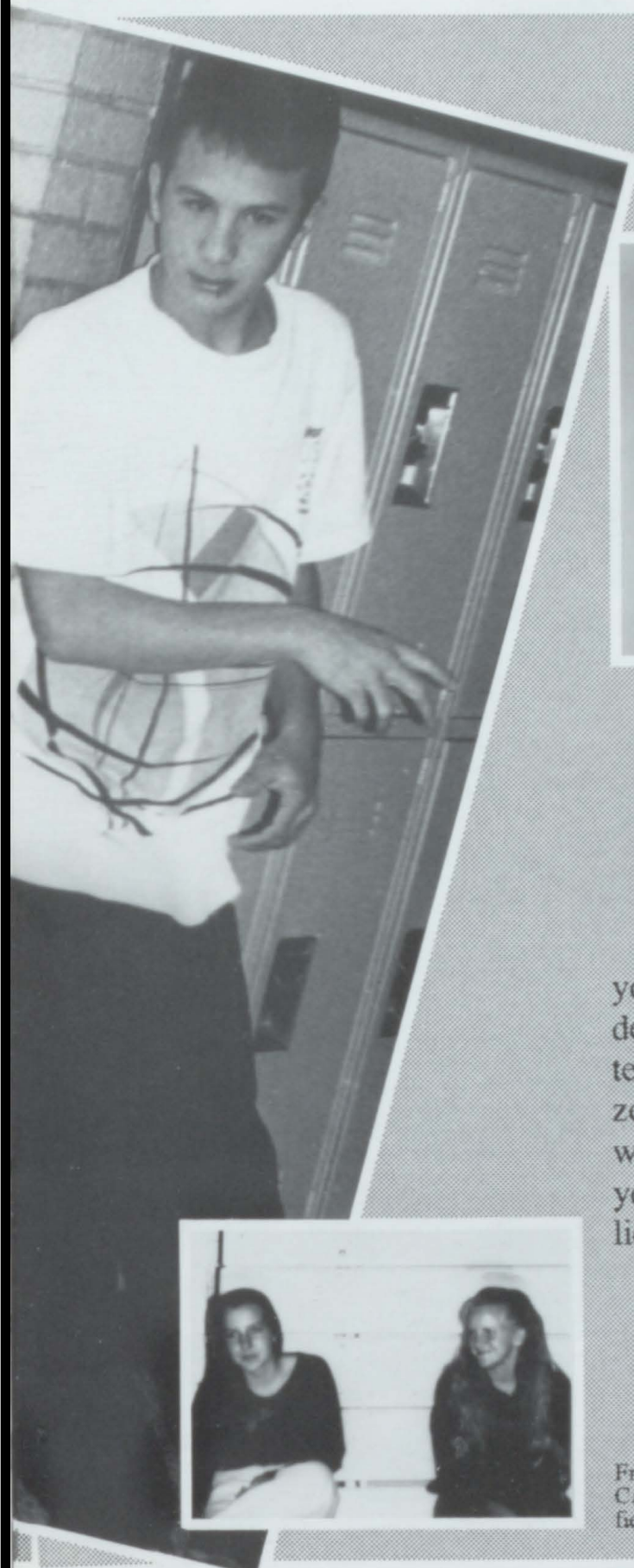

Take Another Look

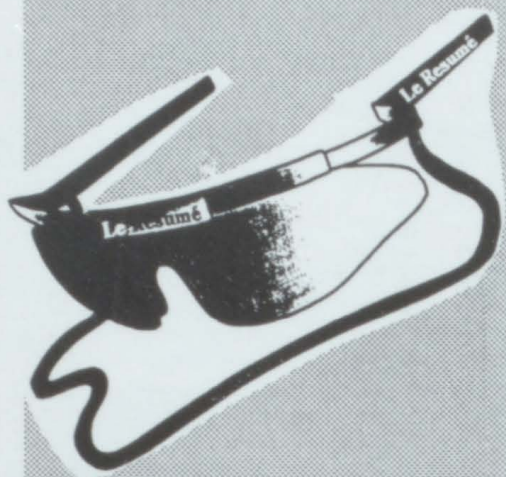

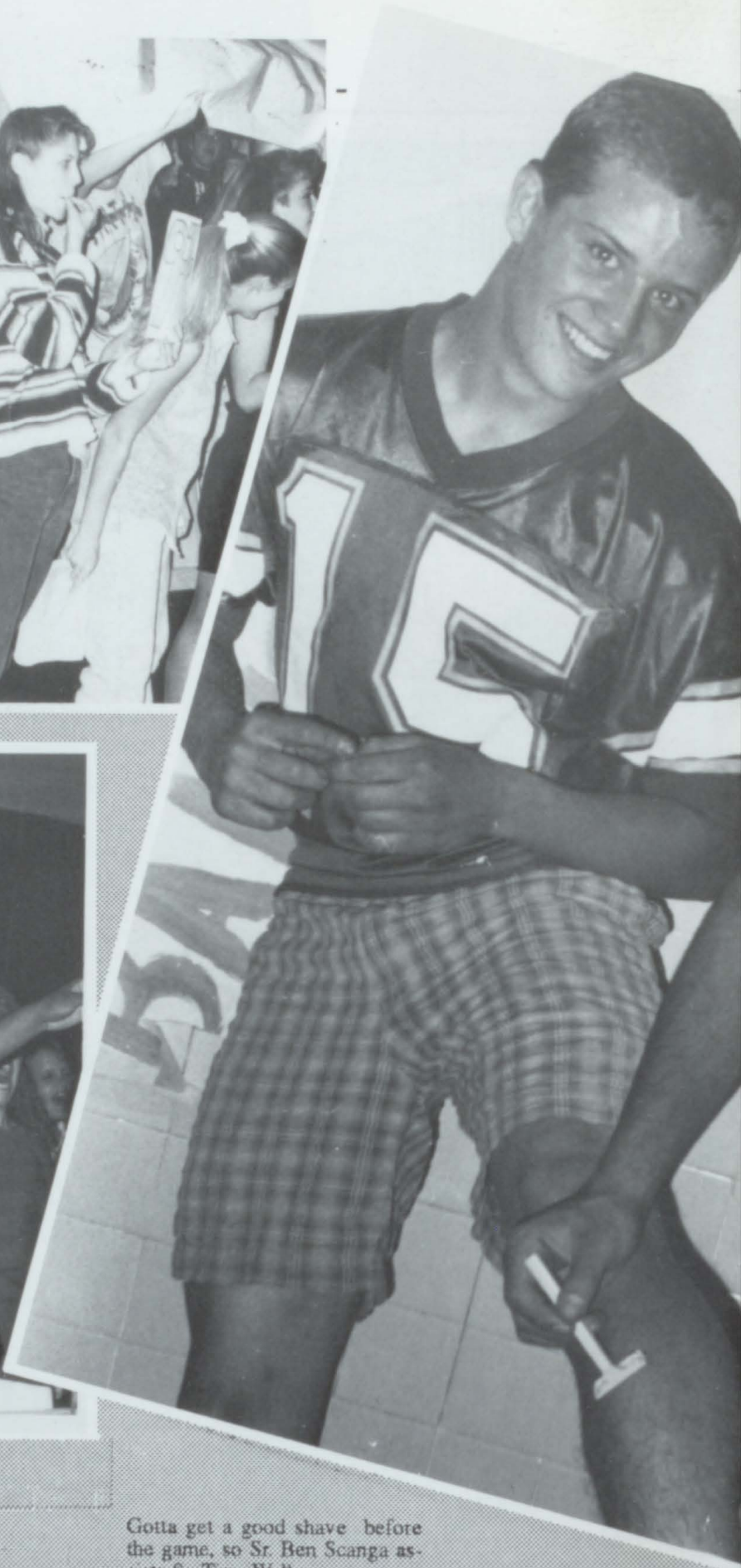

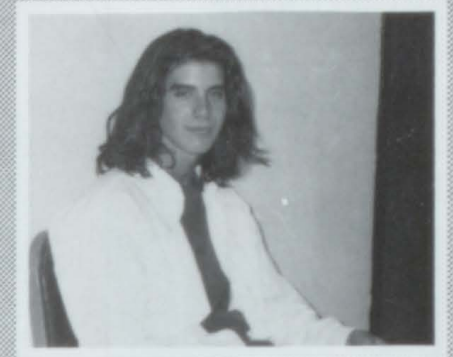

Looking Forward to Taking a Break

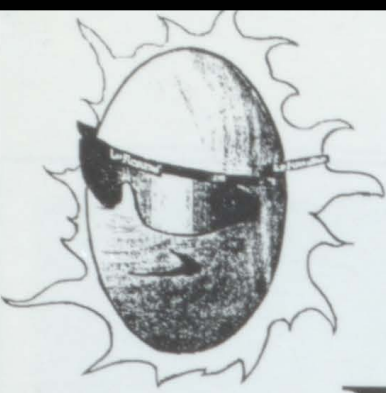

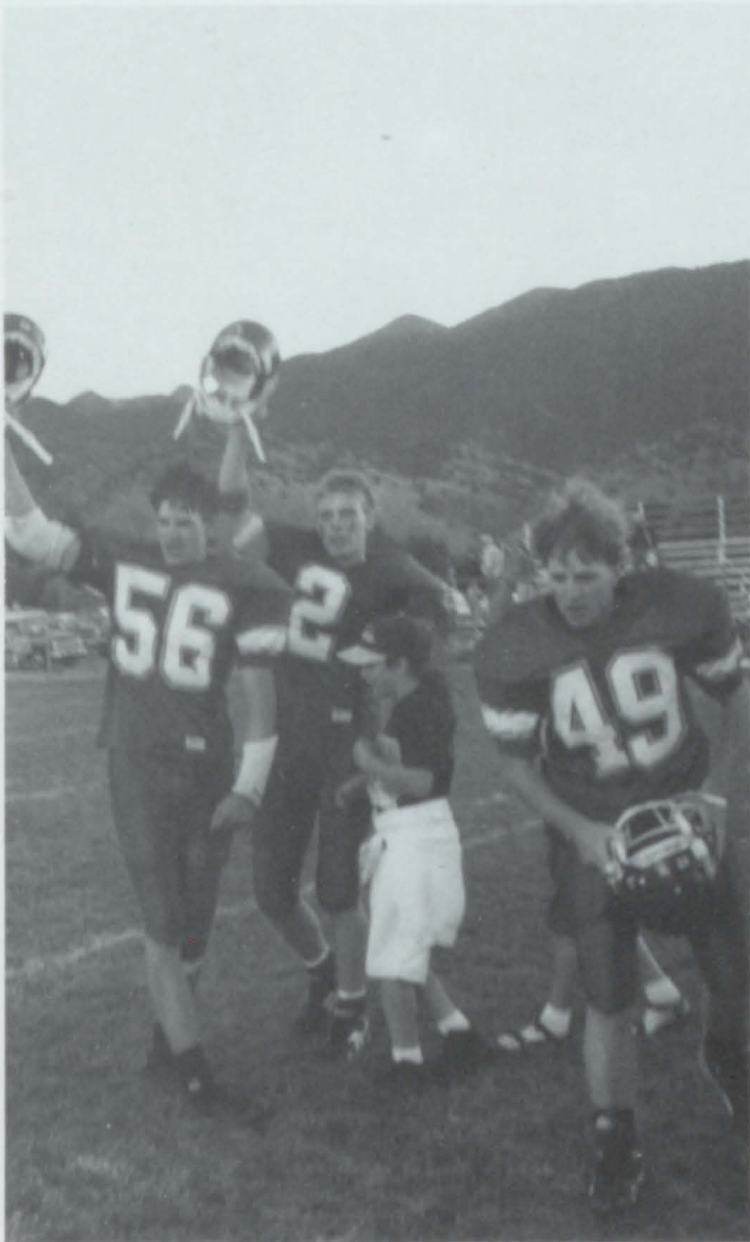

