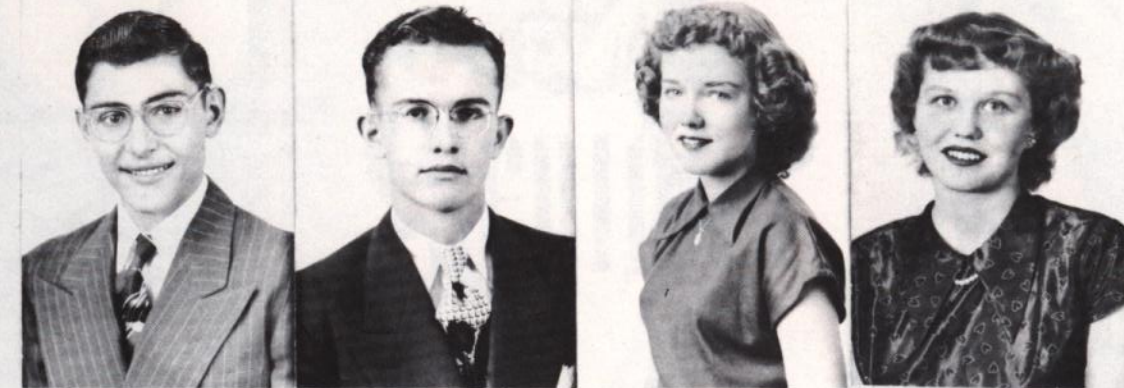
was held on the campus of the Colorado A & M College on October 16 and 17.

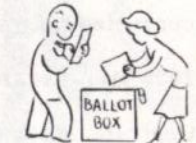

 cussion and expressed their views on the subject.

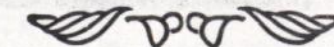
Talent Assemblies were sponsored during the school year for the purpose

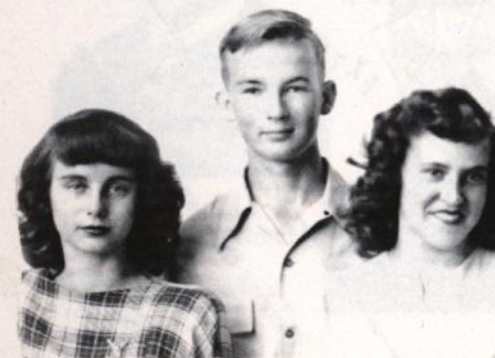
SENIOR CLASS

In the fall of 1947, a freshman class that was as green as any other embarked on the four year road to diplomas. Little did anyone know that the class of 1951 would be one of the most outstanding in the history of Salida High School. Bill Campbell was elected president that year:  Parker, treasurer:  Sam Reno was secretary, and Wesley  Parker, treasurer. All survived the rigors of freshman week, showing good sportsmanship all the way. A float was entered in the Homecoming parade, and Theresa  Winter was elected freshman candidate for Winter Festival Queen. The class was active in all phases of school life, and they presented a talent assembly in the spring.

As sophomores, the class of '51 continued to blaze its way through S. H. S. Their entry in the Homecoming parade won second place; Jackie Owen was candidate for Homecoming queen and Peggy Bradbury was named as  candidate for Winter Festival queen. Early in the spring the sophomores presented an excellent assembly. Bill Campbell was again president, Wesley Parker,  vice-president and Jackie Owen, secretary-treasurer.

Headed by George Dewhurst the class of '51 enjoyed a successful year as juniors. "A Toast to the Spartans"  was the theme of the second place float entered by the juniors in the Homecoming parade. Later in the year Jerry Jean  Bennett was elected Winter Festival Queen. The Junior Play, "Girl Shy," was one of the best ever presented in Salida High. Six movies were sponsored by the class in order to finance the junior-senior prom. "Moonlight and Roses" provided the romantic background for the prom which was held at the Elks home. The ball room was beautifully decorated in red and yellow with a large trellis forming the centerpiece. The other officers of the junior class were Jackie Owen, Donald Ramey and Nancy Kelso.

