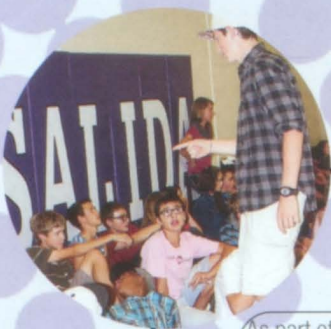

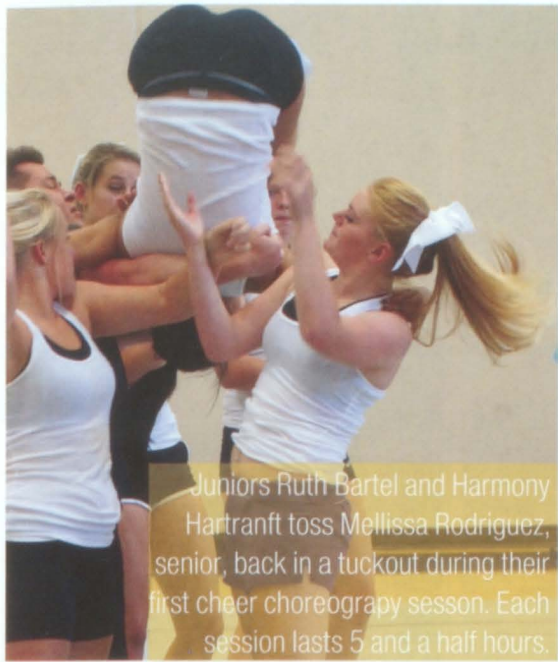

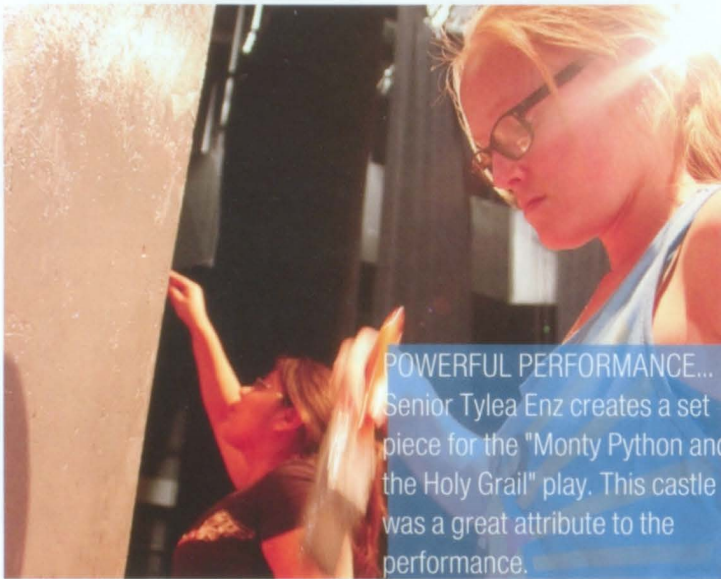

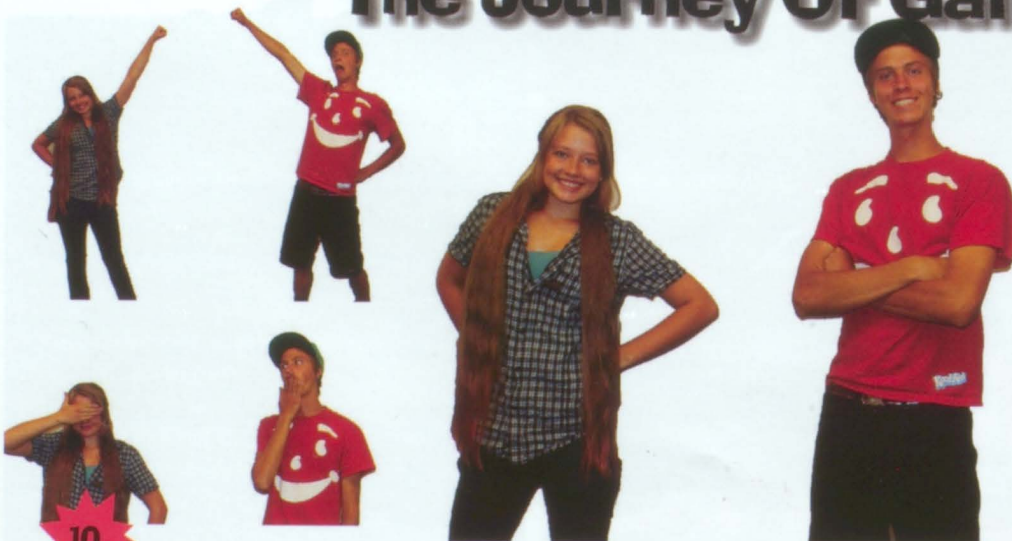

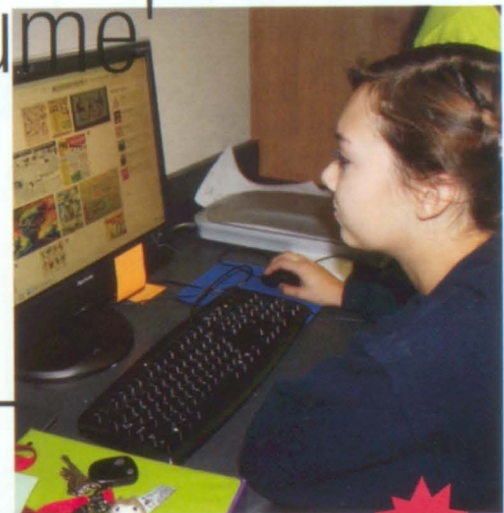


# Tenderfoot VS LeResume'

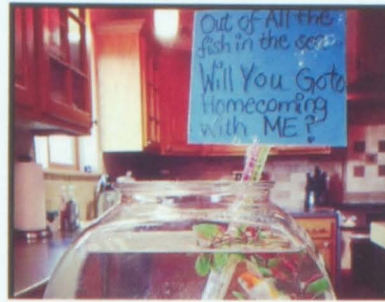
Freshman John Fontana was persuaded to play golf by junior Clay Hiser. This is John's first year ever playing golf, but he is a key part of the team.

