





James Williams gave a liquid air demonstration February 11.


Orendo, the magician, rendered the final assembly March 9.


On the sixth day of September, 88 students entered their third year of high-school. It may be best to speak of them as the "Class of '40.




This club was organized December 15, 1937 at a banquet held at Coach Mehring's home. He was the sponsor and originator of the "S" Club.

The Central Wildcats came to Salida with a group of over 1,000 fans following them. The Wildcats had a strong team but the Spartans were a good match for them. The Wildcats scored in the first half and it looked like a defeat for the Spartans until the closing minutes of the game when L. Fleck thrilled the Armistice Day crowd with an 80-yard run for a touchdown. The game ended in a 7-7 tie, the second tie for the Spartans.

CORTEZ

In a game which had not been previously scheduled the Spartans defeated a light but speedy and deceptive Cortez eleven. The Cortez Panthers, champions of the San Juan Basin, were well coached by Jack Woodward, a former Spartan backfield ace. Since neither team had not scouted the other it was a wide-open game. The score was 26-19.

COLORADO SPRINGS

On Thanksgiving Day the Spartans went to Colorado Springs to play their last game of the season in the Will Rogers Memorial Stadium. The Terrors had not been able to win a conference game but were successful in tying the Spartans by a 7-7 score. This was the third tie of the season for the Spartans. J. Muto was the outstanding player in this game.

PERSONNEL OF THE SPARTANS

Ends—F. Smith and L. Miller were our starting ends with F. Williams seeing considerable action. Miller was a very good punter and also a good pass receiver. Smith played a good game both on offense and defense. We lose both players this year.

Tackles—Skufca, J. Starbuck, A. Miller and Harmon. Skufca and Starbuck did the greater part of the playing at the tackle posts but Miller and Harmon were reliable substitutes. Skufca was our best and toughest lineman and has been elected captain for the 1939 season. Starbuck did a good job at playing the right tackle position. Starbuck and Harmon are men lost from the squad.

Guards—Watters, Davenport, G. Starbuck and Cribari. Watters was a very strong guard and added much to the strength of the line. He had the honor of being the only Spartan chosen on the All-State team. Davenport is a three-year man so you can see what kind of a player he was. Watters and Davenport played their last for purple and white but G. Starbuck and Cribari return and are expected to be two very powerful guards.

Centers—Kochman and Ostrum. Kochman was strong at backing up the line and also took charge of the signal-calling very well. Ostrum played very well when called upon for substituting. Both Kochman and Ostrum are lost from the squad by graduation.

Backs—Mann; Fleck, Haley, Post, Muto, Moltrer, Hyatt and Cuenin. The first four backs mentioned saw the most action. Captain Mann was the sparkplug of the 1938 Spartans. He gave the team pep and encouragement and saw to it that the team got a fair deal in all the games. L. Fleck was a very shifty runner and broke away for many long gains. Haley did most of the passing and was always in there doing his part. Post played his first year of highschool football and did a swell job of it. He returns to the team next year and will be a fine back. Muto was a very fast man and put his speed to advantage when possible. Moltrer was small but a shifty runner and a good blocker, Hyatt and Cuenin never saw much action but could be depended on for good substitutes. All these backs except Post have played their last for Salida High.

Out of the 21 lettermen only six return to the squad next year.


Players who received second team letters are: Bob Wilson, Dick Lines, Bob

Spring football started on April 3 and lasted three weeks. Forty boys reported for practice and showed promise for the coming season.





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