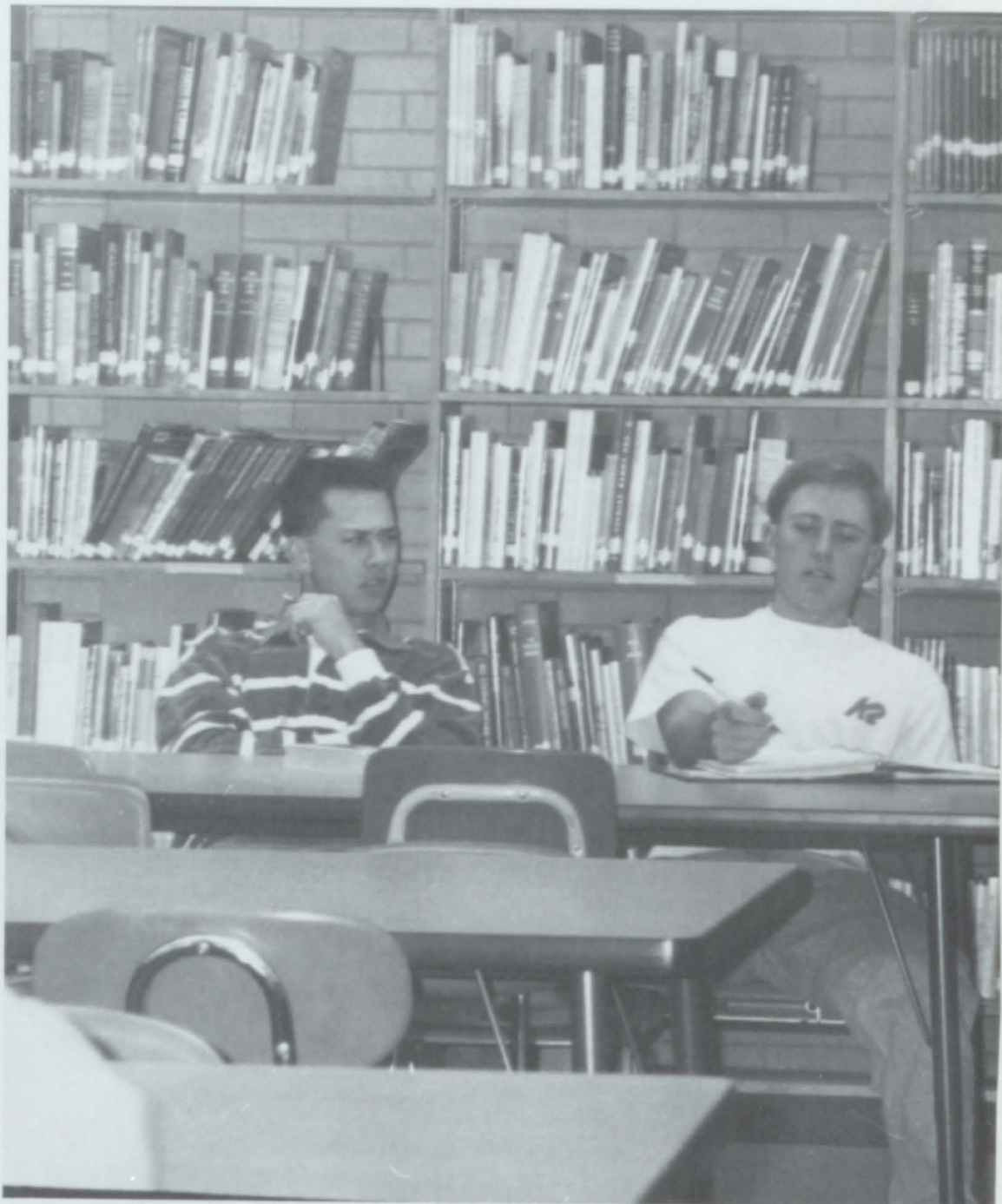
much needed win-the first Homecoming win in three years. Tim Walker's touchdown pass to Kyle Swartz and Jason Liswood's foot, were highlights

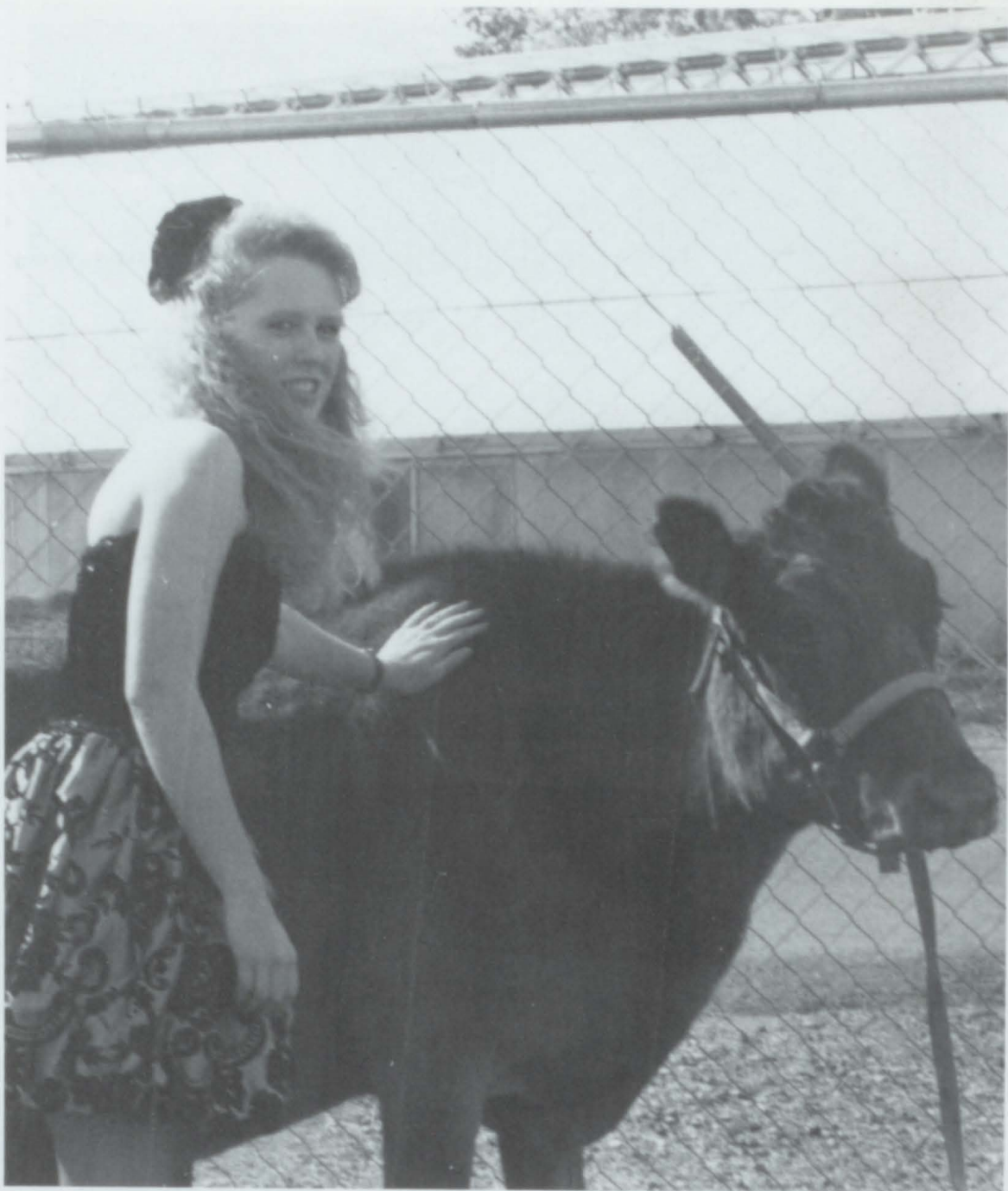
This past October, Scott and Jim attended seminars in Fort Collins