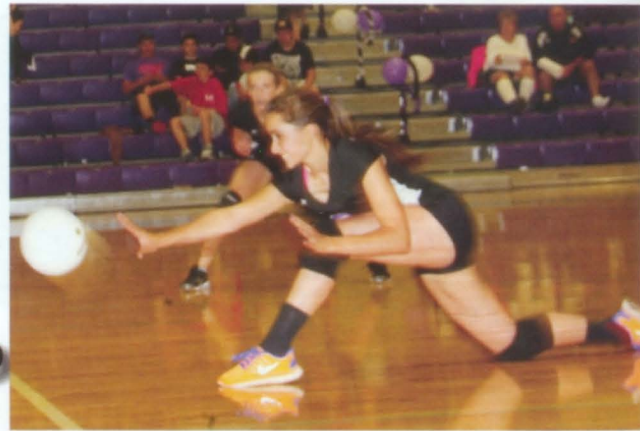

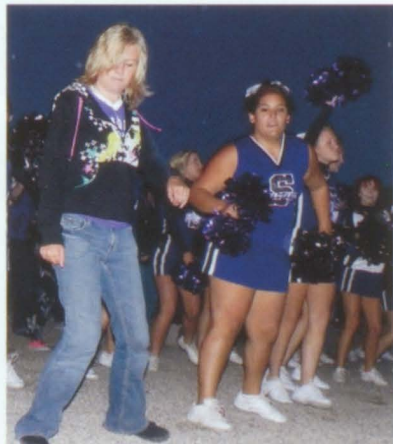

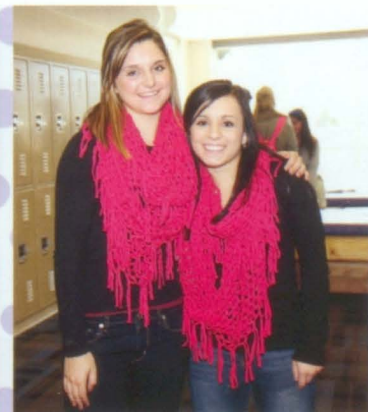

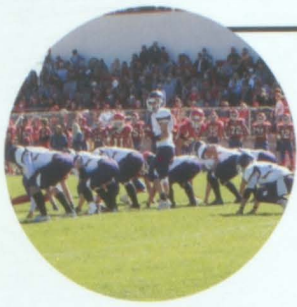


"The perks of working at the theater is that I get free popcorn and movies," says Nick Mann, junior, about working at the Storyville Cinema. Mann has been employed there for four years.

