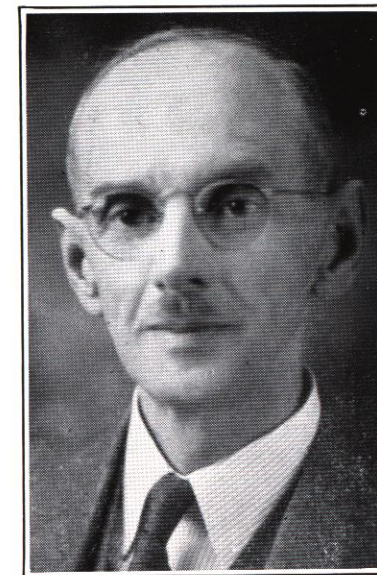

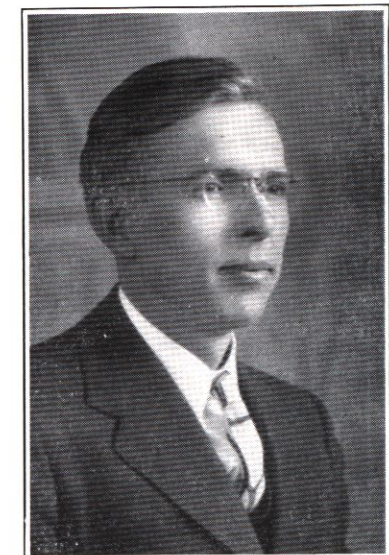
June 11, 1886 - - - - Feb. 23, 1941