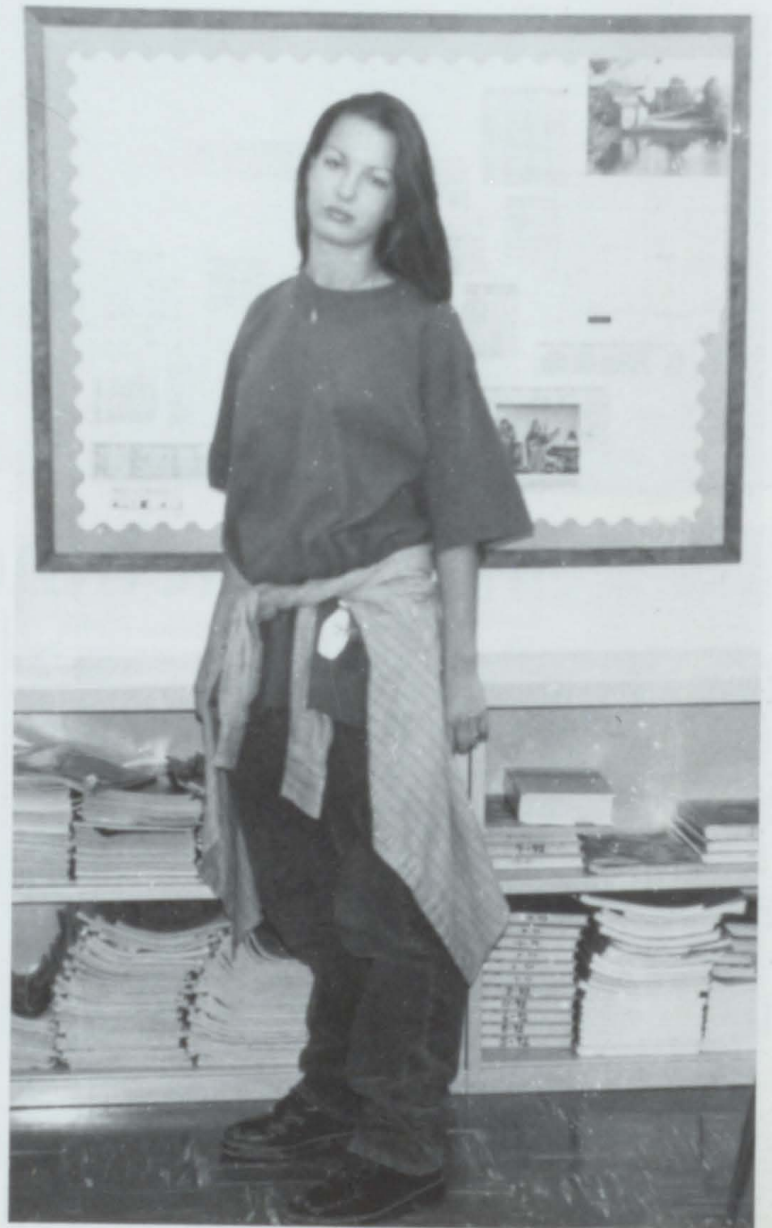

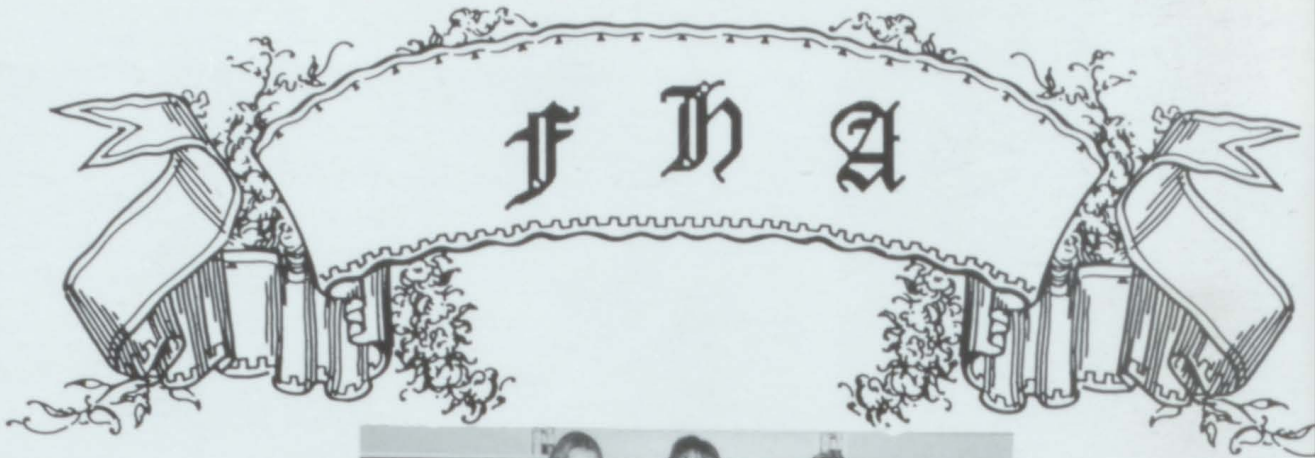

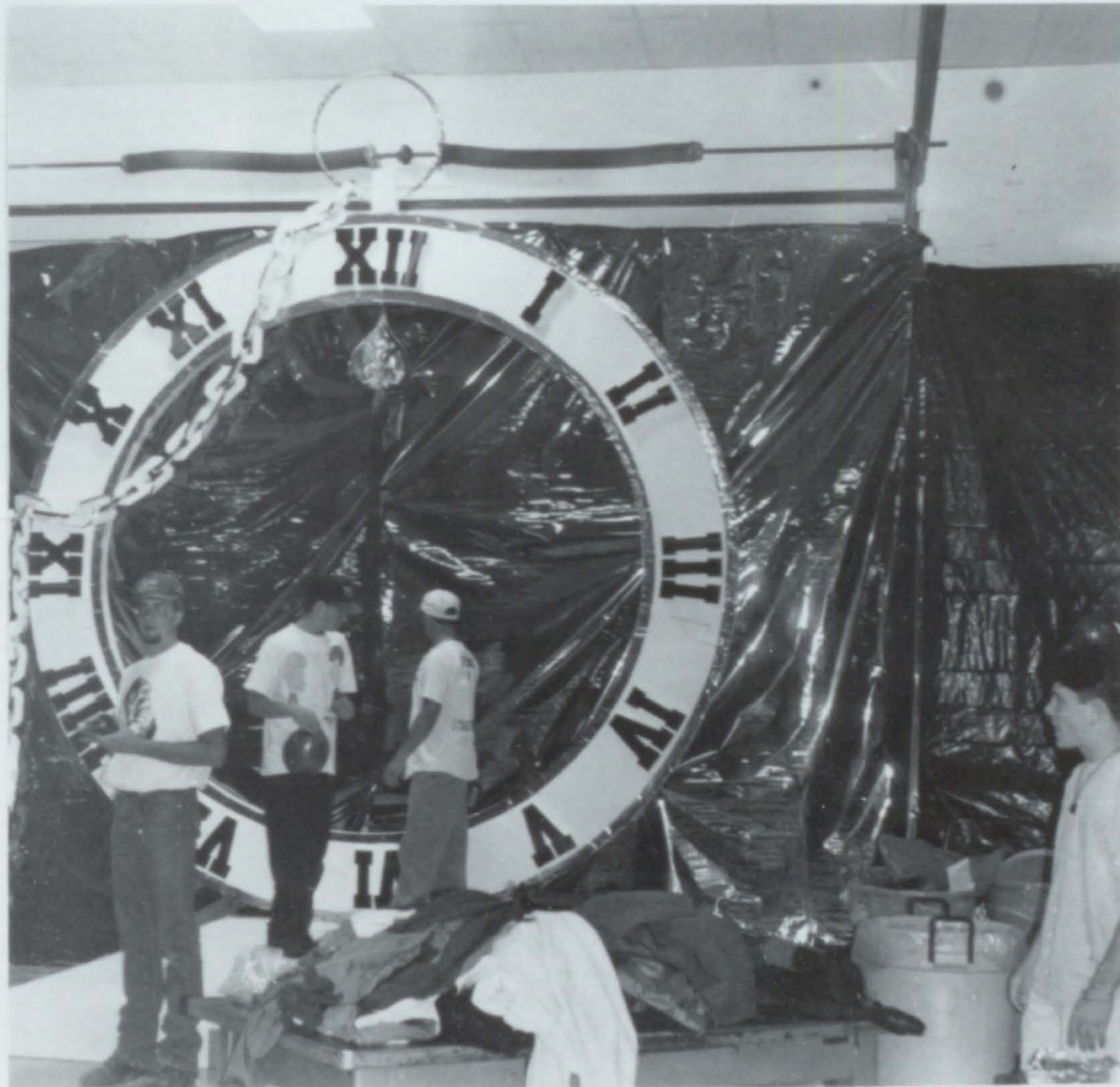

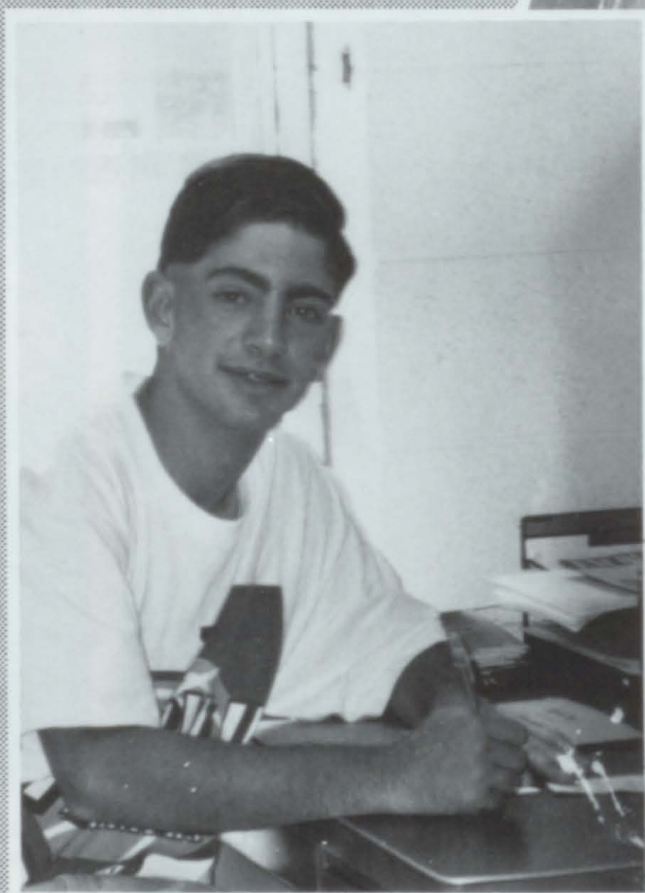

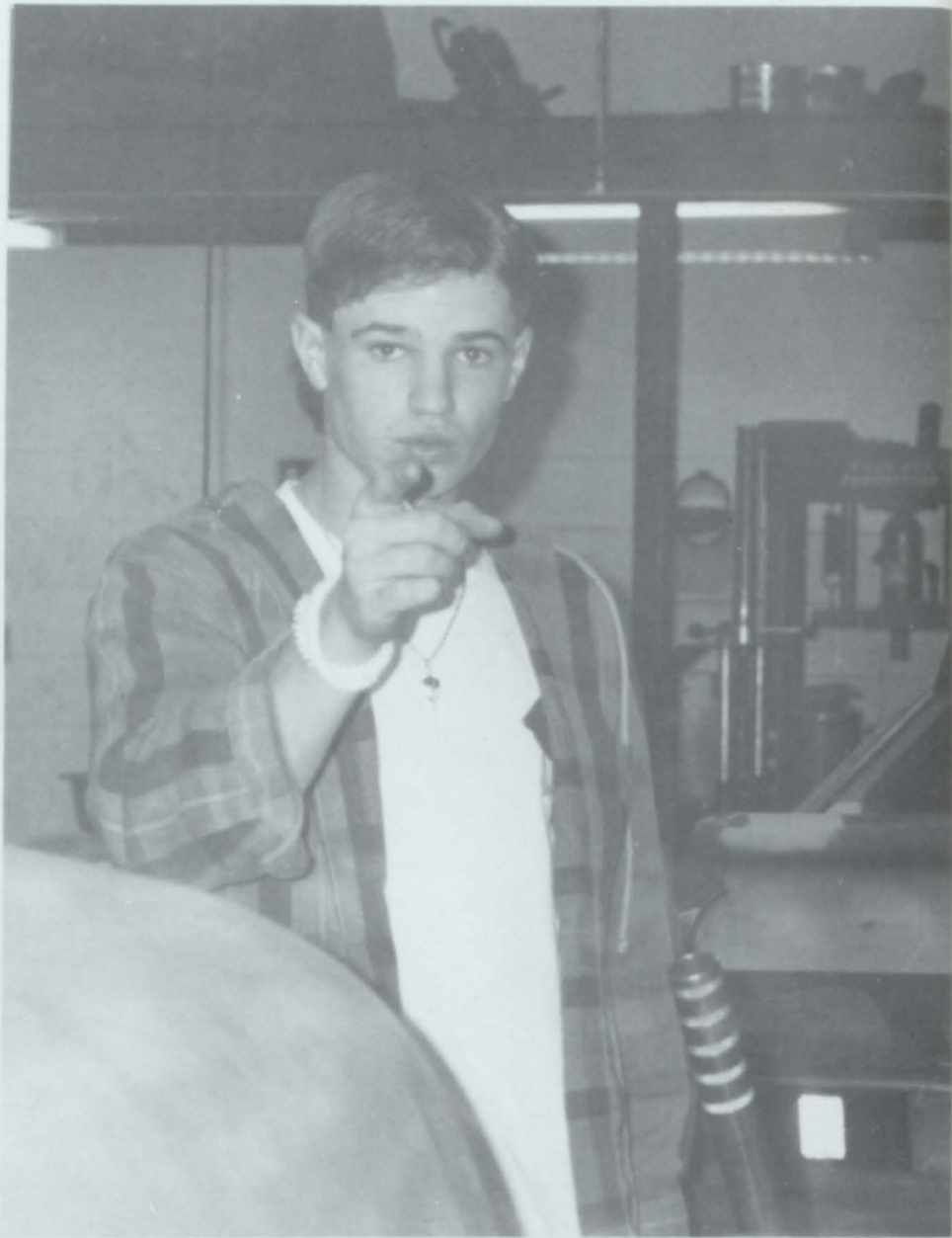

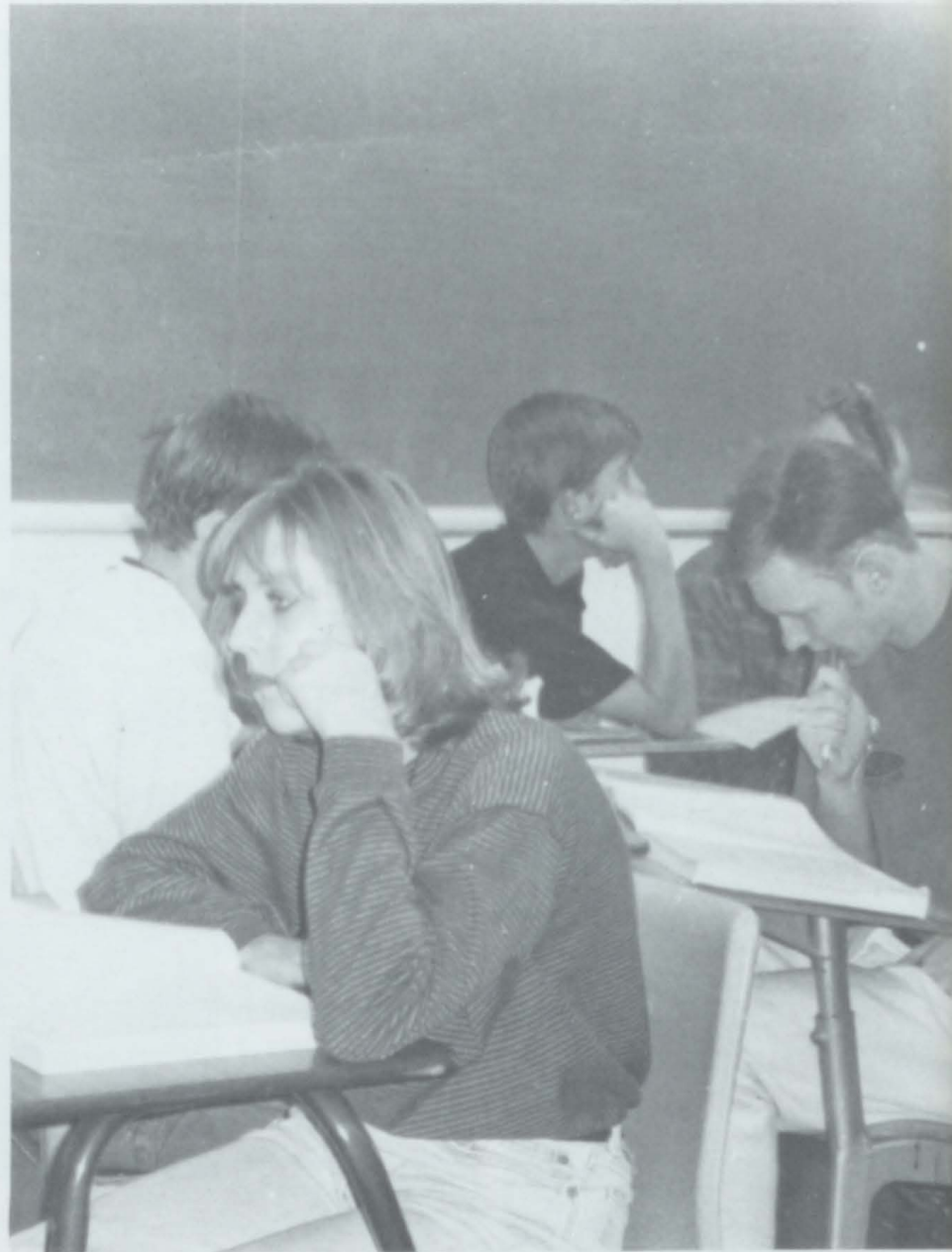

