




steps together

For girls, flexible-comb headbands and velvet shirts were in along with baggy jeans and controverisal crop tops. Corduroy is also once again popular for both guys and girls.


With the Broncos and the Avalanche going to the playoffs last year, Avs jerseys and the Broncos' new logo and colors were also big.



The money we make goes many ways. We pay car insurance, bills, and it always feels like our cars need gas



We stepped into the halls of SHS not knowing what the next four years would be likeand not expecting them to pass us by so quickly.





As the new choir teacher, Ms. Vargo, started a new year of teaching in Colorado she stated, "The teaching methods aren't that much different than in Kansas."


Ms. Vargo says she enjoys teaching her choir class. "I'm working with a lot of talent." She's trying different approaches from last year, such as more variety of musical styles.









New Coach Brings New Direction







points in the fourth quarter alone which led to the defeat of the Lions, 64-57.