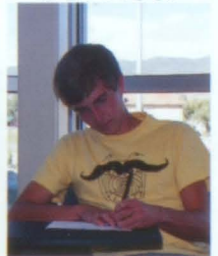

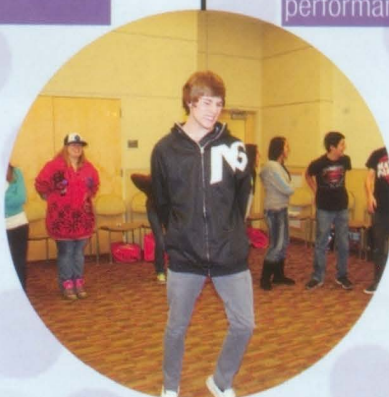

Monday, September 30th will always be remembered as a day of tragedy by both students of SHS, and BVHS. That morning around 11:00 a.m., coaches Dwayne Johnson and Dawna Johnson and their 18-year old daughter Kiowa Johnson's lives were taken in a tragic rockslide near the top of Agnes Vaille Falls hiking trail. 13-year old Gracie Johnson, the lone survivor of the slide, was immediately flown to Children's Hospital where she received treatment for multiple injuries both internal and external. As important members of the community, the Johnson's touched many people's lives, and many community members stepped up to support the remaining family members. Orange and gray, Kiowa and Gracie Johnson's favorite colors, were popular among high school students for the remainder of the week. When it came time for the Salida vs. BV volleyball game, there were no Demons in red, or Spartans in purple, just Chaffee County members clothed in orange with red ribbons pinned above their hearts. Posters created and signed by SHS students hung on the walls in support of BVHS students, and the proceeds from the volleyball game, as well as those from the other Salida sporting events that weekend went to the Johnson Family Fund.

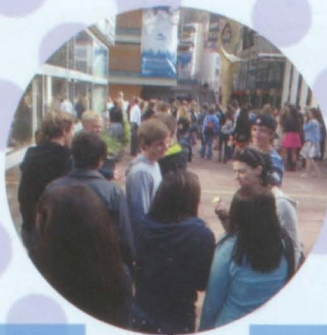

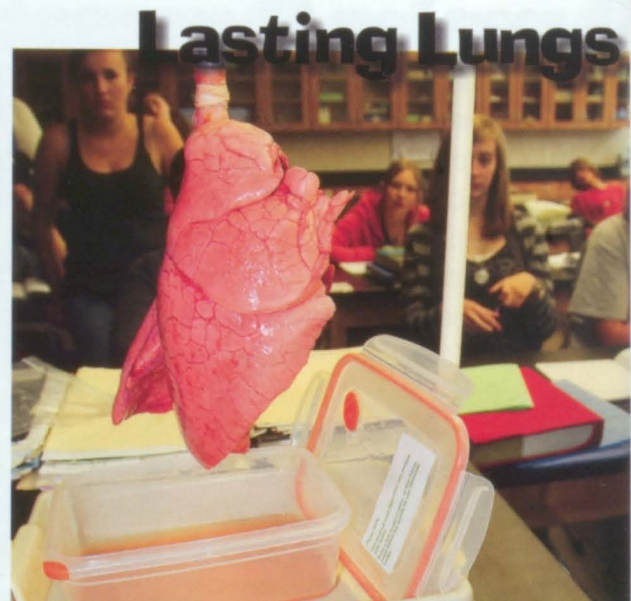
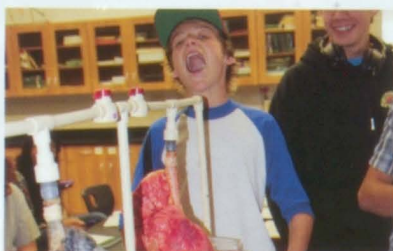
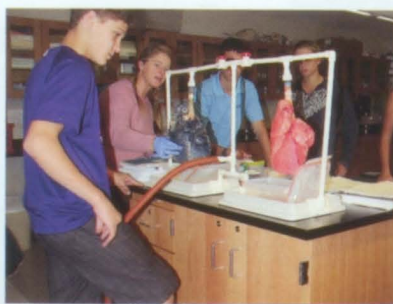
## A Tragic Hero