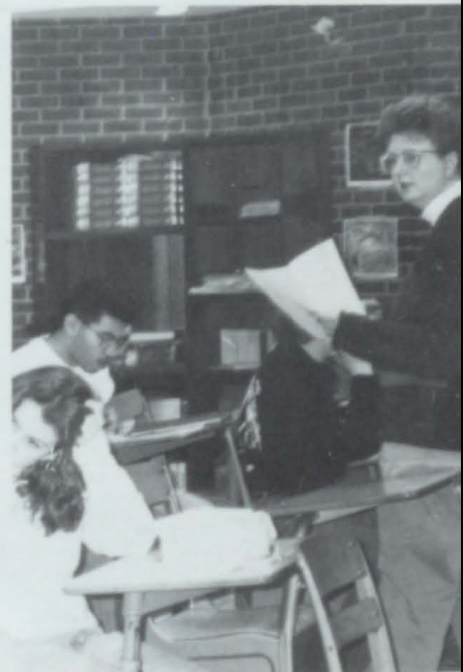

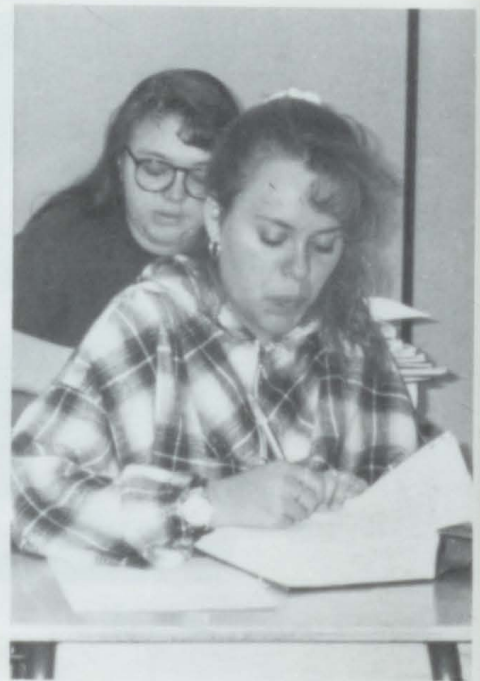

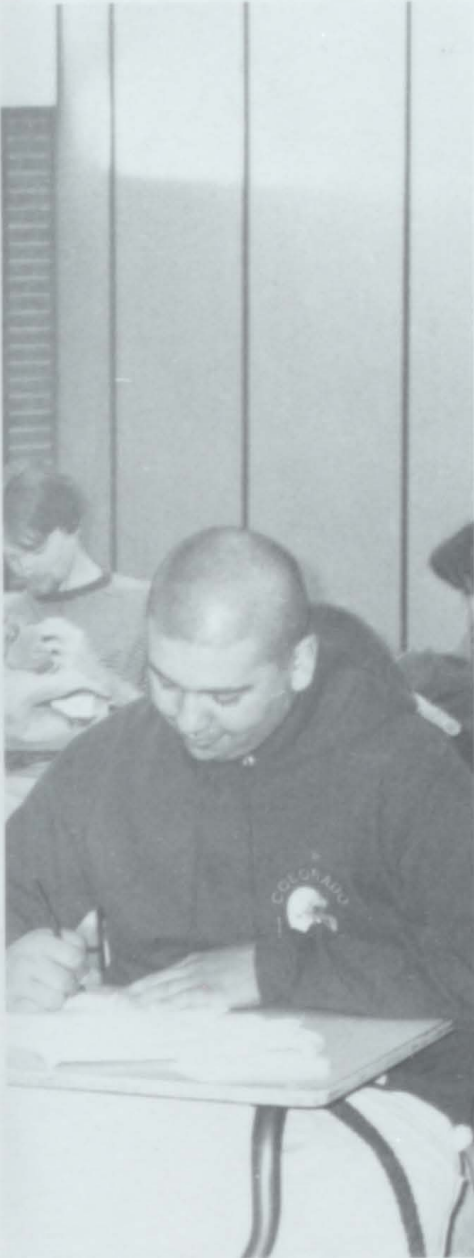

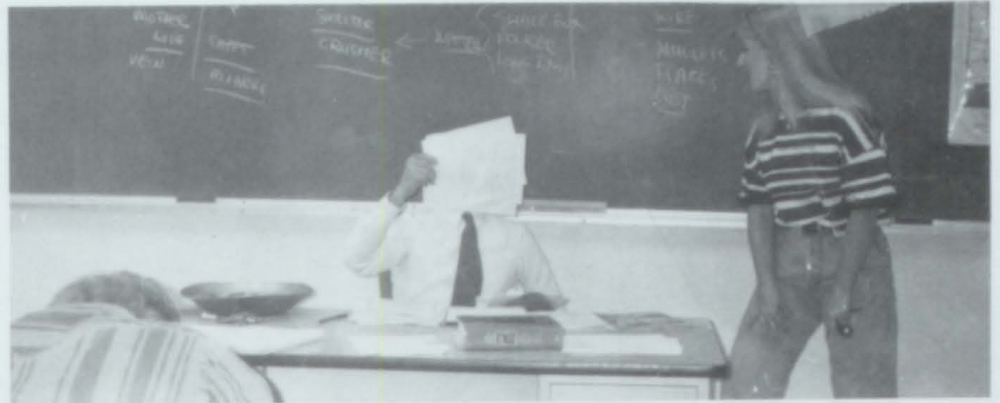

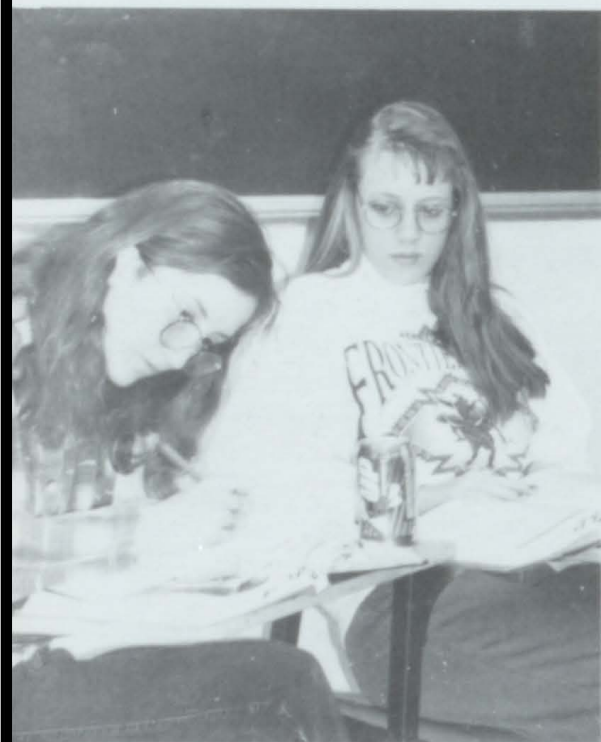

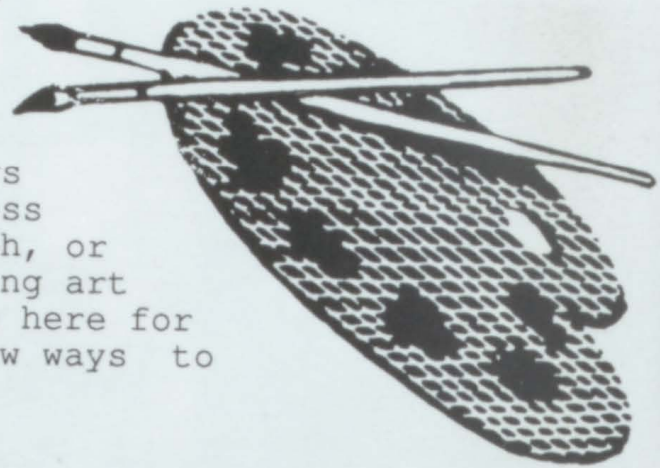


