To all to whom these presents shall come, Greeting:

Whereas, In pursuance of the provisions of the Revised Statutes of the United States, Chapter Six, Title Thirty-two, and legislation supplemental thereto, there have been deposited in the General Land Office of the United States the Plat and Field Notes of survey and the Certificate, No. 5334, of the Register of the Land Office at Leadville in the State of Colorado, accompanied by other evidence whereby it appears that Edward Gimlett

did, on the twenty-sixth day of June, A. D. 1907, duly enter and pay for that certain mining claim or premises, known as the New York and New York No. 2 lode mining claims,

designated by the Surveyor General as Survey No. 18209, embracing a portion of Sections fifteen and twenty-two in Township fifty north of Range six east of the New Mexico Meridian, in the Monarch Mining District, in the County of Chaffee and State of Colorado,

in the District of Lands subject to sale at Leadville and bounded, described, and platted as follows, with magnetic variation fourteen degrees, fifteen minutes east:

Beginning, for the description of the New York lode claim, at corner No. 1, a pine post 48 x 5 x 5 inches, marked 1 - 18209, with mound of stones, from which the north-east corner of Section twenty-two in Township fifty north of Range six east of the New Mexico Meridian bears south fifty-four degrees, four minutes east one thousand ten and nine-hundredths feet distant;

Thence, first course, south eighty-four degrees, fifty-seven minutes west three hundred nineteen and twenty-two-hundredths feet to corner No. 2, a pine post 60 x 5 x 5 inches, marked 2 - 18209, with mound of stones;

Thence, second course, south fourteen degrees, fifty-six minutes west one thousand five hundred feet to corner No. 3, a pine post 42 x 5 x 4 inches, marked 3 - 18209, with mound of earth and stones;

Thence, third course, north eighty-four degrees, fifty-seven minutes east one hundred fifty-nine and sixty-one-hundredths feet to a point from which discovery point bears north fourteen degrees, fifty-six minutes east two hundred ninety-two feet distant; three hundred nineteen and twenty-two-hundredths feet to corner No. 4, a pine post 52 x 5 1/2 x 5 inches, marked 4 - 18209, with mound of earth and stones;

Thence, fourth course, north fourteen degrees, fifty-six minutes east one thousand three hundred forty-five and thirty-six-hundredths feet intersect line 3 - 4 of Survey No. 1737, the Black Bird lode claim, at south seventeen degrees, forty minutes east eighty-seven and eighteen-hundredths feet from corner No. 3; one thousand four hundred forty-nine and twenty-three-hundredths feet intersect line 2 - 3 of said Survey No. 1737 at north seventy-two degrees east fifty-five and ninety-six-hundredths feet from corner No. 3; one thousand five hundred feet to corner No. 1, the place of beginning; the survey of the lode claim as above described extending one thousand five hundred feet in length along said New York vein or lode:

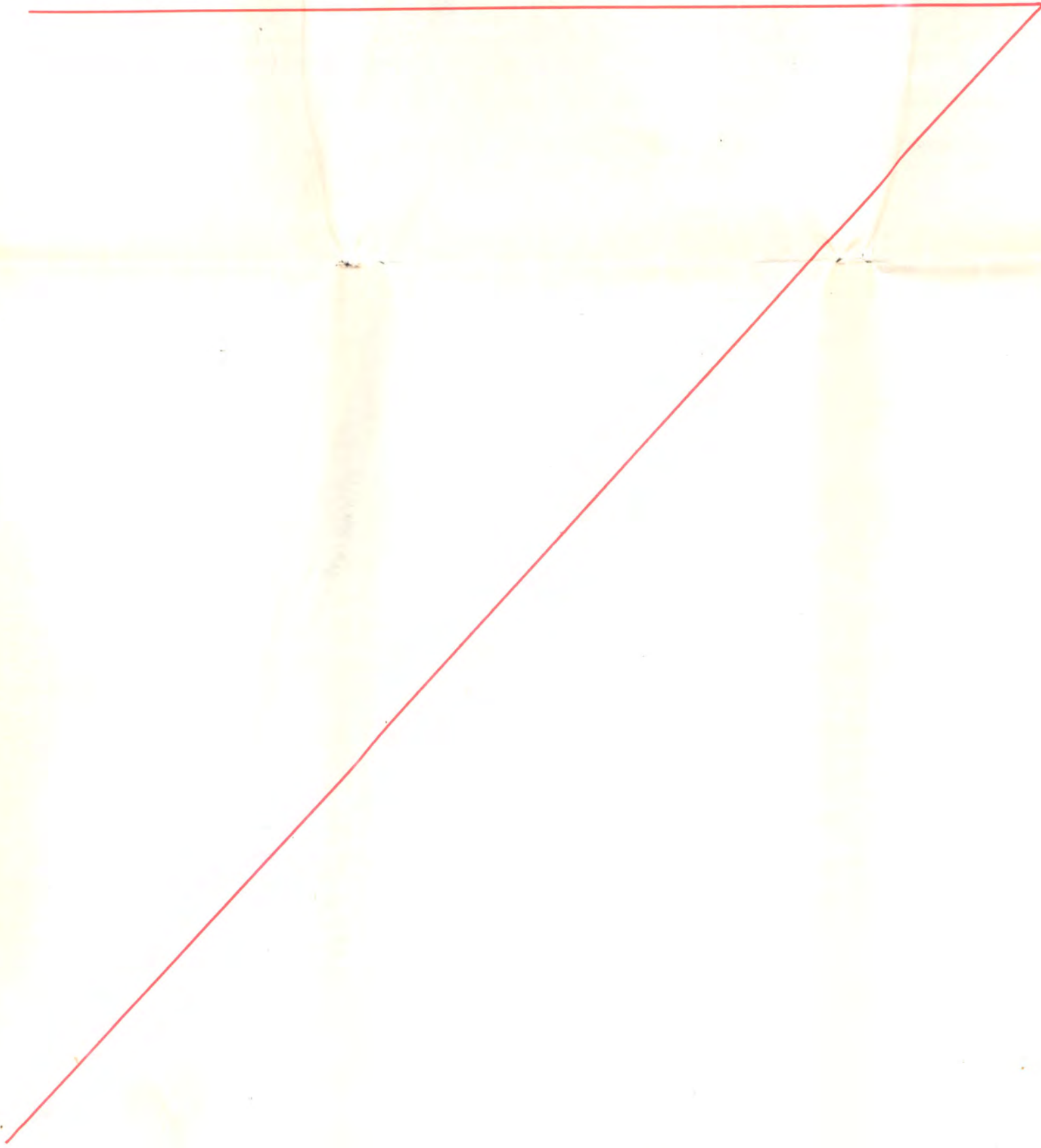
Beginning, for the description of the New York No. 2 lode claim, at corner No. 1, a pine post 66 x 7 x 4 inches, marked 1 - 18209, with mound of earth and stones, from which said section corner bears north eighty-four degrees, ten minutes east eight hundred three and nine-tenths feet distant;