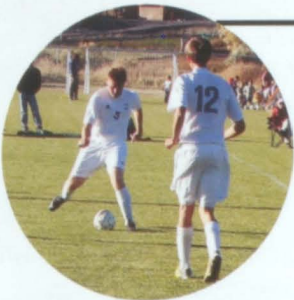

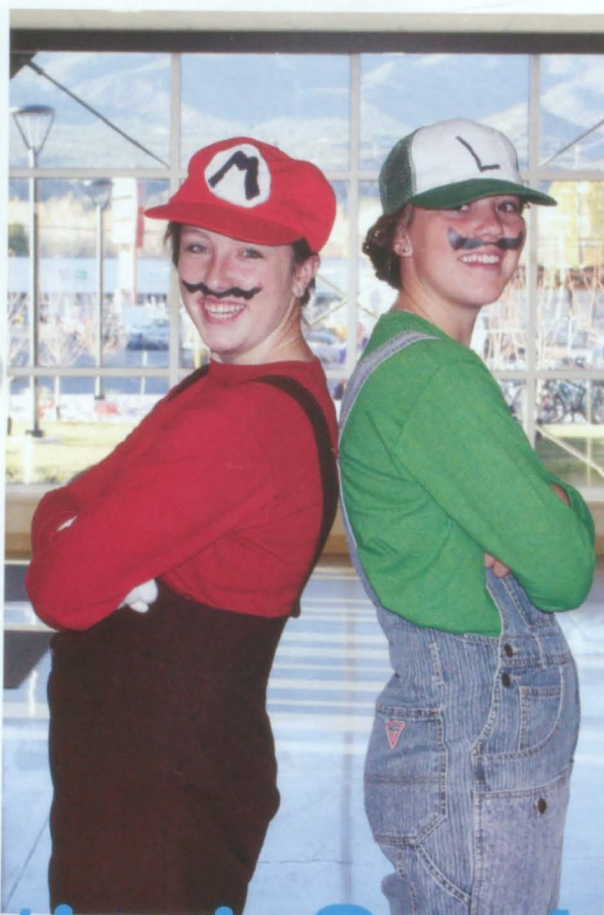

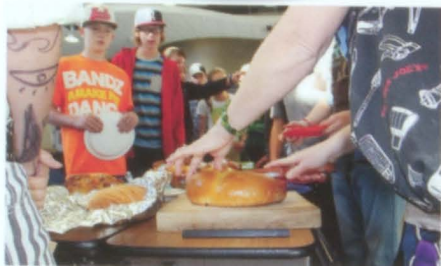

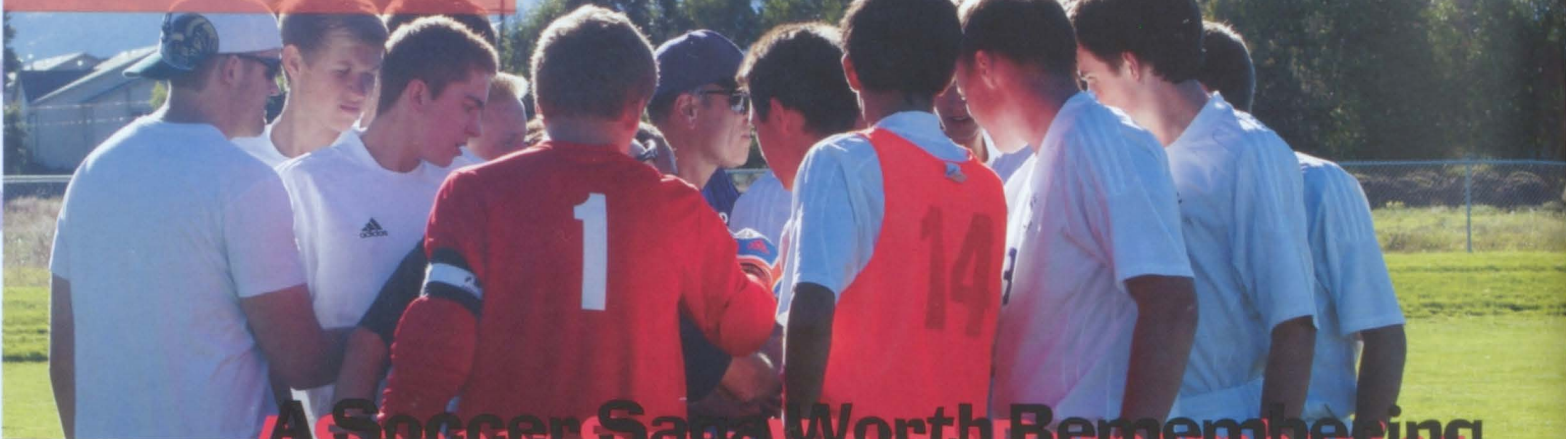

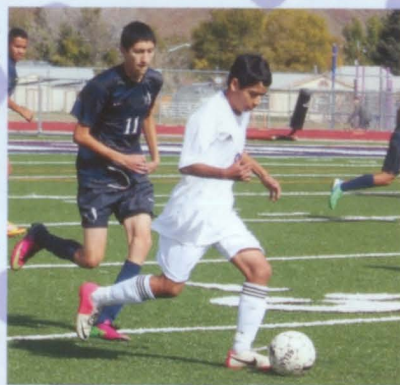
## A Soccer Saga Worth Remembering

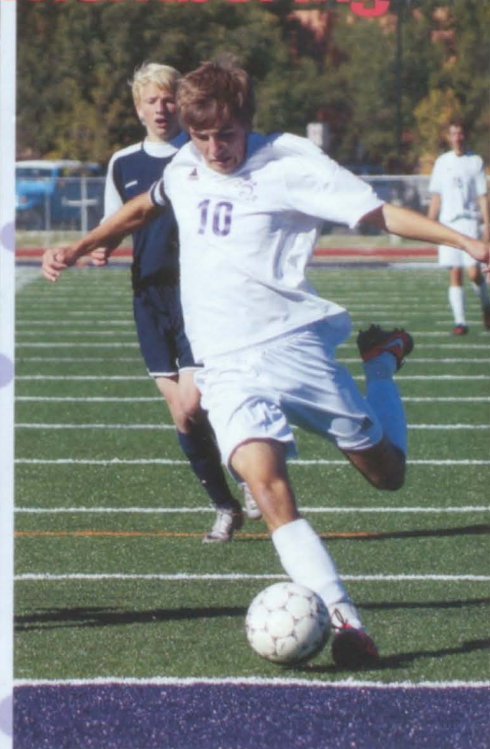

