SENIOR CLASS

As freshmen the Class of 1950 served notice that it would be one of the outstanding classes of Salida high school. The class was to distinguish itself for its ambitions and new ideas. For their first officers they elected Dick Bratton, president; Kenneth Baker, vice-president; Eleanor Gabardi, secretary; and Dave Lines, treasurer. Pat Frayser was named as candidate for the title of Queen of the 1946 Winter Festival. Eleanor Gabardi, Richard Wood, Louise Bement and Billie Lane were selected by the faculty to represent Salida high school on the Scholarship Team.

In their sophomore year the Class of 1950 once again elected Dick Bratton, president of the class. Other officers named were Norman Thonoff, vice-president; Eleanor Gabardi, secretary; and Mary Martellaro, treasurer. The float entered by the sophomores in the Homecoming parade in 1947 won second prize. Vivian Adams was chosen by her classmates to represent the class as candidate for Queen of the 1947 Winter Festival.

As they did in their first two years of school, the Class of 1950 elected Dick Bratton to head the class for the 1948-49 school year. The remainder of the officers were David Davidoff, vice-president; Carolee White, secretary; and Earl Eggleston, treasurer. During the year the class produced two queens and two presidents. Eleanor Gabardi was elected Homecoming Queen and Shirley Higginson was voted Queen of the Winter Festival. For the first time in the history of Salida high school a Salida student was named president of the state association of student councils--this honor was won by James Sheehan. Jerry Berry was elected president of the Salida student body. Kenneth Baker and Dick Bratton were co-captains of the 1949 Spartan football team.

Using the theme Dutch Polonaise and an Old Fashioned Garden, the annual Junior-Senior Prom was voted a success. Also, a success was the Junior Play entitled "Home Sweet Homicide."

Representing the class of 1950 on the Student council during 1946-47 were David David-off, Bob Sympson, and Jerry Berry; during 1947-48 were Pat Frayser, Jerry Berry, and Jimmy Sheehan; during 1948-49 were Jerry Berry, Pat Frayser, Frances Salerno, and Jimmy Sheehan; during 1949-50 were Pat Frayser, Frances Salerno, James Sheehan, Bob Sympson, and Carroll Keifert.

Eleanor Gabardi set another record for the Class of 1950 when she was elected Homecoming Queen for the second straight year. This was the first time in the history of Salida high that a girl was ever named Homecoming Queen two years in succession. Barbara Britton was voted by her classmates to be the senior candidate for Queen of the Winter Festival. To Alveda Carignan went the honor of being the outstanding girl of her class. This came as a result of a vote by the class and a test. At the annual Awards Assembly she was presented with the local DAR award.

Because they ranked first and second in the class as far as grades were concerned, Dorothy Watts was Valedictorian and Alma Spriggs was Salutatorian. Alma Spriggs, Marionetta Spriggs, and Eleanor Gabardi were Co-editors of the 1950 annual. For the first semester Frances Salerno was editor of the Tenderfoot, and Alveda Carignan was the editor for the second semester.

Late in February the Senior Class Play, "Arsenic and Old Lace" was presented before large audiences. Seniors appearing in the play were Earl Eggleston, Dick Tarlip, Vernon Brown, Bob Sympson, Louis Argys, Lloyd Todd, Richard Wood, Jim Sheehan, Joan Simons, Pete Salerno, Frances Salerno, Eddie Trujillo, Shirley Higginson, and Dave Lines.

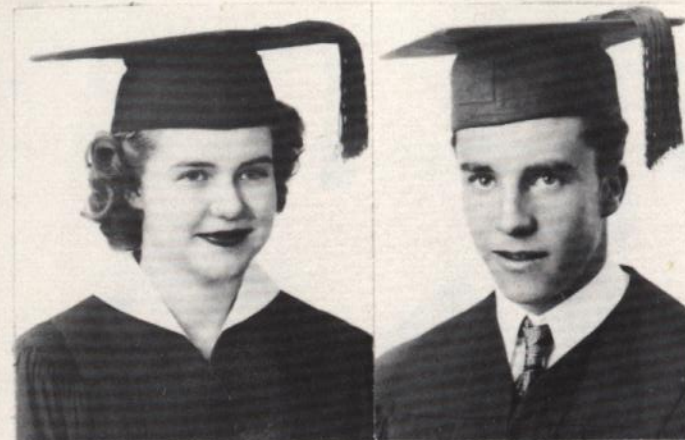
In the field of athletics the Class of 1950 was outstanding. Many of the boys contributed to the success of the football, basketball, and track teams.

The results of the annual Elks Scholarship contest for seniors were: First place, Frances Salerno who won \$50; Second, Alma Spriggs, \$30; Third, Dick Bratton, \$20; and in fourth place were Alveda Carignan and James Sheehan, who each won \$10. The tests were also entered in the Elks state contest.

The Class of '50 started with 109 members; by the time they were sophomores there were 91. The class decreased to 79 in their junior year and had approximately 68 in 1950. The class motto was "United we stand; divided we fall." The orchid was the class flower; purple and white were the colors.

TRACK

Showing a will to win, the 1950 Spartan track team completed the most successful season ever experienced by a Spartan thinclad team when the local lads ran up six victories against no defeats during the regular season.

In their opening meet, in which seven schools participated, the thinclads overwhelmed their opponents by scoring 76 points while the second place team scored 45 points.

The following week the victory bound Spartans opened their home season by scoring 62 1/2 points before a snow storm forced cancellation of the rest of the events. At the time of the cancellation of the remainder of the events Center was in second place with 31 1/2 points. Six schools were in Salida for the meet.

A week later, the Spartans took 1st in the Alamosa Invitational Meet at Alamosa. At this meet, the Spartans piled up their highest score, when they walloped the Valley Class "A" teams by rolling up 114 and 1/2 points--more than the rest of the schools combined scores.

On the following Monday, Canon City came to Salida, but the Spartans easily turned back the Canon lads 85 to 34. This was the first time in many years that the Spartans made a clean sweep of athletic contests with the Tigers, defeating them in football, basketball, and track.

About a week later, the Spartans were guests of the Gunnison Cowboys, in the first track meet ever held at the new bowl at Western State College. The Spartans had little trouble in taking their fifth victory in a row as they won 86 to 38.

For the first time in history, the thinclads took the District Championship in track when they ran up 84 points while their nearest competitor could score only 34. Del Norte, Alamosa, Leadville, Durango, Monte Vista, and Salida participated in the meet.

With Kenny Baker placing in three events, the Spartan thinclads scored 10 2/3 points in the state track and field meet held Saturday, May 13. Baker placed second in the broad jump, tied for second in the high jump, and was a member of the mile relay team which placed fifth. Ray Maez won a second place for the Spartans in the 100-yard dash. Other Spartans to score were Dick Bratton, Carroll Keifert, and Matt Savoren. They were members of the mile relay team. The meet was held in Boulder.

About 24 Class "A" high schools were on hand for the meet which was won by Wheat Ridge.