The class of '51 then became almighty seniors. After initiating the "greenies", they got into full swing, with George Dewhurst again heading the class. Bill Campbell was co-captain of the football team that reached the state class "A" semi-finals, and several other boys contributed greatly to the success of all sports.

No senior play was presented but the class was well represented in the other plays that were given in school that year.

Chosen to participate in the Elks scholarship contest were Don Ramey, Mary Lou Muto, Wesley Parker, Larry Finch, and George Dewhurst. Bill Campbell was chosen outstanding leader of the school, and Don Ramey, outstanding scholar.

Many instructive and entertaining assemblies were held during the year. School began in the fall with an assembly and ended with one in June.

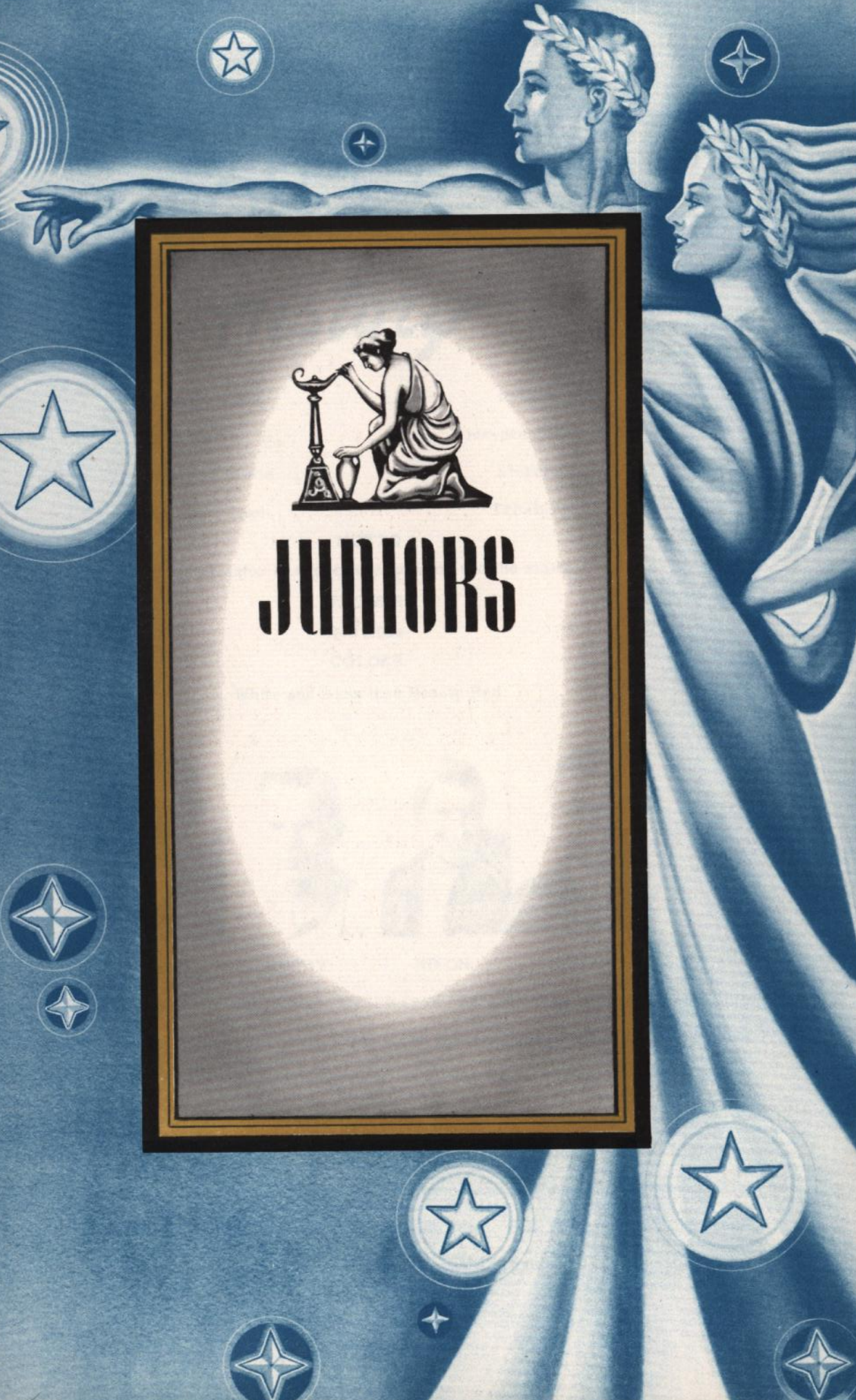

Junior High

On September 19, 1922 the Salida Junior High received its formal name, Kesner Junior High, at a solemn dedication ceremony. Schools were let out, many speeches were given, and the students placed flowers at the base of the newly completed junior high building in memory of the late Edgar Kesner.

Till about 1935, the junior and senior high served as one unit. In 1935 it became solely a junior high, grades seven and eight, with Mary Mitchell, a former language teacher, as its first principal.

Mr. Eichman succeeded her in 1941, and has been its principal since then.

An interesting fact is that the cornerstone of the building contains: newspaper clippings concerning the bonds issued to pay for it, a Bible, a paper on the organization of the P. T. A. in Salida, a list of the P. T. A.'s first officers, and the members of the school board at that time.

FOOTBALL

Under the able coaching of coaches Bill Andreas and Rudy Aganski, the 1950 Spartan football team ended the season with a record of 6 wins, 4 losses and 1 tie. The team reached the semi-finals of the Class "A" division. Three of the wins were league games which gave the Salida Spartans the San Luis Valley League Championship for the first time. The 1950 season was the Spartans' first year in the league.

