FOOTBALL

The Spartans, led by Co-captains Ronnie Short and Leo Rivera, ended the 1951 football season with an impressive record. Although the Spartans record of 7 wins and 3 losses was outstanding, they did not win the league championship. The league ended in the following order: Alamosa (wins 3 - losses 0), Salida (wins 2 - losses 1), Monte Vista, Third and Del Norte Fourth.



The 1951 season opened with a "bang" for the Spartans as they rolled over the Gunnison Cowboys 29 to 0. John Bayuk and Russell Eichman shared scoring honors with two touchdowns each. At home for the next game the Spartans defeated Montrose by a score of 21 to 7, in a game that helped to remove the "sting" of the 1950 defeat in the semi-finals.



Due to cancellation of the Salida-Centennial game because of a polio epidemic in the steel city, Salida journeyed to La Junta for a battle with the Tigers, who handed Salida its first defeat, outclassing them 60 to 0.

Playing on the home field again, the Spartans were defeated by Rocky Ford Meloneers 21 to 7.

On a wet, cold, rainy night Salida got back into the win column by ruining St. Mary's Homecoming with a score of 26 to 6. On the first play of the game, big John Bayuk, Spartan fullback, ran the ball for 60 yards and a TD.



For the first league encounter the Spartans went to Del Norte and had their own way with the Tigers, defeating them 28 to 0. The following week Salida



lost the league championship, by losing to Alamosa, 35 to 7. The

Spartans then played its third league game and defeated Monte Vista 18 to 6. On the opening kickoff, Frank Gentile ran 85 yards for a T.D.



The next week the Spartans proved they were improving when they beat the undefeated Shamrocks of Pueblo Catholic high 27 to 14.



The Spartans played the Canon Tigers, in the final game, and came out on top 31 to 0, which kept the Spartans record intact, having never been beaten by the Tigers for 20 years. "Gov" Gruenler was the head coach with Tony Delmonico being the assistant coach. Mr. Rudy Aganski was supposed to have been the football coach but was called back into army service. Mr. Gruenler was then put back as head football coach.

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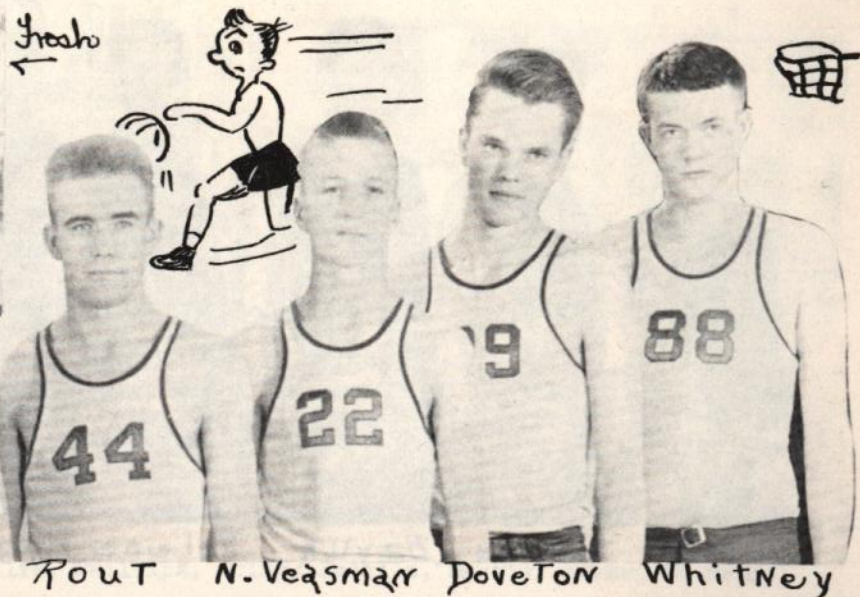

SIXTEEN WIN  
TRACK LETTERS

Sixteen Spartans won letters in track. According to information released May 13 by Coaches Charles Melien, Tony Delmonico, and Clifton Ellis.

Of the sixteen letter winners, only five are seniors so prospects look good for the 1953 track season.

Joe Scanga and Joe Futchinson, by virtue of their scoring the most points during their high school career in track, are the co-captains of the 1952 track team. Note: In track only seniors are eligible to become captains, and captains are selected on the basis of points scored during their entire high school career.

Not including the state meet, Joe Futchinson lead the seniors on the team with 58 points; John Bayuk, the juniors with 51 points; Russell Eichman, the sophomores with 67 points; and Tommy Gibson, the freshman with 17 points.