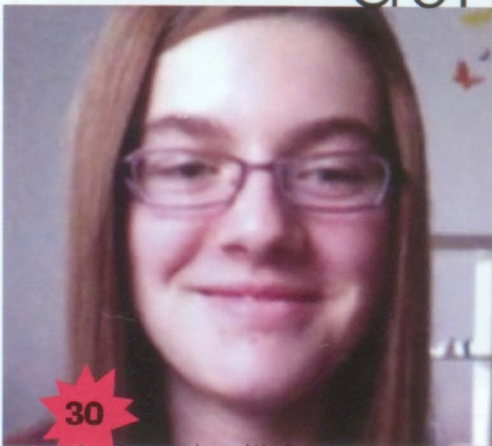

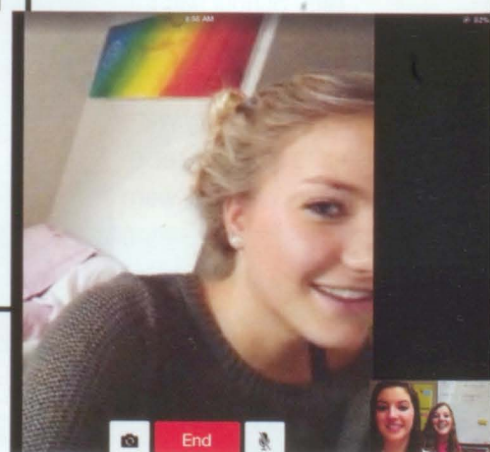


## Germany VS Spain

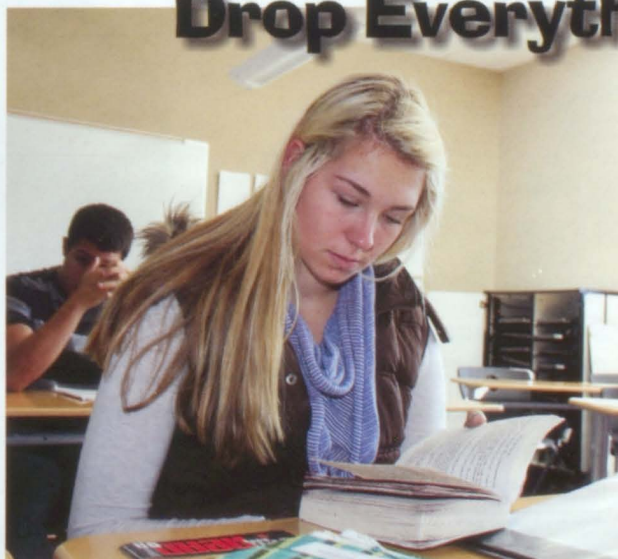
### We are a District of Distinction!

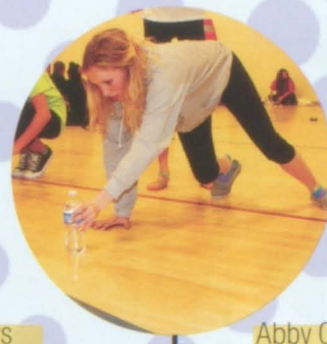

Unfortunately, because time to snooze wasn't anticipated, they only brought one sleeping bag.