Art Lets You Express Yourself

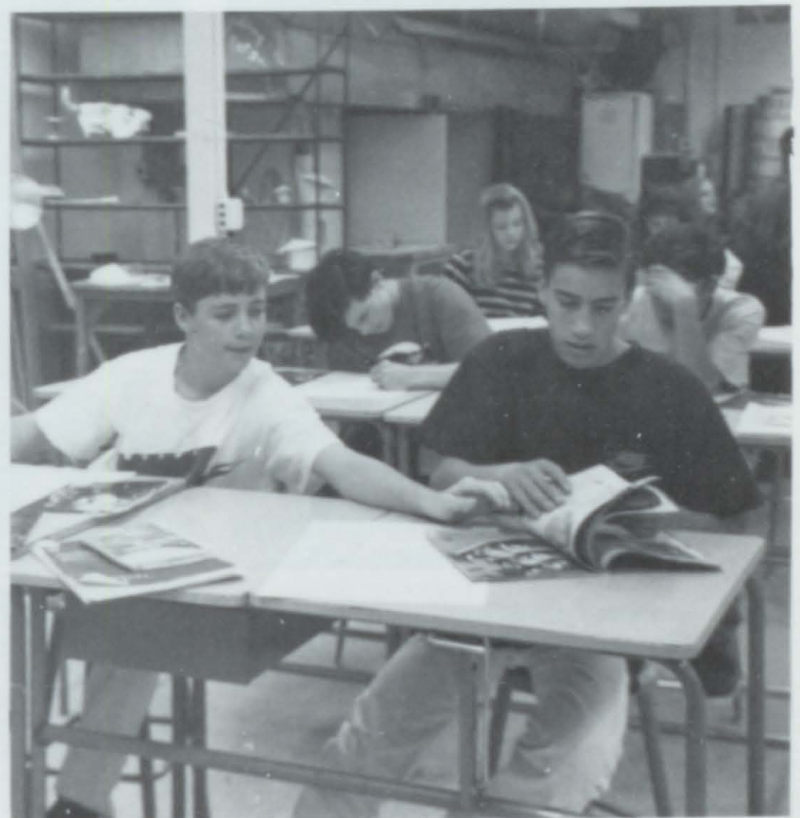

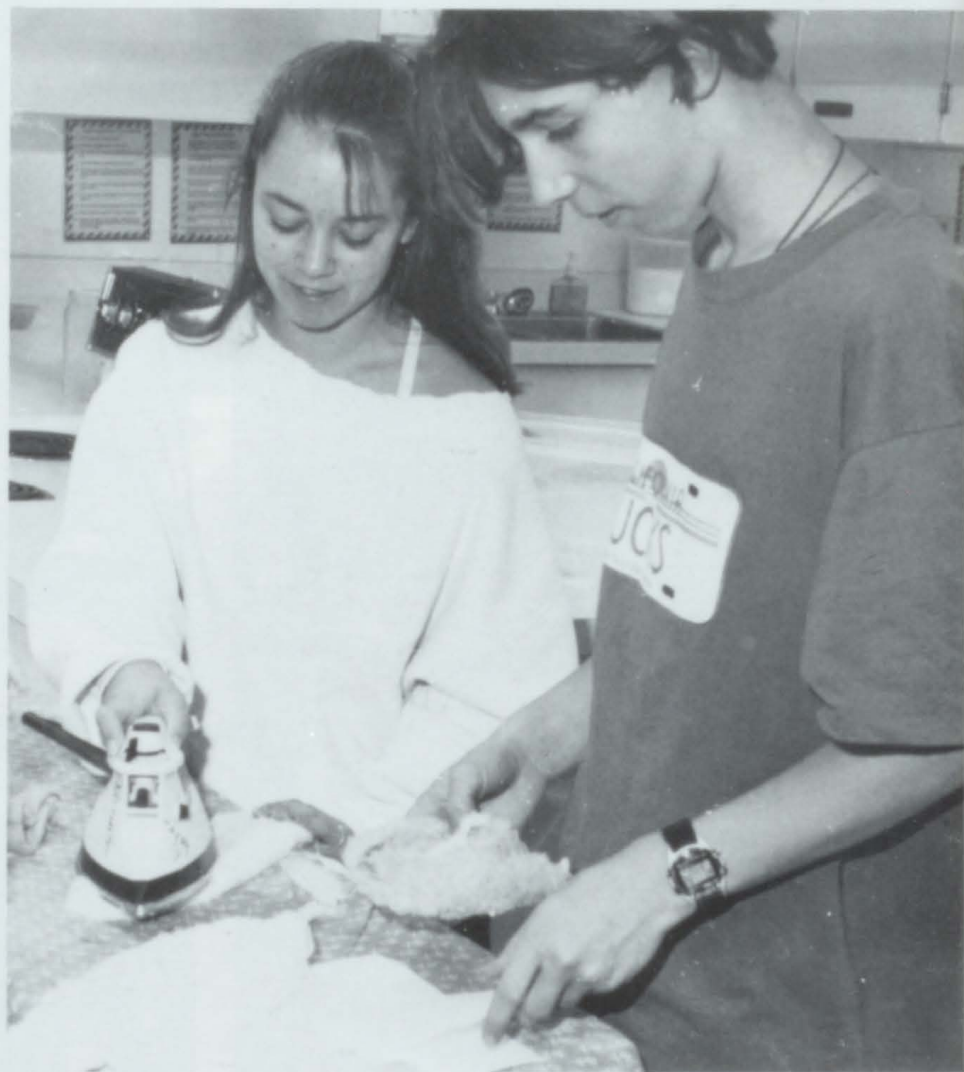

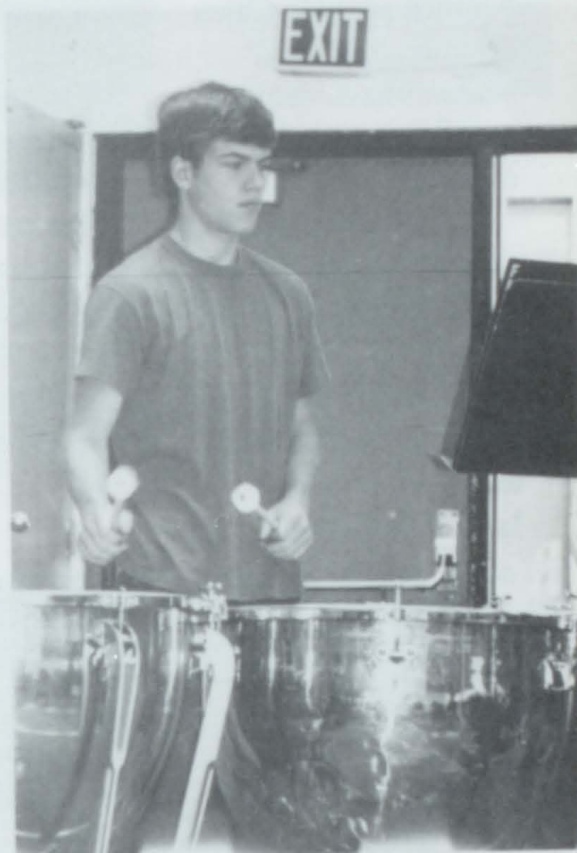

Anything from Applied Math to Calculus is available and students have varying opinions on these choices.