The Spartans opened the grid season at La Junta, with Salida coming out on the short end of a 45 to 6 score. Inexperience was the trouble once more when Salida traveled over to the Western Slope to play Montrose, who later became the State Class "A" Champs. The Indians defeated the Spartans 33 to 6. John Bayuk galloped through the whole Montrose team for the only Spartan score. That the Spartans were becoming better was apparent when the Spartans rallied in the second half to tie St. Mary's of Walsenburg 13 to 13.

In the first league game, the Salida Spartans found their power and maul-ed the Pirates of Monte Vista 27 to 6. Against Del Norte in a league game, the Spartans rolled over the Tigers by a score of 31 to 13.

In the league Championship contest against the Alamosa Maroons, the Spartans scored a touchdown in the second quarter on a pass from Campbell to Leiva. The second touchdown came in the third quarter when Bill Campbell intercepted an Alamosa pass and ran 35 yards. Then, the Spartans held off the Maroons for the rest of the game to win 12 to 0 and their first San Luis Valley Football Championship.

The Cortez eleven from the San Juan Basin came to visit Salida, but went home on the short end of a 27 to 12 score. A passing Pueblo Centennial team let the Spartans score 13 points in the first half and then went to beat the home boys 21 to 13. The Canon City Tigers came to Salida for the Spartans' Homecoming game and the last game of the regular season. The Spartans unleashed all their power to bury the Tigers 52 to 0 for the second worst beating that a Canon City team had received from Salida.

In the State Class "A" Quarterfinals, the Salida Spartans traveled to meet the Durango Demons, champions of the San Juan Basin League. The Spartans passed for both their touchdowns and won 14 to 6.

FOOTBALL

The win over Durango gave the Spartans a second chance to meet Montrose in the State Class "A" semi-finals on the Spartan field. The game was scoreless until the last 25 seconds when both teams scored a touchdown and conversions to make the game end in a 7 to 7 tie.



However, in the overtime period the Montrose Indians made a few more yards from scrimmage to win an additional two points. Score: Montrose 9, Salida 7.

Co-captains Bill Campbell and Rod Koenig and guard tinez, and end Tommy Johns made the All-conference first At a football banquet given by the Elks of Salida for Salida, Junior High and Buena Vista squads, Ronnie Short and Leo were selected co-cptains for the 1951 team.