Thence, first course, south six degrees, thirty-two minutes west four hundred forty-one and thirty-five-hundredths feet intersect line 3 - 4, the west side line of Survey No. 5030, the Pinon lode claim; one thousand five hundred feet to corner No. 2, a granite stone 26 x 18 x 6 inches, marked 2 - 18209, with mound of rocks;

Thence, second course, north eighty-three degrees, twenty-eight minutes west three hundred feet to corner No. 3, a granite stone 26 x 10 x 8 inches, marked 3 - 18209, with mound of earth and stones;

Thence, third course, north six degrees, thirty-two minutes east seven hundred seventy-seven and seventy-six-hundredths feet intersect line 4 - 1 of said New York lode claim; one thousand five hundred feet to corner No. 4, a pine post 60 x 5 x 4 inches, marked 4 - 18209, with mound of earth and stone;

Thence, fourth course, south eighty-three degrees, twenty-eight minutes east one hundred fifty feet to a point from which discovery point bears south six degrees, thirty-two minutes west six hundred forty-two feet distant; two hundred five and seventy-nine-hundredths feet intersect said line 3 - 4 of Survey No. 5030; three hundred feet to corner No. 1, the place of beginning; the survey of the lode claim as above described extending one thousand five hundred feet in length along said New York No. 2 vein or lode;— expressly excepting and excluding from these presents all that portion of the ground, hereinbefore described, embraced in said mining claims or Surveys Nos. 1737 and 5030 and also all veins, lodes, and ledges throughout their entire depth, the tops or apexes of which lie inside of such excluded ground; the premises herein granted containing nineteen and two hundred forty-five-thousandths acres, more or less:

and to his heirs _____ and assigns, the said mining premises hereinbefore described, and not expressly excepted from these presents, and all that portion of the said New York and New York No. 2 _____

vein,^s lode,^s or ledge,^s and of all other veins, _____, and ledges throughout their entire depth, the tops or apexes of which lie inside of the surface boundary lines of _____ granted premises in said Survey No. 18209 _____

extended downward vertically, although such veins, lodes, or ledges in their downward course may so far depart from a perpendicular as to extend outside the vertical side lines of said premises: *Provided*, That the right of possession to such outside parts of said veins, lodes, or ledges, shall be confined to such portions thereof as lie between vertical planes drawn downward through the end lines of said Survey No. 18209, _____

so continued in their own direction that such planes will intersect such exterior parts of said veins, lodes, or ledges: *And provided further*, That nothing herein contained shall authorize the grantee herein to enter upon the surface of a claim owned or possessed by another person.

TO HAVE AND TO HOLD said mining premises, together with all the rights, privileges, immunities, and appurtenances whatsoever nature thereunto belonging unto the said grantee above named and to his heirs _____ and assigns forever;

subject, nevertheless, to the above-mentioned and to the following conditions and stipulations:

First. That the premises hereby granted, *with the exception of the surface*, may be entered by the proprietor of any other vein, lode, or ledge, the top or apex of which lies outside of the boundary of said granted premises, should the same in its dip be found to penetrate, intersect, or extend into said premises, for the purpose of extracting and removing the ore from such other vein, lode, or ledge.

Second. That the premises hereby granted shall be held subject to any vested and accrued water rights for mining, agricultural, manufacturing, or other purposes, and rights to ditches and reservoirs used in connection with such water rights as may be recognized and acknowledged by the local laws, customs, and decisions of the courts. And there is reserved from the lands hereby granted a right of way thereon for ditches or canals constructed by the authority of the United States.

Third. That in the absence of necessary legislation by Congress, the Legislature of Colorado _____ may provide rules for working the mining claim or premises hereby granted, involving easements, drainage, and other necessary means to its complete development.

IN TESTIMONY WHEREOF, I, Theodore Roosevelt,

President of the United States of America, have caused these letters to be made Patent, and the seal of the General Land Office to be hereunto affixed.

GIVEN under my hand, at the City of Washington, the twentieth day of January, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and eight, and of the Independence of the United States the one hundred and thirty-second.