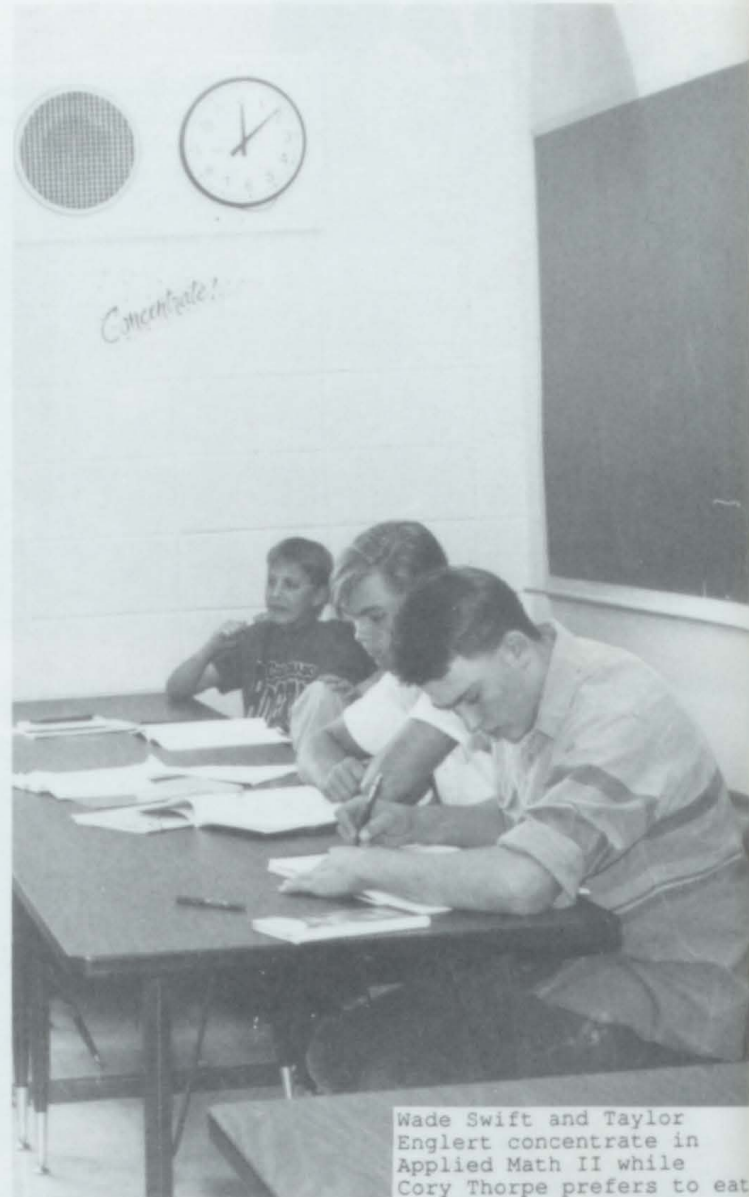

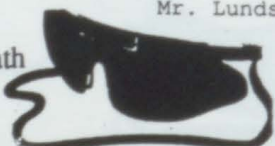

We have entered our last semester of our last year

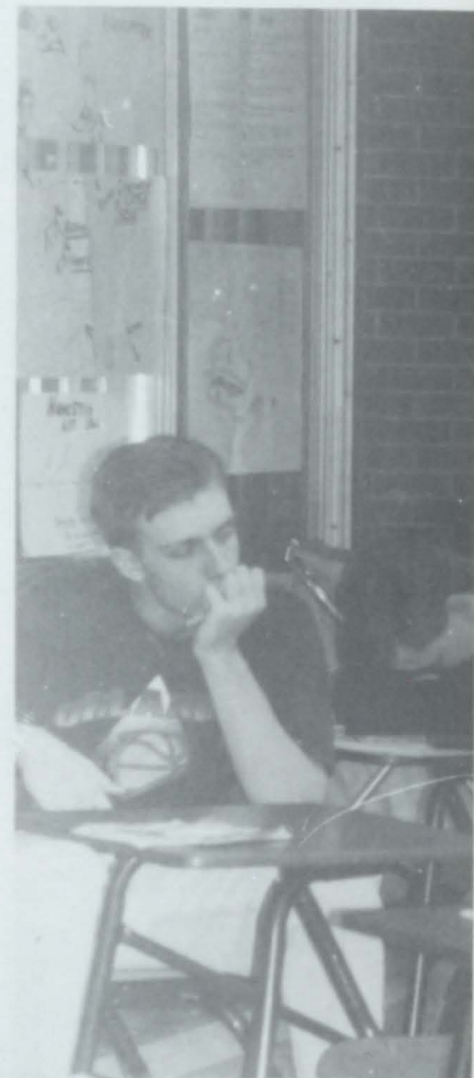
in Salida High School. A collage of our efforts will soon be reflected in awards, scholarships, or just graduating. All the assignments, and tests will have finally paid off, hopefully.