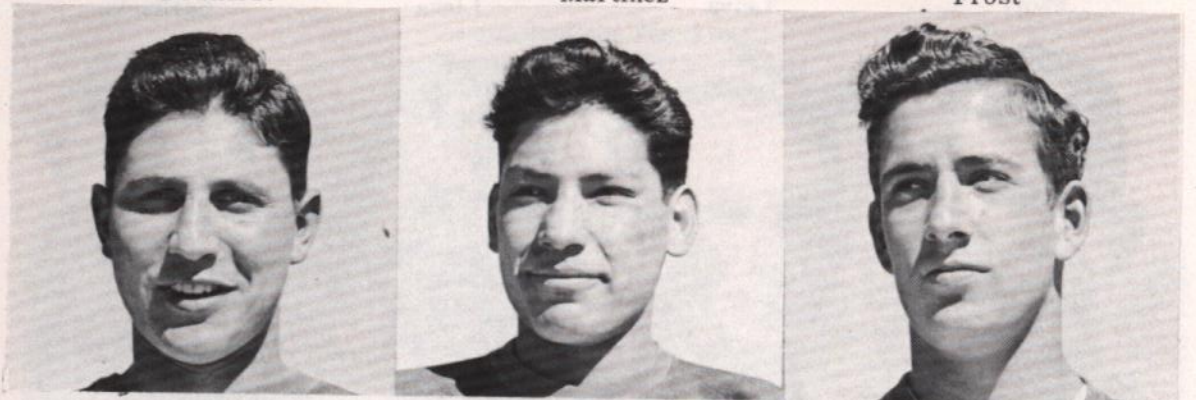

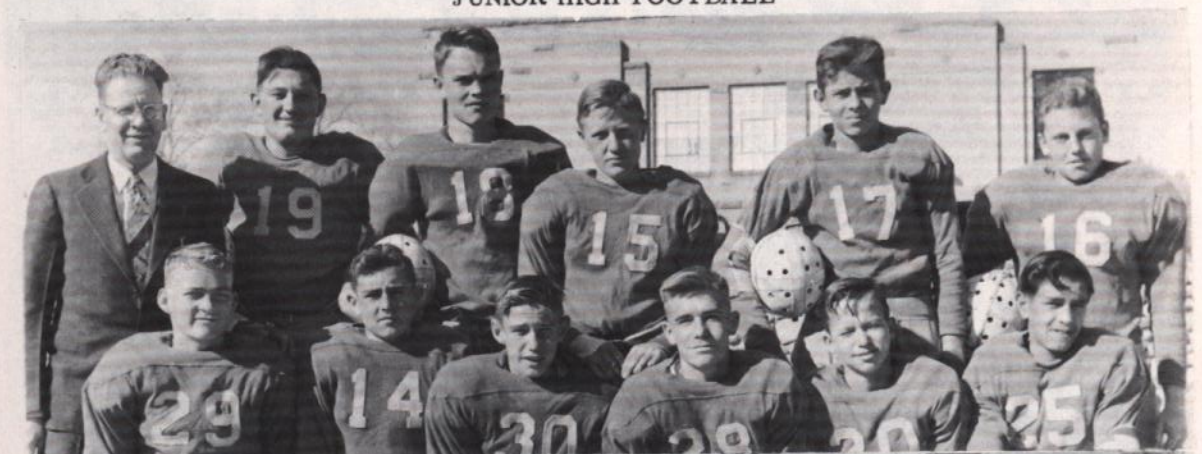

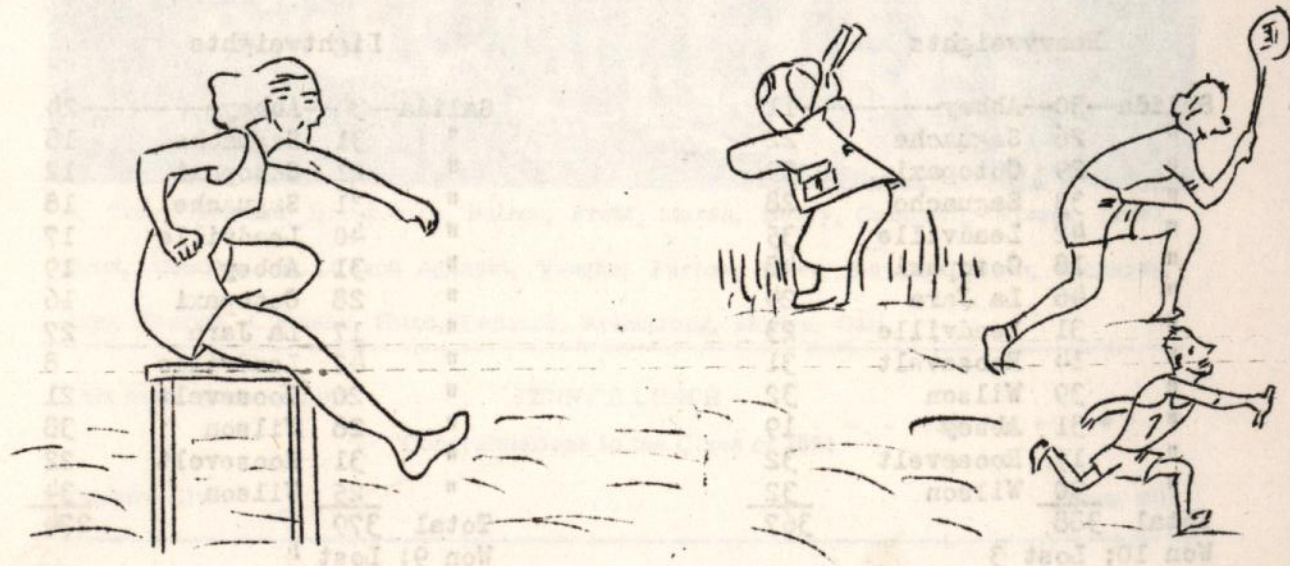

Manager letters were awarded to