Counting on the Experience

This year the cooperative learning class is thinking of changing its name to Work-Based Learning. "This is to describe the course better and to comply with the School to Careers Program that Salida High School is a part of," said Mrs. Sanger, teacher of this class.

Students must go through the process of filling out an application and also undergo an interview with their prospective employer. After they are accepted for the job, the students will go to local participating businesses to work at entry level positions, while at the same time, gaining new and valuable skills. The students also receive evaluations from their employers from which their grade is based.

The program is a big part of being a senior. Students work two periods a day, and receive credit. Over 100 businesses have participated in this hands on training program at one time or another. The success of the program has depended on the involvement of the employers and their willingness to work with our students. Currently, 17 seniors are active in Work-Based Learning.

Sr. Poppy Wyble who works at the <u>Mountain Mail</u> commented that, "It is really good experience. I edit articles, do headlines and input editorials. The special assignments are my own articles and they're the most fun. I will definitely use these skills in my future." Wyble intends to major in mass communications or broadcasting at USC next year.

In order to graduate from SHS, students need three credits of social studies. These credits can come from a wide selection of courses. Beginning next year, freshmen will be required to take a geography course offered through the social studies department.

According to Dave Sanger, history teacher, we have to have this course because of the state standards. Students will need this class to graduate. He believes this course will align the social studies department with more of a global approach to teaching history. The geography class will emphasize the 20th century, whereas American History will concentrate on the 19th century.

The standards in the social studies department are set very high. "The girls and boys p.e. classes were segrated with the girls in Larimer gym and the boys in the fieldhouse. Girls athletics had little or no money in the budget. We paid for our own uniforms and meals, even though Salida produced some of the best teams in the state. I was head coach of gymnastics, basketball, and track; and I also sponsored pep club, cheerleaders, and the girls letter club and was paid very little or nothing for these duties. It wasn't until Title IX became a law that inequities were addressed." Thankfully, **times** have changed.

Furthermore, Mrs. Kerrigan who has been in our district for 22 years, has also seen her share of changes in the home economics department. Due in part from the help of previous principal Mr. John Ophus, Mrs. Kerrigan was able to gain vocational funding for several of her classes including Relationships, Independent Living and Parenting. All of her classes now are on a semester basis. Interestingly however, this is the first year that she does not have a guy in her clothing classes. She wonders if things are going full circle with guys participation in home economics classes. "I've always had guys in my classes. They've always taken these classes since being allowed to in the late 60's. This year there are no guys in clothing and only one in Fiber Arts." At least in these times, there is equity in both p.e. classes and the home economics classes. It's hard to imagine now a time when classes were different.