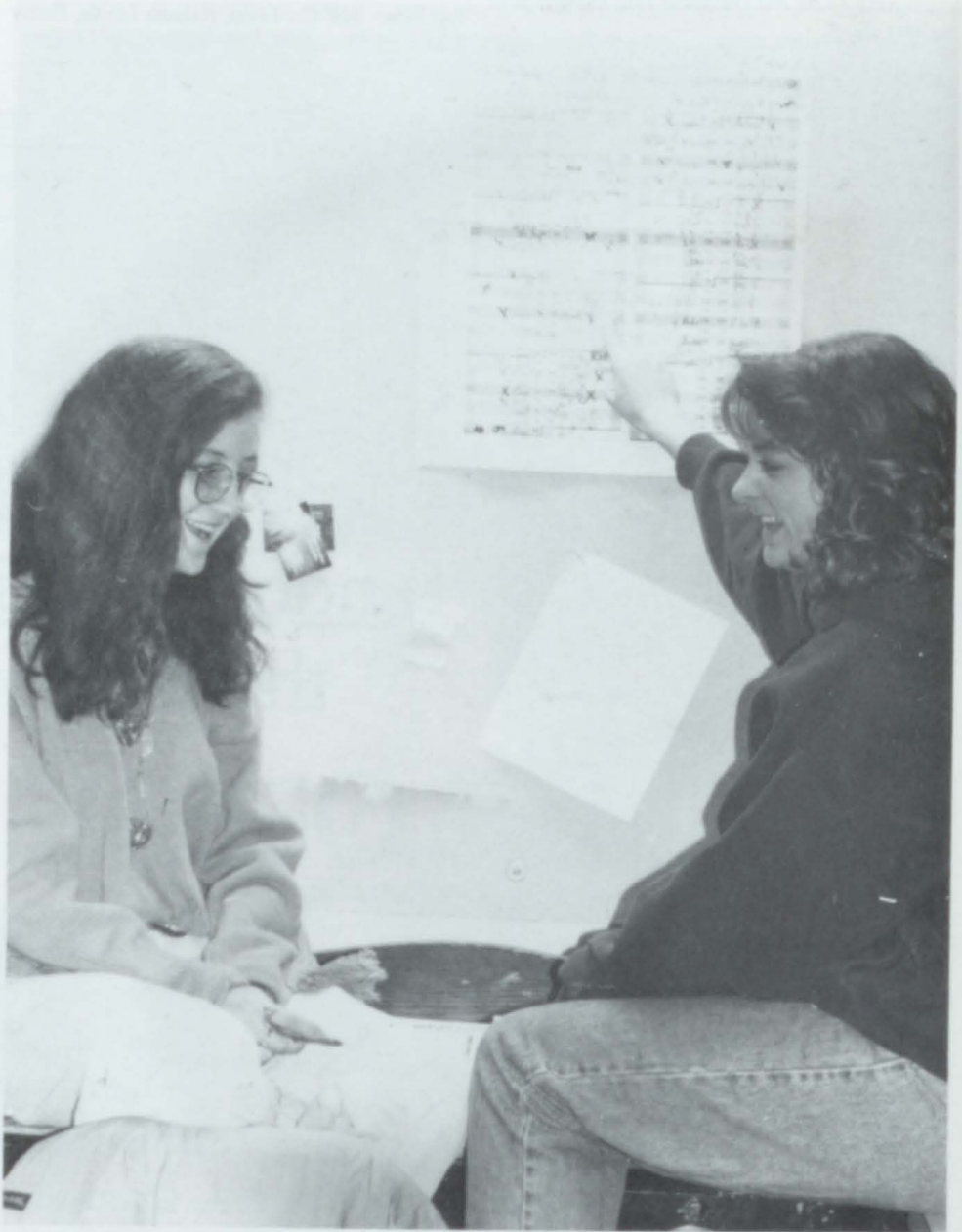

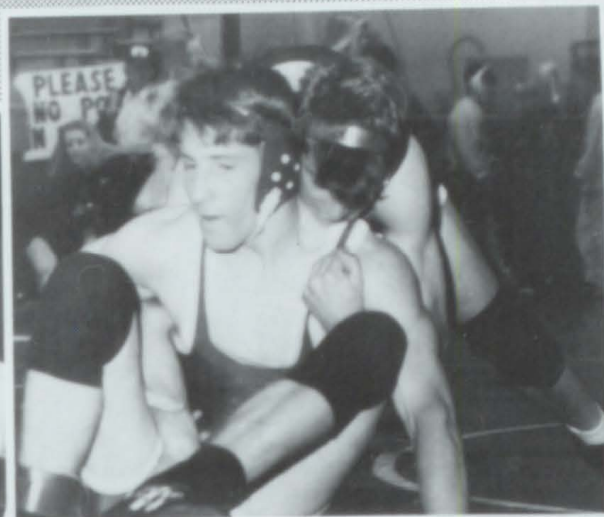

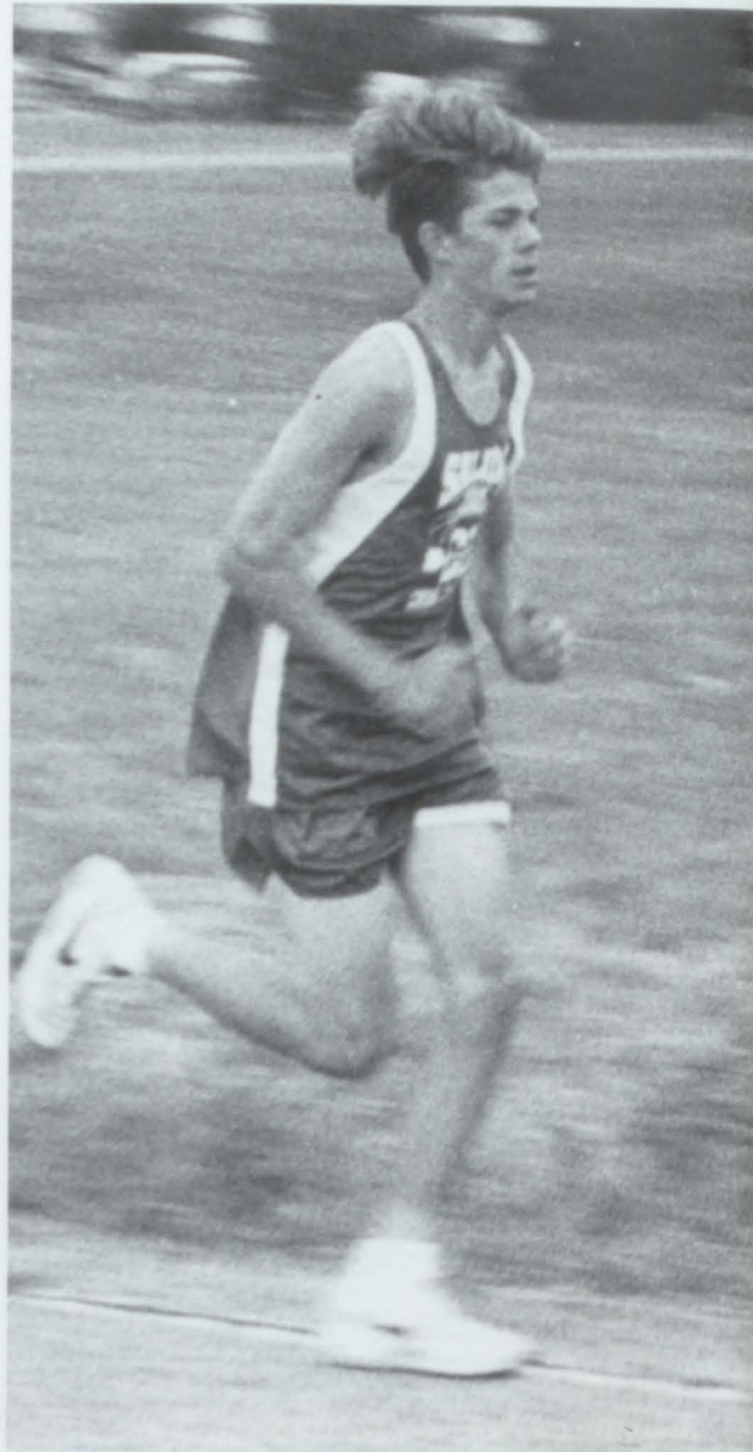

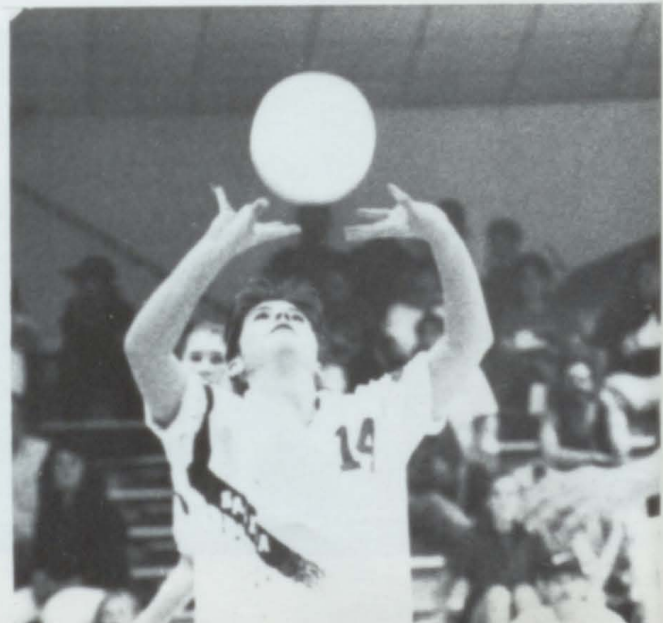

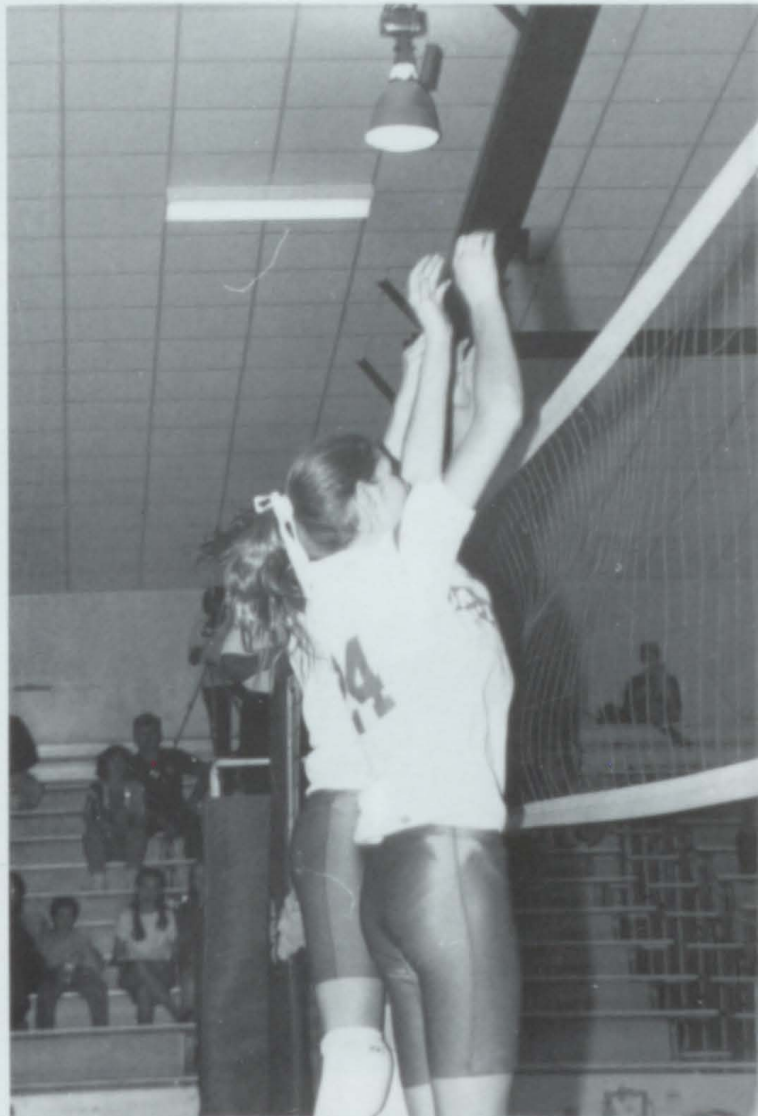

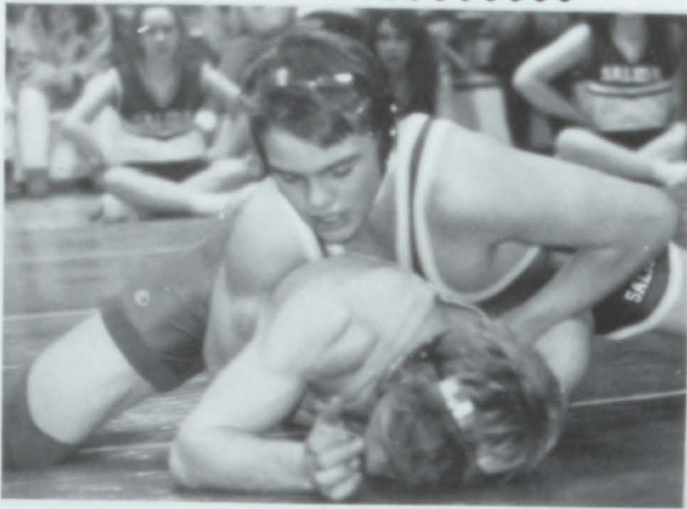

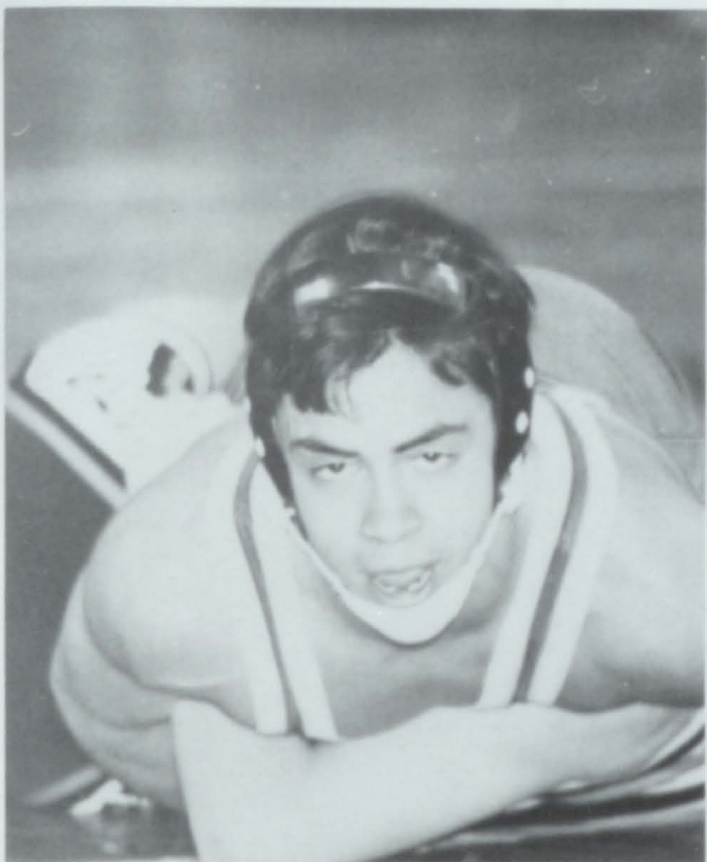

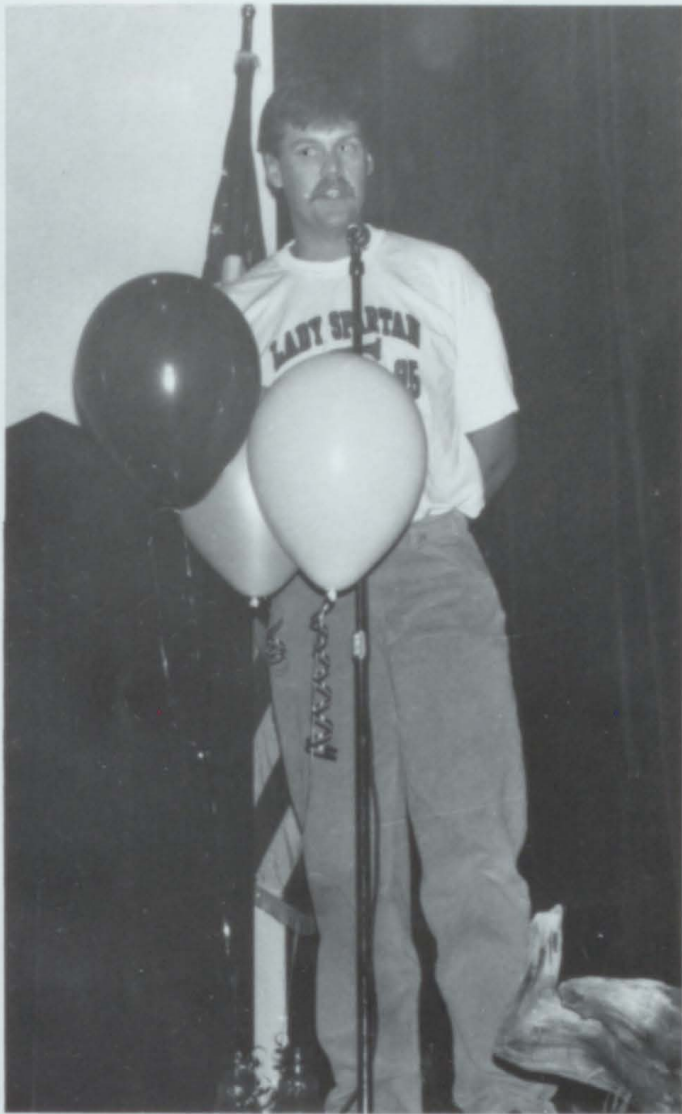

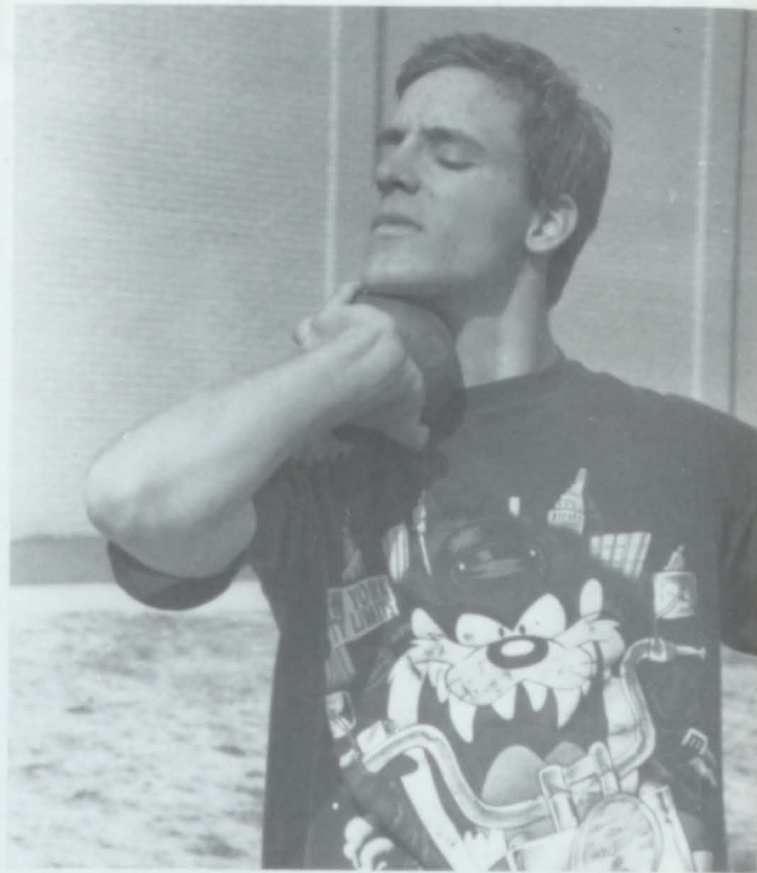
Lowe adds that perhaps the ones who improved the most were those who qualified for State. More boys qualified this year than in the past three years.