D. Linza, N. Sandoval, and D. Aragon.



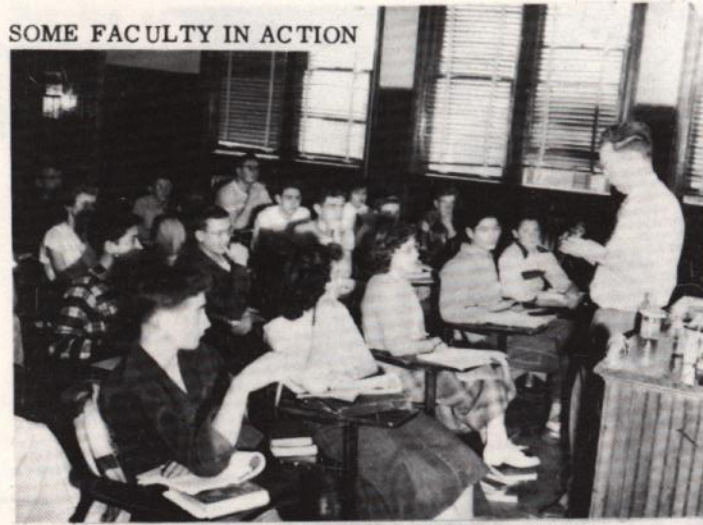

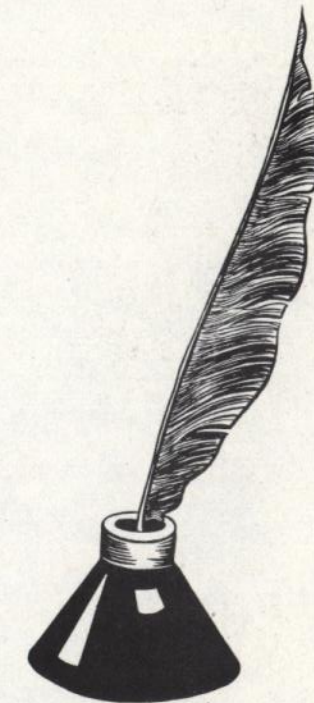
Attendance at both of these games was very good.