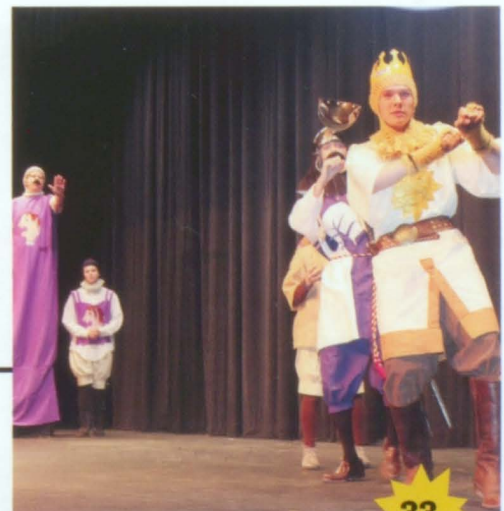

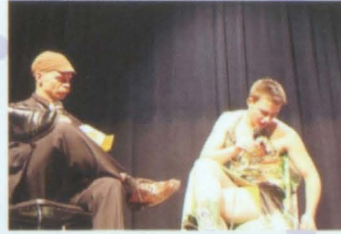

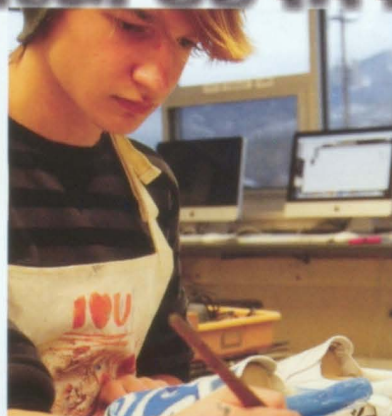

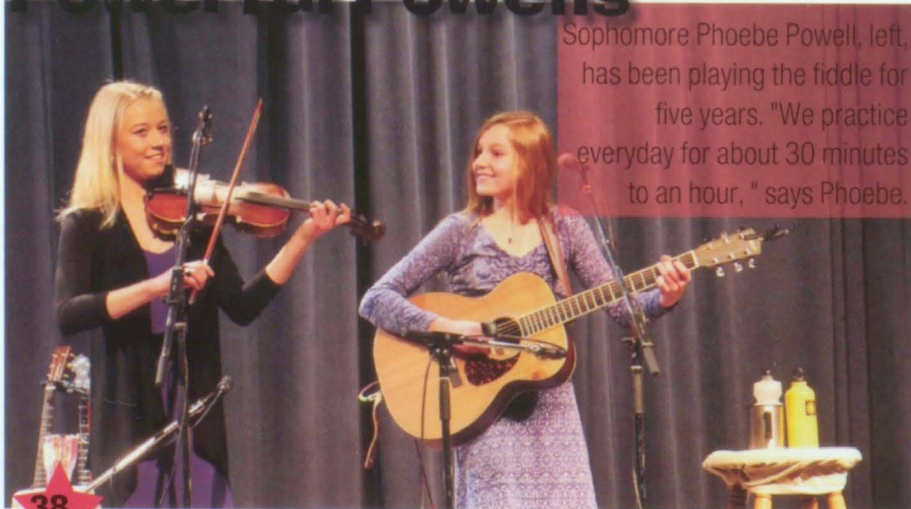

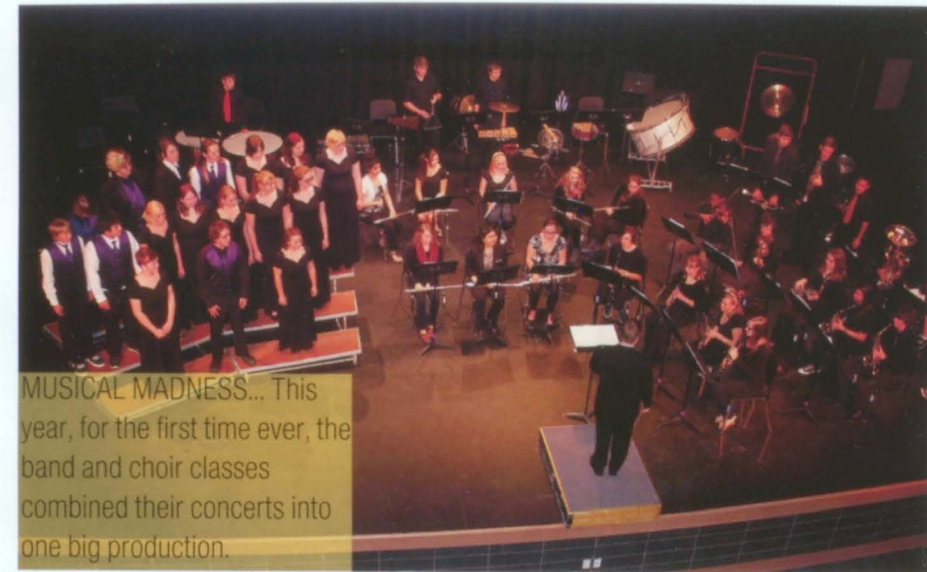


After the trial was over Tristyn Bowers, junior, said, "I've always wanted to be a lawyer and hopefully I will become one."

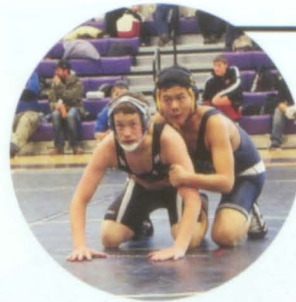


Stuck with hairy legs and smelly feet, Dan spends somewhere around 12 