FOOTBALL

Under the capable guidance of E. C. "Gov." Gruenler and Bill Andreas, the 1946 Spartans finished their regular football season occupying fourth place in the South Central League with a season record of four wins, three losses and two ties.

The first game of the 1946 season was a night affair played September 27, against the team that was to become the Colorado State Champs. This game, with the Centennial Bulldogs, though it had no bearing on the league standings, showed the Spartans what kind of competition they would meet in conference play. The Spartans were humbled by a powerful Bulldog machine 20 to 0.

After a shuffle of personnel, the Spartans seemed to develop an offensive punch.

In the Delta game, played in a drizzle and on a slippery turf, the following week, the Spartans started to roll and they came out on the long end of a 7 to 6 score. The Spartans' 185 pound fullback, Sid Dickinson, scored all of the points.

That the Spartans were beginning to click became apparent when they opened the conference season against the Walsenburg Panthers and defeated them 7 to 0. Dickinson again made the touchdown and Southall converted.

The Spartans then traveled to Colorado Springs to engage the Terrors. The highlight of that game was Chris Argys' 73 yard pass interception runback. This was the first time the Terrors had been scored on. Dickinson converted by hitting the Terror line. Colorado Springs 19, Salida 7.

In the only game of the season in which they scored more than one touchdown, the Spartans utilized both their ground and air powers to score twice defeating the Florence Huskies, 14 to 0. The Spartans' first score came when Dickinson plowed over from the eight, and then made the extra point. Late in the final quarter Dickinson heaved a long aerial to the Spartan right end, Dermond Armstrong, for a touchdown. Southall booted the conversion. This was the first home game and was played under ideal weather conditions.

The next week the Spartans looked like teams of old, for about two minutes, when they drove almost the complete length of the field against Canon City before they sent Dickinson over for the tally. For the first time in six tries the Spartans missed their conversion attempt. Nevertheless, they soon returned to their old form and could not get an offense rolling. They held the Tigers scoreless until the fourth quarter when Young of Canon City scored. Canon missed their extra point and saved the Spartans from suffering their first defeat at the hands of Canon City's Tigers since 1931.


Against the Centennial Bulldogs, the Spartans looked good for the first half, in which time they held the Bulldogs to one touchdown, but after the half, they seemed to melt under the fury of the Bulldog onslaught and went completely to pieces.

The Spartans played most of the Centennial game without the services of Dickinson, Gallagher, and Kovtynovich, who were on the injury list.

In the 1946 Homecoming game, the Trinidad Miners were nosed out by a last quarter rally, 6 to 0. An interception of a Miners pass by Don Givan set the stage for the Spartan tally which was made by Gallagher who scored from the one.

A large crowd turned out Turkey day to watch the Spartans let down the curtain on the 1946 season with obviously their best game of the season, against the Central Wildcats. The game ended with the score knotted 0 to 0.

Although the Spartans did not win any championships, they showed the fire and ginger that makes a person a success in life. They also developed the feeling of responsibility that is necessary for successful living.

Herb Southall, captain of the 1946 eleven, and George Theotokatos were named on the All-Conference second team. Sid Dickinson, Ray Person, and Bill Mehos received honorable mention. Southall and Person also received honorable mention on the Denver Post All-State Team.



Starting practice on December 8, the Salida Spartans, defenders of the West-Central league title, under the leadership of Coach Eichman and Assistant Coach Bill Andreas, won 12 of the 16 games they played during the regular season and gained the league title for the third consecutive year. The Spartans also had a B team this year for the first time in Salida's basketball history. The B squad won 12 of the 14 games they played.

In the first game of the season, on December 14, the Salida cagers won from Florence, the A and B squad games 40 to 16 and 30 to 13 respectively on the local floor.

The Spartans then invaded the Pueblo Centennial camp on December 28. The Salida five dropped a 48 to 23 decision to the Bulldogs.

The Spartans defeated the Sargent's consolidated school in the A game but lost in the B game. The A squad won their game 47 to 20 while the B squad lost theirs 20 to 17.

Playing on their own court, both Spartan teams ran up their second highest score of the season against Saguache, beating them 51 to 22 in the A squad game and 59 to 19 in the B game.

The next night, Salida played at home against the Monte Vista Pirates. After a close first half, the Spartans went on to romp over the Pirates 42 to 22 in the A game. The B squad game ended with the locals on top, 41 to 15.


TRACK