Seniors winning letters were Joe Scanga; Joe Futchinson; Darrell Farlow; Bill Richards; and Joe Martellaro.

Juniors winning letters were John Bayuk; Richard Roberts; Clifford Gibson; Gary Sinclair; Bob Brookshire.

Sophomores winning letters were Russell Eichman; Edgar Boyd; Terry Everett; and Joe Padilla.

Freshman winning letters were Tommy Gibson and Jack Vance. Cont. in next column.

Manager letter winners were Jack Fischer; and Richard Lucero.

For the second time in three years the Spartans finished a regular track season without a defeat. This year the Spartans won five straight meets, including the San Luis League Meet, and the District No. 4 track championship.

Salida's thinclads opened their 1952 season by scoring 73 points against Center's 49 1/2 points, Saguache's 47 points, and Sargent's 26 1/2 points to give the Spartans a victory in their initial meet. Most of the meet was runoff on a cold, windswept field, which hampered the contestants.

The Spartans scored a total of 77 points to Alamosa's 54 1/2 points to capture first place in their own invitational meet. Other team totals were La Jara 34 points, Del Norte 29 points, Manassa 11 points, Canon City 8 1/2 points, and Leadville 8 points. This meet attracted over 160 contestants, the largest number of contestants ever to take part in a track meet in Salida.

Keeping in top form, the Salida thinclads ran to an easy victory over the Canon Track team in a meet held in Canon City. The final score read Salida 97 1/2, Canon 11 1/2.

On May 2, the Spartans won their third straight San Luis Valley league championship in a meet held in Salida. The Spartans came out on top with 98 3/7 points. Alamosa Cont. in third column.

mosa was second with 62 3/7; Del Norte third with 37 1/7; Leadville fourth with 18 1/2; and Durango last with 4 1/2.

To climax their regular season the Spartans captured their third straight district title May 10, at Alamosa. The Spartans rolled up 76 1/2 points while Alamosa was second with 65 1/2. Other team totals were Del Norte 32, Durango 24 1/2, Monte Vista 10, and Leadville 1 1/2.

MANY RECORDS

They now hold seven out of the 14 district records.

The Roto has a circulation of more than one million. This magazine is published once a month. The Tenderfoot first started carrying this magazine section in the March issue of the paper.

**AGANSKI ON LEAVE

During the past year, Rudy Aganski, a member of the Spartan coaching staff and teacher of physical education in the Salida schools, was on a leave of absence. Mr. Aganski, who is now a captain in the army, is a member of the army reserve and was called back into active service last spring.

Next year, in addition to Captain Aganski, Mr. Szymanski and Mrs. Morrow will be on a leave of absence. Thus, Salida high school and junior high school will have a total of three teachers on a leave of absence.

**TENDERFOOT ESTABLISHES  
 MANY RECORDS**

Vol. 11, No. 2, published October 18, 1951, was the largest issue ever published by the Tenderfoot. This issue of the paper was 32 pages in the history of the Tenderfoot, the Scholastic Roto was included as part of the school paper.

During the third quarter of the school year, the Tenderfoot staff, of 1951-52 published six issues of the paper—a record for one quarter.

**FOURTEEN ISSUES OF  
 TENDERFOOT PUBLISHED**

During the 1951-52 school year, 14 issues of the Tenderfoot were published, which represented 308 pages or a page and one half for every day of the school year.

The average Tenderfoot contained about 22 pages per issue. Less than 20 per cent of the paper was devoted to ads.

An attempt was made by the staff to give all school activities equal publicity. Also, the staff tried to provide news and feature material that would interest all students.

**NEW MIMEOGRAPH  
 MACHINE RECEIVED**

On February 19, 1952, the Commercial Department, the school and the Press club combined their efforts and purchased a new mimeograph machine for the school. This machine replaced the old machine, which had been used for over 20 years.

On February 21, 1952, the Tenderfoot printed their first issue on the new machine. The purchase of the machine has greatly increased the "readability" of the Tenderfoot.

The machine will be used by the journalism class and the Commercial department.

**TENDERFOOT HAS LARGE  
 EXCHANGE LIST**

With the beginning of the school year the Tenderfoot had a moderate exchange list, but as the year went on this list increased a great deal.

The Tenderfoot exchanged papers with nearly all the San Luis Valley schools. Papers came in the mail from way down in the San Juan Basin, where Cortez offered reading literature.