hours doing medical work for students either in the clinic or training office.

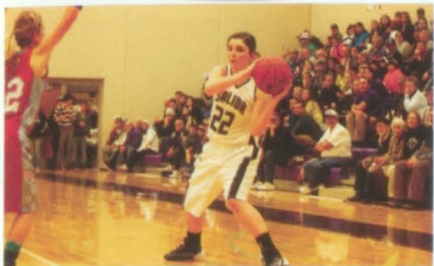

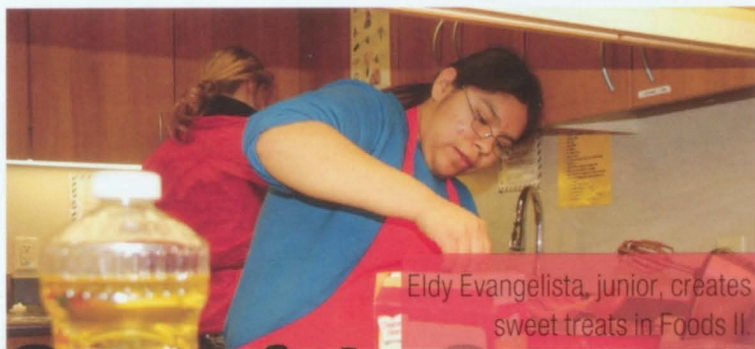

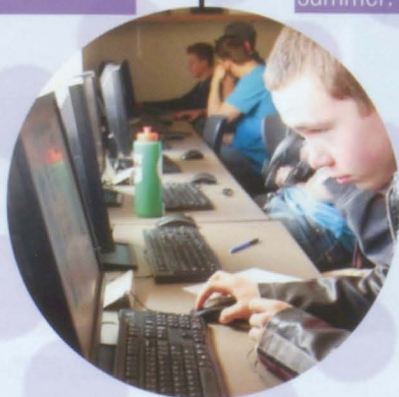

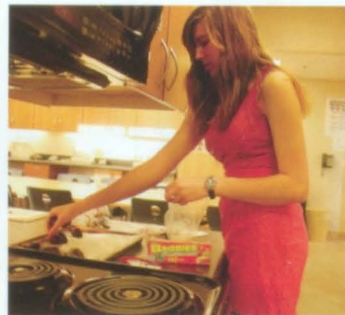

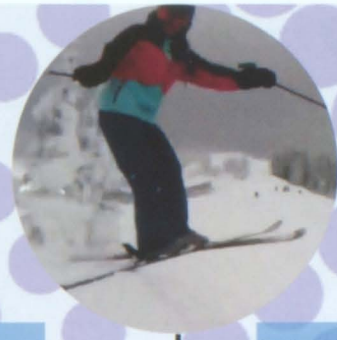

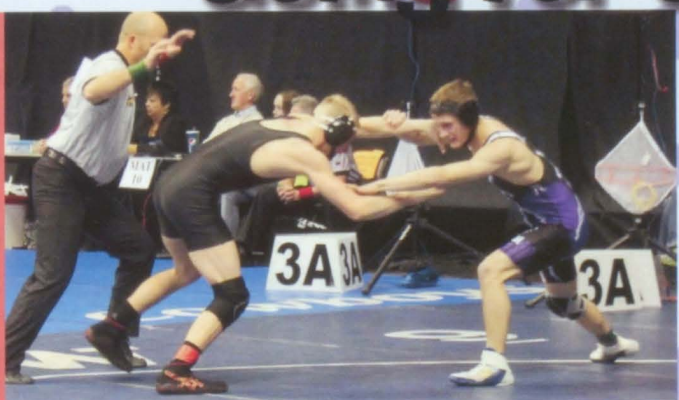


Nate Lowe, junior, gains position on his opponent in the semi final match at the State Wrestling meet in Denver.

