# SENIOR CLASS PROPHECY

A. D. 1951

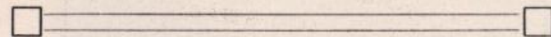


# BASKETBALL

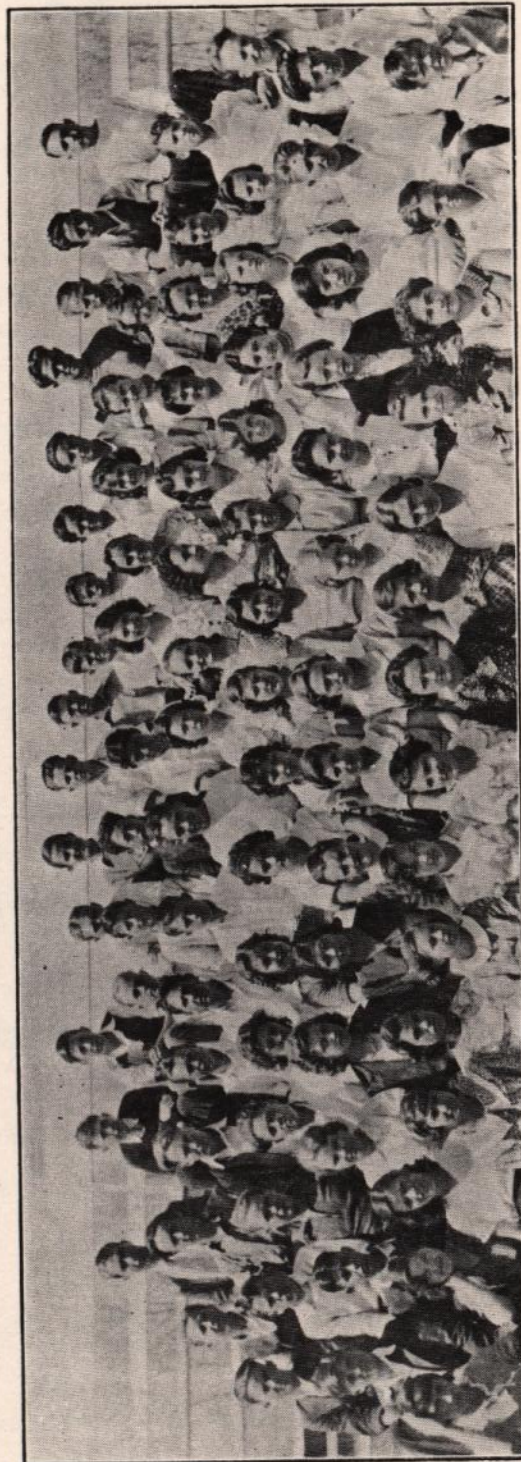

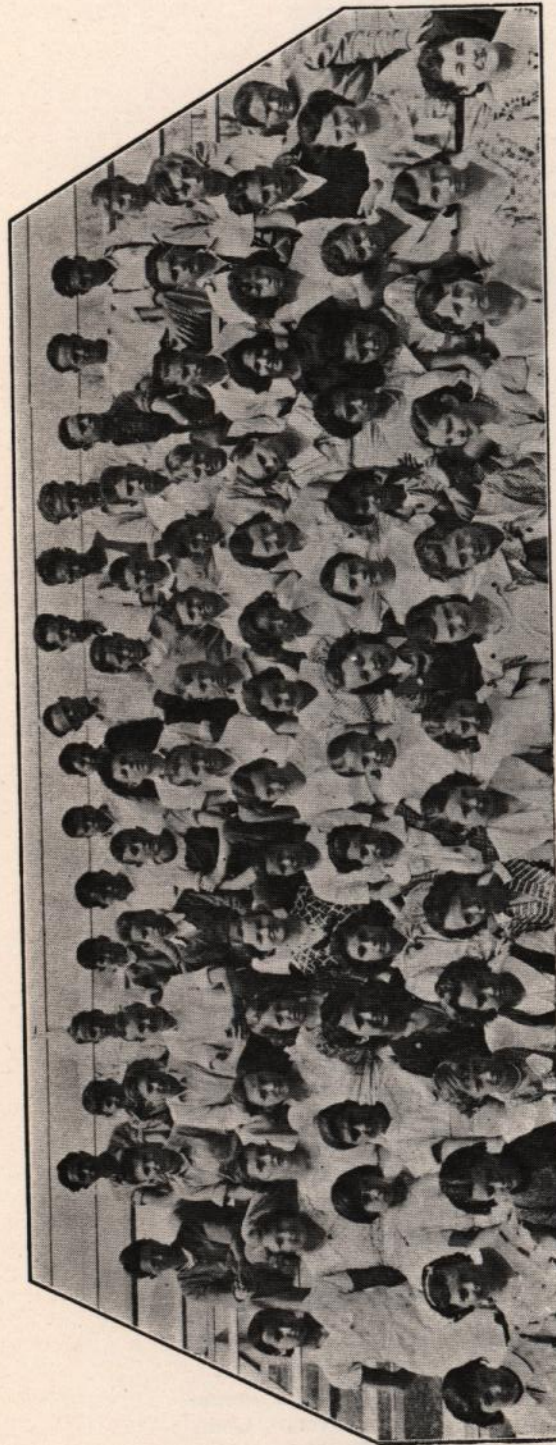