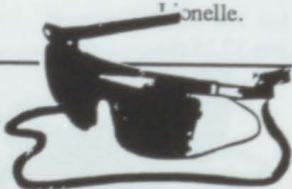

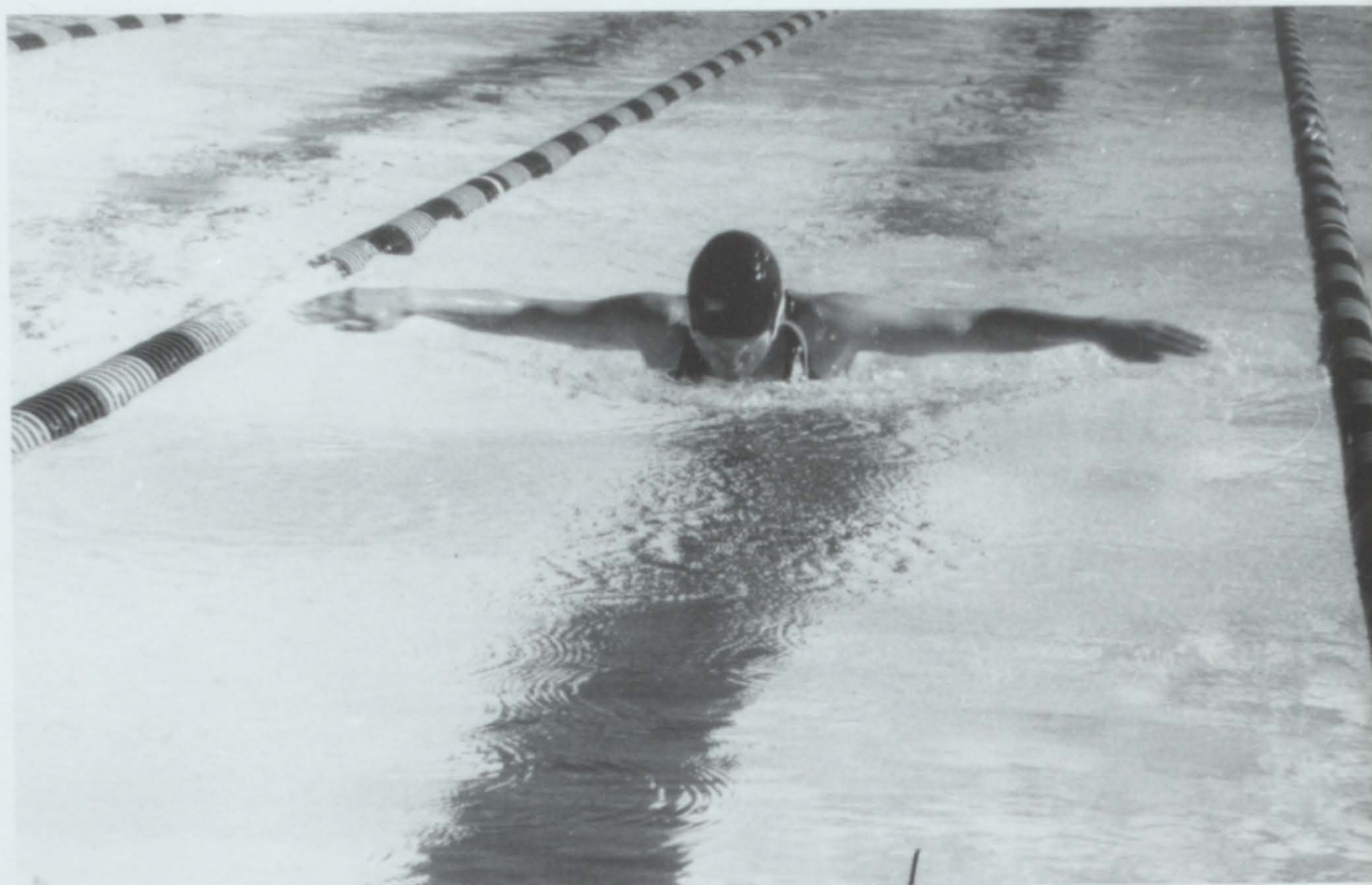

Tennis Team Takes Home 5th at Regionals

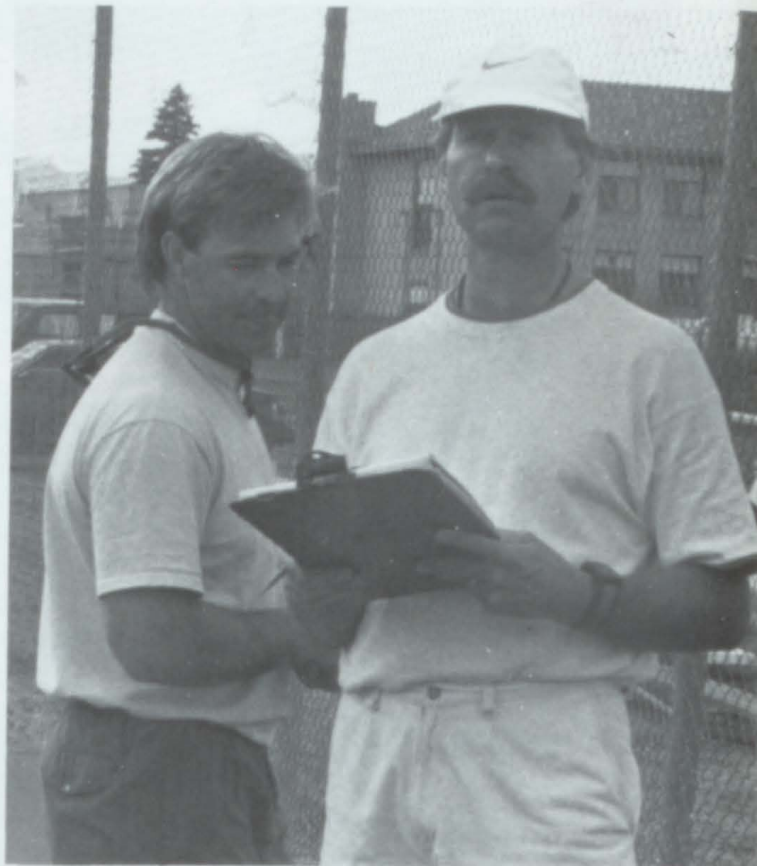

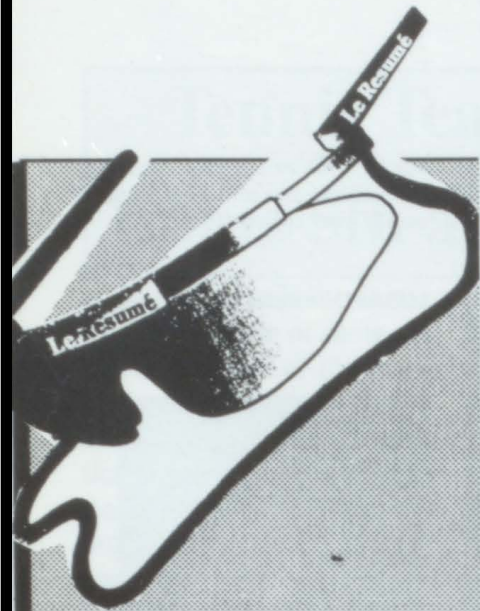

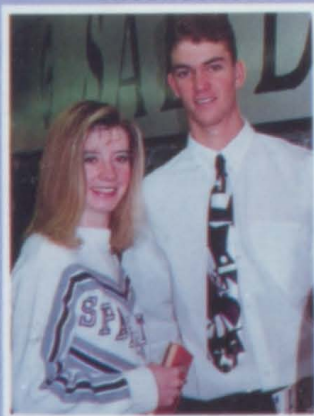
As we count down the days to graduation, there are a lot of mixed feelings. Most of us can't wait, but there are some who don't want our Senior year to go by so fast.