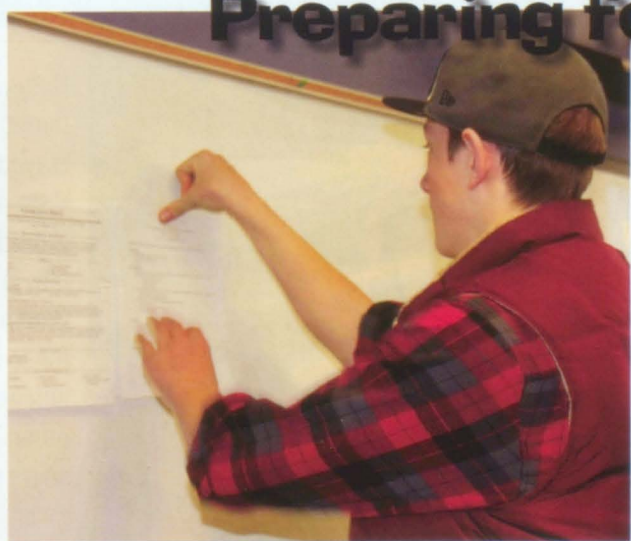
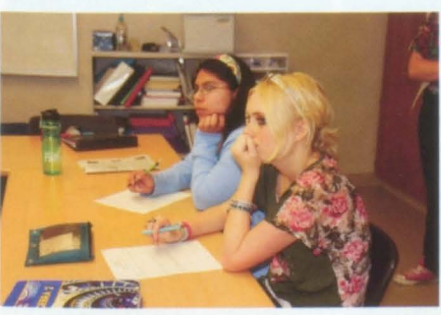

## Preparing for the Future

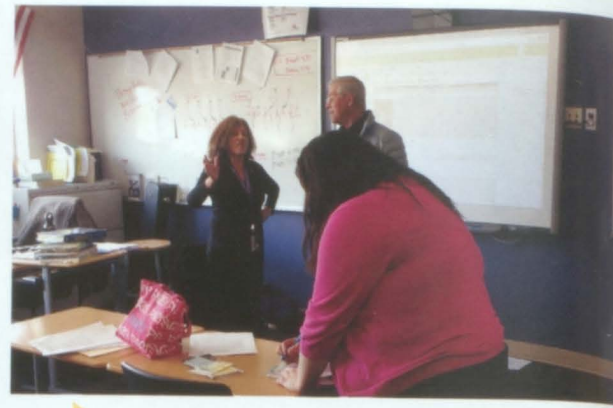

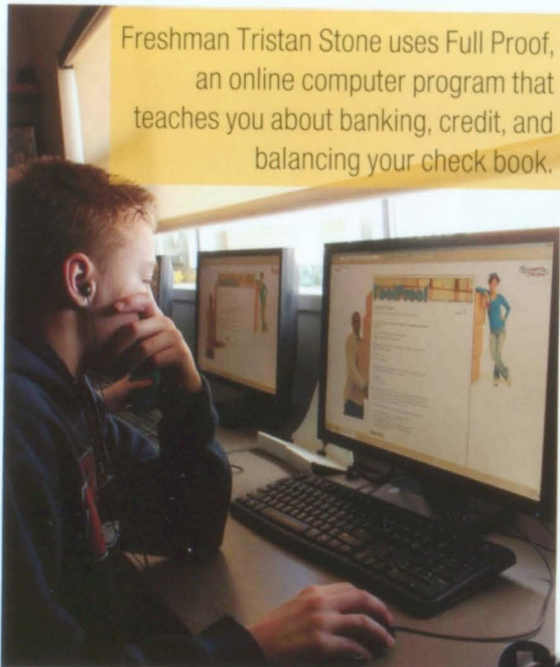

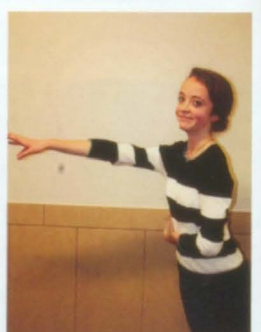
