The Spartan squad of 1935 went through a schedule of eleven games undefeated. In completing this schedule, the Spartans won the championship of the South Central league for the fourth consecutive year and also won the Southern Colorado, the Eastern, and the Colorado State Championships. The Spartans have earned three consecutive state titles.

The outstanding game of the conference season was with Salida's old rival, Canon City, who was defeated 19-13. Other hard struggles were encountered with Trinidad, Pueblo Central, and Wray. Wray was defeated in the semi-finals on a 62-yard punt returned by Gentile aided by excellent blocking.

Severson rates as an outstanding prep kicker of all times. Dougherty, guard; Brisnehan, tackle; and Chambers, back, were placed on all-conference teams. Dan and Harry Paul, newcomers, played fine ball. Altho the line was composed of green men, it functioned in great shape in the pinches. J. Kochman, Gray, Schneider, Gregg, and Cervone, who made up the rest of the line, played some great ball.

Sixteen out of twenty-one lettermen have played their last games for the Spartans.
